New York Police Band Makes Thousands Happy.

Organization of Efficient Musicians Accomplish Wonders by Hard Work—Famous Cornetist Is Selected Permanent Conductor.

NEW YORK, July 31.—(Special.)—If the spring time turns men's thoughts to fancy and to love, surely summer turns these same men to thoughts of music, and New York is supplied from all quarters. With all the parks in use and with Columbia university as the center of attraction tri-weekly, it is due the New York police band to say that its great musical strides have been the subject for wonder and praise from all who appreciate the dissemination of music.

Eighteen years ago this band was organized by a few members of the force and it was regarded as a joke among their superior officers, fellow policemen and indeed, the public at large. But the years of hard work and of sturdy determination have told and the New York police band is now a musical body of which any city might be proud. Following the work accomplished by Edwin Franko Goldman last summer the band selected as permanent conductor Walter B. Rogers, the famous cornetist, whose wide experience as bandmaster, reputation and thorough musicianship have made him an ideal man for the position.

Last summer this extraordinary body of musicians presented 30 concerts in the various parks and recreation spots of Greater New York, but greatest of all was the joy which it has brought into the lives of thousands of the poorest people who were made to realize that they were not forgotten. At one time this body of men would play for them in school, then in a park, then in an institution like the house of refuge, then in a hospital and then in a home for the feeble-minded children, not to mention the war charities or drives. All this, indeed, with no expense to the city, seems remarkable and shows what a great need there is to keep a municipal band at work so that music of this sort need not cease when summer music is over.

City Chamberlain Philip Berolzheimer, who has charge of Mayor Hylan's people concerts, is an enthusiastic musician and has lent a remarkable spirit to the uplift of anything that has to do with music for the masses. To Mayor John P. Hylan great credit is due for his desire to give the people all the music that can be allotted to them and he has given his personal time and attention to all music that has to do with the people. It is also fortunate that the present police commissioner allows the band time for necessary rehearsals considering that each man does regular police service.

Rothwell Attracts Thousands.

The management of the stadium concerts has inaugurated a "gala night" each week but almost every night when Walter Henry Rothwell conducts it may be so regarded because his readings in themselves are masterpieces and the most valuable lessons that can be offered to any music lovers, music students or professionals of the highest caliber.

General Coleman Du Pont added himself last week to the underwriters of the concert, contributing \$500 which was significant of the place that these concerts have already made for themselves. Already those to contribute include Adolph Lewisohn, Mrs. Cornelius Vanderbilt, Mrs. Harry Payne Whitney, John D. Rockefeller Jr., James Speyer, Mrs. Willard D. Straight, Mrs. Edward S. Marcella Craft Brilliant.

The week just past has had many sensational events, not the least impressive of which was the presence of Marcella Craft in the stadium. When the brilliant operatic artist who will be heard next season with the Chicago Opera association sang "The Blue Danube Waltz" that Johann Strauss himself might have envied. It was obvious that one must have lived it to be able to find the Viennese characteristics as Mr. Rothwell found them. Born of an English father in London, the conductor was taken early in his life to Vienna and there received all his musical training and he was a great career there, his operatic and concert experience having been gained at the side of Gustav Mahler.

Mr. Rothwell further delighted the present by the most impressive performance of "Star-Spangled Banner" prior to the programme of the evening.

NEW HOTEL IS PROPOSED

North Bend Men Determined to Have Modern Tavern.

NORTH BEND, Or., July 31.—(Special.)—Again the determination to have a modern hotel in this city is taking shape, after numerous failures to finance the project. The latest site to be discussed is the corner of Sherman and Virginia avenues, the main business corner of the city.

To forward the scheme a gathering of business men was held during the past week, and many details were discussed at length, but no definite statement was made, it being the disposition of the men endorsing the move to wait until everything is in hand before giving out a statement.
