MALARIA CRIPPLES MANY

5,000,000 PERSONS SUBJECT TO RAVAGES OF DISEASE.

Report Is Made by Expert Who Describes Fight to Combat Germ-Carrying Mosquito.

NEW YORK.—Eight hundred million people living in the world's "malaria zone," which practically coincides with the tropical and semi-tropical regions of the earth, are subject to the "crippling and deadly influence of that disease," according to George E. Vincent, president of the Rockefeller foundation. Residents of the southern part of the United States, Mexico, Central America, the West Indies and the northern part of South America are included in this "malaria belt" said Vincent.

WEARING APPAREL RUGS, CARPETS AND HANGINGS CLEANED OR DYED

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Mr. Vincent, who today issued the second of a series of reviews on the foundation's work against malaria and hookworm for the year 1919. Practical methods for fighting malaria, as used by the foundation's sanitarians, include elimination of the germ carrying anopheles mosquito by preventing its breeding; the screening of houses against this mosquito, and the use of quinine to sterilize the blood of human malaria carriers.

"Public funds are a necessity in the control of malaria as well as hookworm," the review continues. "and are now being appropriated faster than sanitarians can be found to do the work."

"Hookworm control has proved a most successful means of convincing communities that health is a purchasable thing, and during 1919 control measures were carried on in 25 different states and countries, with a general tendency toward a reduction in the prevalence and intensity of the infection; more efficient and more widespread sanitation, and the education of communities in the possibilities of general health policies."

Hotel Adds 500 Rooms.
TORONTO, Ontario.—The King Edward hotel has awarded a contract for a 500-room extension to cost \$2,000,000. The hotel when completed will be as large as the Biltmore, New York.

FURS AND MYSTERY

Those who have followed this series of exposures from week to week have read of many substitutions that are perpetrated by conscienceless dealers in furs, and how many skins are "expanded" by various ingenious methods. In fact, we've found enough misdirected ingenuity has been expended to bounteously supply a nation, if only directed along legitimate channels.

Now in just such an apparently small thing as dyeing, for instance, we find that, instead of using the tried and true, he has worked out a quicker and cheaper method which so far as wearing is concerned all but ruins the skins on which it is used, though to the average purchaser it looks nearly as good as the real thing, and can rarely be detected until the furs have actually been in use for some little time.

The old French system of dyeing requires a rather costly fluid that has never been excelled for the good effect it has on both the fur and the skin, and the permanent luster it gives to the finished product. Whereas the get-the-money-on-low-price-alone system really eats the life from the fur and skin, leaving it without luster from the very beginning.

This, then, adds but another thing to the growing list of prospective fur purchaser must avoid. If the dealer you patronize is not of thoroughly established repute, you are first to try and determine whether the piece you are offered is really the kind of fur it is professed to be. Next you must make sure the skins are natural size, and not conveniently expanded. Then comes the task of making sure the fur has been properly dyed, if it is a dyed piece, and most furs are. Next, whether the skins are of proper grade, even though they are genuine. And finally you must make sure that the price is right by comparing the offering with that of a legitimate dealer.
