RUTH AFTER NEW RECORD

SISLER OF ST. LOUIS BOOSTS 8
POINTS IN WEEK.

Highest Average for Base Stealing
Held by Rice; Bobby Roth
Is Second.

CHICAGO, June 26.—"Babe" Ruth, the New York slugger, today has 87 games in which to walloop out eight home runs to shatter the record of 29 established by himself last season.

In his remarkable drive toward a new world's record, Ruth crashed out his 20th homer Wednesday and hit two more yesterday.

George Sisler, St. Louis star, who led the American league at the end of Wednesday's game, boosted his average to .416—eight points within a week. Tris Speaker of Cleveland managed to cling to second place with .384. Speaker took the league in scoring, having counted 57 runs in 55 games. Ruth has crossed the plate 55 times in 54 games.

Rice of Washington is running away with honors in base-stealing. He has stolen 25, while Bobby Roth, his teammate, is next in line with 15. Sisler is third with 15.

Other leading batters are: Johnson, Cleveland, .352; Miller, Washington, .351; Weaver, Chicago, .352; Feisch, Chicago, .325; Duncan, Cincinnati, .323; Judge, Washington, .323; Rice, Washington, .323; Hendry, Boston, .318.

AMERICAN NOT LIKELY
TO OLYMPICS

U. S. Excels in Field and
Track Events.

MANY LINES ARE WEAK

Pacific Coast Enters Soccer and
Rugby, but Admittedly
Has Little Chance.

There are few who know that the United States has never won an Olympic games programme. This country at all times has won the track and field competition at every Olympiad since the revival of the contests at Athens in 1896, but this is only one branch of sport out of a programme of 23 sports all of which count in deciding the champion nation of an Olympiad. Sweden won the 1912 Olympiad and Great Britain won the 1908 event.

Ice skating and hockey already have been decided and this country lost both these events. Other events still to be decided include golf, archery, tennis, swimming, track, yacht, polo, polo, tennis, football, basketball, shooting, cycling, two types of wrestling, boxing, fencing, gymnastics, rowing, grass hockey, riding, etc.

This country will be represented in a number of these events and in some there will be no representation. In such events as gymnastics, fencing, yachting and archery the United States will hardly score more than a few points, while in others, such as polo, tennis, football, basketball, shooting, cycling, two types of wrestling, boxing, fencing, gymnastics, rowing, grass hockey, riding, etc.

European authorities concede that this country will win the track and field and probably the swimming without much trouble, but in all other events in which army men should show to advantage it is just these sports. The United States army representatives were simply outclassed in this type of sport and it is hardly likely this country will be able to put in any stronger men or teams in any Olympic games than represented America in the recent army inter-allied championships.
