# **CHURCH STEEPLE HIT**

Trees in Several Parts of City Are Slashed.

So far as known the policeman was the only one injured by the freakish storm, which was accompanied by an electrical display and intermittent showers of rain and hall.

The boit which struck the First Presbyterian church tore the slats from the roofing of the steeple and starfed a fire in the belfry. Patrol-man Martin recovered from his daze within a few moments and sent in a fire alarm as the smoke was rolling from the belfry of the church.

The damage to the building was estimated at \$250 to \$300. The fire

was extinguished before it had gained any great headway. The ladders of fire truck 3 were too short to reach the belfry, and H. B. Burrows, veteran caretaker of the church, led the firemen up the stairway into the interior of the steeple.




