

ALLEGED AUTO THIEF HELD TO GRAND JURY

Lloyd Parker Charged With
Being Member of Gang.

SENTENCES METED OUT

Prisoners Taken as Result of Drive
Shrine Week Disposed of by
Judge Rossman.

One alleged automobile thief was held to answer to the grand jury and several other prisoners received sentences on criminal charges at the hands of Municipal Judge Rossman yesterday morning. The prisoners tried were some of those arrested as a result of the campaign carried on by the police during the last few days to rid the city of crooks who flocked here for the Shrine convention and Rose Festival.

Lloyd Parker, charged with being a member of a gang of automobile thieves which attempted to steal the automobile of A. Hillier, 113 East Forty-ninth street, on the morning of June 18, was held to answer to the grand jury by Judge Rossman on a charge of larceny. His bail was placed at \$500. Parker and two companions are said to have attempted to tow away Mr. Hillier's machine.

A. Nelson, laborer, 37, one of two men who are said to have entered the room of Seymour Simons at 22 1/2 North Third street, yesterday morning after beating him up, robbed him of \$10 and a watch, was sent to jail for 30 days by Judge Rossman yesterday on a larceny charge.

Jack Mammel, logger, 28, said to have been Nelson's companion in the robbery, will have a hearing in the municipal court Monday.

The two were arrested by Patrolmen Sellinger and Horton on complaint of Simons. Simons, who is a machinist, is being held by the police as a witness against Mammel.

Ed J. Dalton, who, according to the police, confessed to the theft of a half dozen suits of clothes from the dressing rooms in the Hippodrome and Pantages theaters, was sentenced to 30 days in jail by Municipal Judge Rossman yesterday on a charge of larceny.

Dalton is a laborer and is said to have been employed in doing some work around the theater buildings. He was arrested at the Pantages theater.

Patrick O'Brien reported that his room in the New York hotel was entered and his trousers and \$40 in cash taken.

The police were told by William Borden, 1773 Derby street, Kenion, that he had been snugged and robbed of \$8 and a watch at Front and Nicolai streets.

The residence of Mrs. Miles Sutherland, 229 East Sixteenth street, was entered and a quantity of silverware and other articles taken.

Mrs. A. Reddaway, 67 Second street North, reported that her place was entered and three sacks of sugar and a 5-gallon can of alcohol taken, in addition to other articles.

OCEAN RAFTS LIKELY

Coast Lumber May Be Sent to
European Markets.

VANCOUVER, B. C.—Swedish lumbermen are on this coast investigating the possibility of rafting lumber from British Columbia to Europe. Lumber rafts of large size, called rafautes, have been successfully towed from Sweden to Great Britain. The Ocean Rafter syndicate of London, England, has sent William Olsson of Stockholm, an experienced rafaute builder here, to investigate the possibility of adapting that method to British Columbia timber exports. The rafautes are made of squared timbers.

Mr. Olsson, though expressing nothing definite, believes that the tremendous timbers of the British Columbia forests will make possible the construction and successful operation of rafautes far larger than the rafts now shipped out of the Baltic. Swedish structures carry four or five million feet each. It is proposed that the British Columbia rafts will contain fifteen to twenty million feet.

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CAR MEETING IS CALLED

Conference Called in Portland to
Discuss Shortage.

SALEM, Or., June 26.—(Special.)—The so-called terminal committee, appointed recently to handle the car shortage in Oregon will meet in Portland Tuesday, according to announcement made by the public service commission here today.

The session will be attended by Fred G. Buchtel, chairman of the commission, and the heads of practically all the railroads operating in Oregon. Chief discussion will center about the movement of cars and improved methods of distribution. The car shortage in Oregon is said to be serious and it is feared that sufficient carriers to move the fruit and berry crops will not be available.

Vancouver to Have Chautauqua.

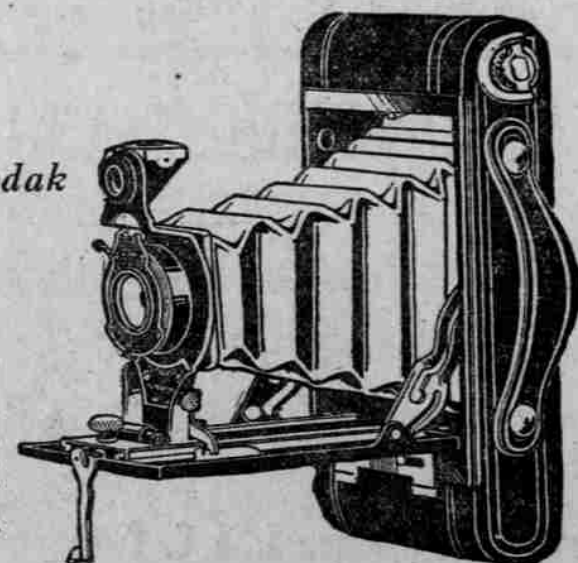
