

RUSSIANS WITHIN 22 MILES OF WARSAW

Flashes of Artillery Can Be Seen Against Clouds.

POLES CLAIM VICTORY

Reds Declared to Have Been Repulsed but Cavalry Still Is Advancing on Vistula.

WARSAW, Aug. 14.—(By the Associated Press.)—The Russians attacking Warsaw have worked well toward the rear of that city's defenses and are attacking Plońsk, within a dozen miles of the Vistula, northwest of the Polish line, according to Friday night's official Polish communiqué. The statement says the enemy is advancing toward the Novo Georvick-zegje sector, north of Warsaw, and that masses of bolsheviks are attacking Nasielsk (22 miles northwest of Warsaw) and Plońsk (32 miles northwest of Warsaw). The communiqué announces that the attacks on these places were repulsed.

Flashes of Guns Visible. The front is gradually being brought nearer Warsaw. Before Saturday's dawn, artillery flashes were visible against the clouds to the north and northeast and at times cannon could be heard.

People watch the flashes from high buildings. Today's communiqué concedes that the Poles withdrew further in the center, asserting it was to regroup soldiers who have fallen back on the defense lines less than 13 kilometers out.

But even more serious, according to observers, is the situation to the northwest, where 2000 red cavalrymen are making rapid progress toward the Vistula. The cavalry's right flank, which follows the right wing of the Russian frontier, has been reinforced by infantry, who have requisitioned peasants' horses.

Poles Are Confident. Poles say there is no chance of the bolsheviks crossing the Vistula, as the Russians have been doing for 200 years in taking Warsaw from the west, and that all precautions have been taken.

It is estimated it will require several days before the reds from the northwest reach the river. Meanwhile, newspapers continue to claim that a counter-stroke will come. The Russians have brought up artillery in the region of Radzymin, just south of the Bug. Observers say, however, that the enemy has not yet in position guns heavy enough to reach this city with their fire.

POLES OFF TO CONFERENCE

Party, With Associated Press Correspondent, Leaves Warsaw.

WARSAW, Aug. 14.—(By the Associated Press.)—Polish peace delegates who are to meet bolshevik representatives to discuss an armistice and peace left at dawn today for Minsk. Automobiles carrying the delegates streamed out of the capital. They are scheduled to pass the frontier east of Siedlce before 7 o'clock to meet bolshevik officers who will conduct them to Minsk.

Some delegates have not been to bed for two nights. A night's preparation, with conferences, preceded the start.

Considerable baggage was taken in addition to the records and reference books.

General Listowski heads the military experts while among the delegates is Stanislas Grabzki, national democratic leader, and Nobert Barlicki, socialist leader.

M. Dombrowski, who heads the delegates, is a peasant leader. The party left Warsaw, led by three Polish officers in an army automobile, which saw service in France. Three new staffs around which were wrapped white flags, could be seen beside the chauffeur. On the hood was a teddy bear.

A correspondent of the Associated Press accompanied the party.

REDS CAPTURE SOLDAT

Poles Declared to Be in Retreat to Northwest; City Little Hurt.

BERLIN, Aug. 14.—(By the Associated Press.)—Russian bolshevik forces captured Soldau, on the Warsaw-Danzig railroad, about 15 miles northwest of Miaw, Friday night, it was learned today. The city was only slightly damaged.

Poles are reported to be retreating to the northwest.

RED LINE HELD TOO THIN

Expert Believes Bolsheviki Are Exposed of Counter Attack.

PARIS, Aug. 14.—Russian bolshevik generals are carrying out an extraordinarily daring maneuver on the fronts to the north and east of Warsaw, according to Professor Vidou, a military writer who has telegraphed from Warsaw.

The soviet forces are trying to move further westward, probably toward Plońsk, so as to take Warsaw

in the rear, but in so doing they are lengthening their whole front from the Vistula to the Prussian frontier. Professor Vidou declares that this movement exposes the bolshevik line to a counter offensive that might easily pierce it.

STRANGE ISLES VISITED

Physician Is First White Woman in Some South Sea Islands.

HONOLULU, T. H., Aug. 14.—(Special.)—Probably the only American woman who has visited every charted island in the South Seas is Dr. Grace Peckham Murray who for 30 years practiced medicine in New York and for the past three years has been in the islands of the Pacific. During her three years' stay in the South Seas Dr. Murray visited islands upon which a white woman had never set foot before. In the Trowbrian islands the native women who had never seen a white woman made much of her, fingering her clothing and skin. She is on her way home and passed through here today.

700 FARMERS ON PICNIC

Addresses and Other Features Entertain Large Gathering.

ABERDEEN, Wash., Aug. 14.—(Special.)—Aberdeen, Hoquiam, Montesano, Bonna, and other county towns turned out big delegations to the annual farmers' picnic of the county, which was held at Schafer's grove, near Satsop. The total attendance at the picnic was in the neighborhood of 700. O. L. Walker, vice-president of the State college at Pullman, Miss Maude Wilson, state home demonstration leader, and Groundwater of the Elma Community association, P. M. Hall of the Montesano chamber of commerce and John J. Gurney of the Aberdeen chamber, were the chief speakers.

Grand Army Has Picnic

ABERDEEN, Wash., Aug. 14.—(Special.)—The annual picnic of the Grand Army of the Republic, Woman's Relief Corps and Ladies of the Grand Army was held at Electric park Thursday. More than 100 veterans and members of their families attended. Addresses were delivered by C. P. L. Roberts, commander of the Aberdeen post, Grand Army of the Republic and by Comrade Cragin of Hoquiam. The fifth annual reunion of veterans of the county will be held in Montesano September 1.

Lumber Mill Destroyed

CHEHALIS, Wash., Aug. 14.—(Special.)—Entailing a loss of \$20,000, the sawmill at Lacamas, 20 miles south-east of this city, was burned Friday. Lumber burned total \$20,000 feet. A fire that spread into the woods as a result of the burning of the mill has been kept in check thus far.

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WASTE PUT UP TO COX

WILSON ADMINISTRATION IS DECLARED PROBLEM.

Chairman of House Appropriations Committee Avers Party Policy Must Be Explained.

CHICAGO, Aug. 14.—(Special.)—James W. Good, chairman of the house appropriations committee in charge of speakers' bureau at republican headquarters here, today is declaring that Mr. Cox is seeking to dodge the "wanton waste" and "criminal extravagance" of the Wilson administration, said the democratic candidate would not be allowed to dodge it. Not only Wilson's league but the "maladministration of finances" by the democratic party will be issues, asserted Mr. Good.

"Neither parties nor men make political issues," said Mr. Good. "They but formulate the issues. Unquestionably the league of nations as presented by the president will continue to be one of the big issues in the campaign, but there are other issues on the minds of a great many of our people. The issue of waste and extravagance of the Wilson administration are paramount issues. Mr. Cox is attempting to evade these issues and the responsibility of his party for the mismanagement of government's affairs. The people are feeling the burden of heavy taxes. They know that during the last three years they have paid into the treasury in taxes and the purchase of government bonds more than \$40,000,000,000. Mr. Cox will be called upon either to repudiate the wanton waste and extravagance or to explain or justify it."

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
