

ANGELOS SLEEP PARKS; FEAR QUAKE

Southern Californians Suffer
"Terrible Fright."

PORTLAND WOMAN WRITES

Major Snyder Appeals to People to
Keep Quiet About Tremors,
Says Report.

With people sleeping out of doors, fearing earthquakes it is only right that everyone should know the "terrible fright" that residents of Los Angeles endured during the recent earthquake, according to a former Portland woman who has written to a friend here. She says the mayor of Los Angeles asked the public not to write about the tremor, but she believes people should be warned.

In her letter, which she began July 21, she says:

"I have had some thrills in this earthquake that I hope I shall never have to experience again, and last Friday we had three in one day and they are just like explosions. I am not exaggerating but when the last one came (we had one at 10:15 A. M., another at 11:15 and a third at 1:30 P. M.) I almost paralyzed me with fright. Really, I thought I would die on the spot, and it is a large office block, so nervous for about a week that at the slightest sound we would jump or be furiously frightened."

Vered on Earthquakes.

"Believe me, I can tell anyone all they want to know about earthquakes, and the company I am with has offices in one of the best buildings in Los Angeles, and I thought the whole thing was coming to a head, and I was just like a toy rattle."

She completed her letter July 26 and at that time wrote:

"We have had a few more quakes since I started this letter, and this morning at 4:15 A. M. we had a 'bummer' one. We felt it at our home in the suburbs and were awakened by it, as all the windows rattled and in Los Angeles they said it was like a cannon exploding. You haven't any idea the terrible noise these quakes make, roaring and rumbling just like distant thunder, then coming nearer, it roars and crashes with a sharp crack, and shakes everything for miles around."

"I am sorry to have to say all this, because we were so pleased with our move here, because it is so lovely and one can live out of doors so much and the flowers and other things are so attractive, but it spoils all the beauty here for me and mine by these horrible earthquakes."

Angelenos Badly Frightened.

"Those having large and small interests here laugh it away, but just the same they don't like it either, and Los Angeles and vicinity has had a pretty bad fright for the past six weeks."

"Many tourists rushed away again and are trying to get out as fast as they can, and the natives here and residents feel badly about it and the mayor has asked the general public not to write to the newspapers and relatives about it, but I say it is right to let others know, and I will tell my friends so that they may be assured the terror was not a dream."

"I will tell you this, if I hadn't had any one here I would have gone out on the first train. Now I will give you a chance to tell about the storm. We read about it and other natives here said, 'now do you want to go back to Portland.'"

"Yes, I saw a Portland storm any day to Los Angeles earthquakes. Last night the people finished their sleep in the park, afraid to go back into their homes."

PORTLAND FINANCES GROW

JULY CLEARINGS 22 PER CENT
GREATER THAN YEAR AGO.

Building Permits Double Previous
Figure—All Comparisons
Give Large Gains.

Growth of Portland along financial and building lines during the past year is clearly shown in a comparison of the bank clearings and building permits in July, 1920, totaled yesterday, with similar figures for July, 1919.

The comparison shows that bank clearings in July this year were over 22 per cent greater than a year ago, while the value of building permits was nearly doubled this July over last.

The figures are as follows:

Yesterday was the last day of the month, and all comparisons show substantial gain over the corresponding periods a year ago. The last week in July last year had bank clearings totaling \$2,892,221.53, as compared with a figure for the last week in July this year of \$5,760,924.12. The last day in June last year had bank clearings of \$4,421,479.32, while the total for the last day in July this year was \$10,959,613.22.

CITY FIGHTS EARWIGS

PARIS GREEN CREWS BEGIN
SPRAYING IN WALNUT PARK.

Vast Numbers of Pest in Newport.
R. L. in 1911—Seattle Had
Colony in 1915.

The city is now fighting earwigs.

Upon instruction from the city council, issued at a meeting held yesterday, Park Superintendent Keyser detailed a gang of men to the Walnut park district with Paris green spray, and it is believed that within a few days the pests which have been destroying vegetation in the district and annoying the residents of Walnut park will be eradicated.

According to the United States department of agriculture, the earwig is found all over Europe, but is seldom present in extreme numbers. The earwig was first noted in Newport, R. I., in 1911, and is now present there in vast numbers. While it is not considered of great economic importance in Europe, it has increased so rapidly in Newport that it has become a se-

MINISTER HELD IN JAIL

MISSIONARY TELLS EXPERIENCE IN TURKISH PRISON.

Rev. W. S. Nelson to Occupy Pulpit of Mizpah Presbyterian Church Today.

Life in a war-time prison in Constantinople holds no pleasures for those so unfortunate as to be incarcerated, according to Rev. W. S. Nelson, Presbyterian missionary from Tripoli, Syria, who is in the city for a week or more. Rev. Mr. Nelson knows, for he passed three and a half months there when the Turks arrested him as a spy suspect.

The missionary speaks today at Mizpah Presbyterian church and will go on to California next Friday. He has lived the past 25 years in Syria, being stationed 50 miles north of Beirut. With C. A. Dana of Montana, he had been doing relief work during the war and was accused of being an allied spy. The two men were taken to Constantinople and lodged on the second floor of the jail there. Down in the basement were the Christians, and the Christians could be heard clanking and often the sound of the bastinado when the men became fractious.

"Many of the prisoners on the second floor," said Rev. Nelson, "were British aviators. Rations were issued to them, but they were given out of the back of a straw. I used to refuse my share, but later took the food and gave it to the guards, who soon became friendly. They were simple fellows who had no more use for Turkish money than I have."

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BOY, 14, RESCUES TWO

LITTLE SISTER IS LATEST TO BE SAVED FROM DROWNING.

William J. Prendergast Jr. Gets Credit for Pulling Lad From Water at Milwaukie.

Two lives saved from possible drowning during the past month is the record of William J. Prendergast Jr., 14-year-old son of W. J. Prendergast, 335 Killingsworth avenue, whose latest exploit was the rescue of his 10-year-old sister, Elizabeth, from the tide at Newport, Or., last Friday.

The first was at a picnic at Milwaukie July 2, when he had saved a companion from the water. The boy, whose hobby is Boy Scout work, has made quite a study of rescue work and is at home in the water. After pulling his companion from the water at Milwaukie he carefully laid the boy out and immediately applied first-aid restoration methods.

ASTORIA MILK REDUCED

Material Reduction in Prices to Go Into Effect Today.

ASTORIA, Or., July 31.—(Special).—A new schedule effective tomorrow of milk prices will be a material reduction from the rates now charged. Under the new schedule the retail price for milk by the month will be \$3.50 a quart, a reduction from \$4.75, while the price for pints will be \$2.

This plan is a boon to the dairyman's league to encourage the greater production of milk. The dairyman has been the price to the dealers and the dealers, in turn, have reduced their percentage of profit thus giving the consumers the benefit of the double cut. How long the new rates will be in effect is not known, but they will probably continue until the winter feeding of stock begins.

WOOD PRODUCTS COMPANY DECIDES TO PUT UP OWN BUILDING.

ALBANY, Or., July 31.—(Special).—The Alco Wood products company, which lost its entire plant in a fire here last Wednesday evening, will rebuild. That decision has been reached by the stockholders.

The plant will be in a new location, however. The owner of the building in which the plant was located has decided not to rebuild so the company will erect a building of its own. Locations for this building are being considered now.

William MacMaster Returns.

After several months abroad, William MacMaster, well known in city financial circles, arrived in Portland yesterday morning. During his absence Mr. MacMaster divided his time between England, Ireland and Scotland, returning home via New York and Chicago. He has been gone since last March.

INDIANS SLAUGHTER DEER

Game Warden at Bend Engaged in Running Down Law Violators.

BEND, Or., July 31.—(Special).—Wild Peter and Young Boies, Warm Spring Indians, disregarded the game laws and have been engaged in slaughtering deer in a flourishing way in deer skins, according to District Game Warden McDonald, and J. J. Craig from state game service headquarters, who is assisting the district chief in running down law violators in the central Oregon country.

Both Peter and Boies pleaded guilty to the charge of killing deer out of season and each paid a fine of \$25. "Injun" Moody, alleged to be included in the buckskin business, is expected to plead guilty in the week his squaw having vouched for his appearance.

Mr. McDonald reported finding an Indian camping ground where abundant evidence in the form of venison refuse, hoof and scraps of hide indicated that a wholesale slaughter of deer, regardless of sex or season, had been carried on.

Convention at Gardiner Closed by Address by Mrs. Hannon.

Steps Toward Permanent Association Taken in Clackamas.

As a preliminary to the founding of a permanent association, Clackamas county pioneers gathered at the Clackamas county fairgrounds at Clackamas, where Harvey Cross was elected chairman and Mrs. Mary Barlow Wilkins was made secretary to serve until the organization is perfected. Mr. Himes spoke at the meeting, telling of the importance of counties organizing so

that they may contribute interest to state work in collecting valuable history. He said that Clackamas county is replete with historic interest and many pioneer families are established there.
