LEAGUE VIOLATION SEEN

FRENCH ACTION AGAINST ARABS CAUSES COMMENT.

Situation in Syria Precipitated by France Arouses Great Anxiety in London.

LONDON, July 24.—(Special Cable.)—The situation in Syria, precipitated by the strong action taken by France, is causing great anxiety here, principally because of the possible effects on the whole middle east corridor. At the league of nations it was stated today that no protest had yet been received from Emir Feisal, but if such a protest is forthcoming it will be necessary for the council of the league to take some action.

What is more immediately concerning Great Britain is the possibility that war between France and the Arabs may cause a widespread conflagration which will involve Mesopotamia. The correspondent learns on high authority that the French government did not inform the British government that it intended to take the drastic action it has.

So long as the trouble is confined to the sphere of the French mandate it is considered improbable that the British will interfere in any way. What is complicating the matter is the impending visit to London of Paris of Emir Feisal, against whom the French are now arrayed.

The staunch supporters of the league of nations assert that France has violated the covenant of the league in precipitating war against the Arabs. France, it is said, is taking it upon herself to demonstrate that a mandatory power can by military means enforce its mandate regardless of the wishes of the people.

The situation between France and Syria formed the subject of questions in the House of Commons particularly with reference to the French ultimatum to Emir Feisal, as to which Andrew Bonar Law, the government leader, said it had not been submitted to the allied supreme council. The British and French governments, he added, are in communication on the matter.

SALMON CANNERY BURNED

Besides the cannery building and machinery, the flames consumed 6000 cases of sockeye salmon of this year's pack, \$15,000 worth of nets, the cannery store, the manager's residence and 30 or 40 houses occupied by Japanese workers.

The contents of the store, the manager's furniture and most of the belongings of the Japanese were saved. Manager Charles Trim estimates the loss at \$100,000, fully covered by insurance.

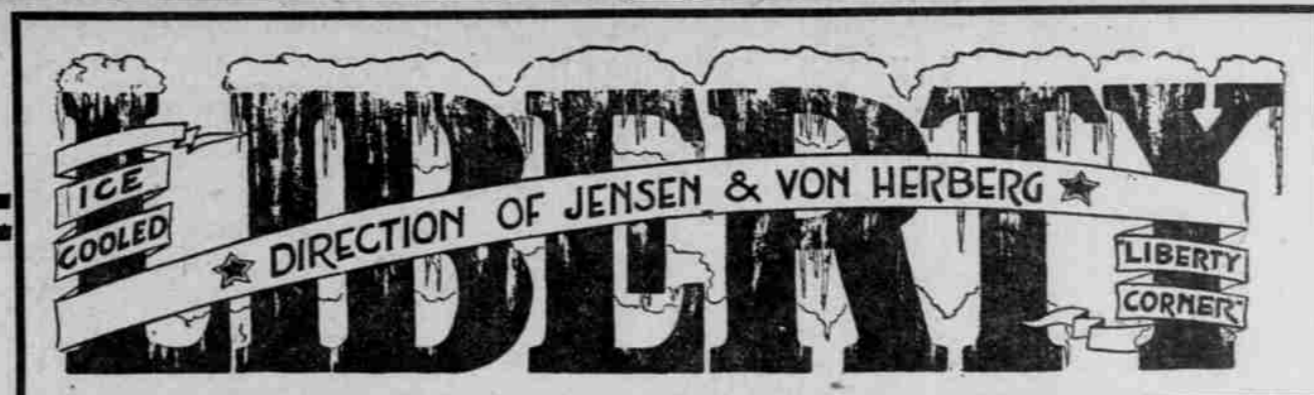

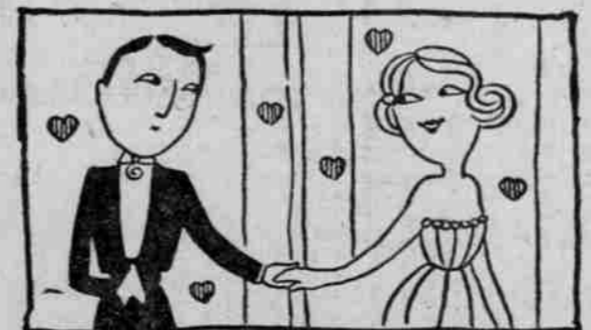
