

TENNESSEE HOUSE TO DECIDE SUFFRAGE

Speaker Walker Takes Stand Against Ratification.

ONLY OWN VIEW GIVEN

"Surrender of Honest Convictions to Political Harmony" Is Refused President.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Aug. 14.—Both sides in the suffrage fight before the Tennessee legislature were confident as they awaited renewal of the contest next week. Though the senate ratified Friday, the hardest test is to come in the house.

Speaker S. Walker, replying today to a message from President Wilson expressing hope that the house would ratify, telegraphed that the president was "too great to ask it" and he did not believe the men of Tennessee would "surrender honest convictions for political expediency or harmony."

Neither house was in session today. The house will reconvene Monday afternoon, but house leaders considered a vote then impossible.

Committee Meets Monday.

Replying to the charges made during debate yesterday by Senator Chandler, republican, and suffrage opponent, that she had advocated intermarriage between whites and negroes, Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, president of the National Woman Suffrage association, last night, in a formal statement characterized it as "an absolute fabrication."

Mr. Walker, who is house leader of the opposition, told the president he spoke for himself alone. The house committee in charge of the suffrage resolution is to meet Monday night and a report is expected Tuesday.

Opposition Claims Majority.

Several opposition leaders said today they were certain of a slight majority, but suffrage advocates still stood by their poll of from 53 to 60. Fifty votes are necessary.

Senator McKellar declared the amendment would be ratified.

Miss Sue White, Tennessee state chairman of the national woman's party, however, was not so optimistic. "Our foes are not yet finally defeated," she said.

Telegrams expressing delight at the victory in the senate continued

to reach headquarters of suffrage organizations.

HAYS' SUFFRAGE PLEA DENIED

Connecticut Governor Stands by Original Decision.

HARTFORD, Conn., Aug. 14.—Governor H. M. Holcomb has notified Will H. Hays, chairman of the republican national committee, that he will not call a special session of the Connecticut legislature to act on suffrage.

The letter said: "Your letter reached me two days after I had read it in substance in the Hartford Times, leading democratic newspaper of Connecticut, and after it had appeared in the New York papers. I assume this prior publicity seemed desirable."

I received your letter of October 31, 1919, relating to a special session and answered it November 4 stating there would be no special session to act on the woman suffrage question. I presume you overlooked or had forgotten my reply.

I have given at least four hearings on applications to call a special session and have stated my reasons for refusing. I have not changed my conclusions. I may call a special legislative session a small price to pay for clearing the political atmosphere. The provisions of our constitution which I have sworn to support are too great a price to pay. I shall not call a special session."

WAREHOUSE IS BURNED

Lebanon Blaze Does \$2000 Damage, With No Insurance.

LEBANON, Or., Aug. 14.—(Special.)—The Krieger & Higgins warehouse, located in the railroad yards of this city, was completely destroyed last evening by fire which is supposed to have started from sparks.

By good work of the local fire department, other warehouses and a large amount of lumber piled near the planer was saved. The big yard near the depot, was several times on fire.

The hot day and the northwest wind placed the whole business section of the city in a line with the fire. It looked for a time as though the firemen would not be able to confine the fire to the one building. The loss is about \$2000, with no insurance.

NON-PARTISANS TO WAIT

Legislators Prefer to See Who Will Get Nominations.

CENTRALIA, Wash., Aug. 14.—(Special.)—Non-partisan leagues of Lewis county will await the nominating of candidates by the farmer-labor party before endorsing candidates for county offices. It was decided at a meeting of the league held at Port Townsend last night, that the candidates of the third party are acceptable to the league, they will receive its endorsement. If not, the league will endorse candidates on either the republican or democratic tickets.

REPUBLICAN RANKS RAIDED BY RADICALS

Complete Legislative Ticket Filed at Spokane.

OFFICE CLOSING DELAYED

Legal Complications Avoided by Allowing Filings to Continue Two Hours After Time.

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 14.—(Special.)—The promised raid of the farmer's non-partisan league, the workers' non-partisan league and the railway men's welfare league on the republican party in Spokane county assumed material form shortly before noon today when a complete legislative ticket was filed with the county auditor in support of the political elements mentioned.

On the advice of Chief Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Meyer the auditor's office was kept open for filings two hours after the time previously announced. The county offices close at noon on Saturdays as a usual thing, but the county's legal adviser thought possible legal complications might be avoided by extending the closing hour on this occasion.

Another feature of late-hour filings was the entry of an incomplete democratic ticket into the primary contests. In most cases the democratic aspirants for office will be unopposed in the primaries. The non-partisan legislative ticket which filed in the republican race for the lower house is as follows:

"Idaho Teacher" to Be Publication of 48 Pages.

LEWISTON, Idaho, Aug. 14.—(Special.)—President O. M. Elliott of the State Normal school, has announced the personnel of the editorial staff of the "Idaho Teacher," the state educational journal for the coming year. The journal is a 48-page monthly devoted to the interests of education in Idaho, and is published under the auspices of the State Teachers' association.

President Elliott is chairman of the executive committee of the association, which makes the staff appointments.

IMMENSE CROP EXPECTED

Spokane County Figures on Thousands of Boxes of Apples.

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 14.—(Special.)—Announcing estimates of the 1920 crop today, leading apple producers and shippers of Spokane county predicted considerable increase in the tonnage this year over 1919.

The Arcadia orchards district near Deer Park will produce a crop of 300,000 boxes, or about 500 cars, according to an estimate made by the Arcadia Orchards company. The orchards comprise more than 4000 acres.

The Palouse corporation, owning and operating 1700 acres of apple orchards in the Fairfield, Waverly and Meadow lake sections, is expecting a crop of 200,000 boxes, or about 330 cars.

The Spokane Valley Growers union which shipped 265 cars last year, is planning on 400 cars this season.

CYCLIST HURT IN CRASH

Collision With Auto Results in Injuries to Two Men.

Mike Dorris, 29, of First and Madison street, and Aleck Petrovoff, 23, of 223 1/2 First street, were injured yesterday afternoon when their motorcycle collided with an automobile driven by R. E. The motorcycle was thrown down by the impact and both men sustained injuries to their legs. They were treated at the police emergency hospital.

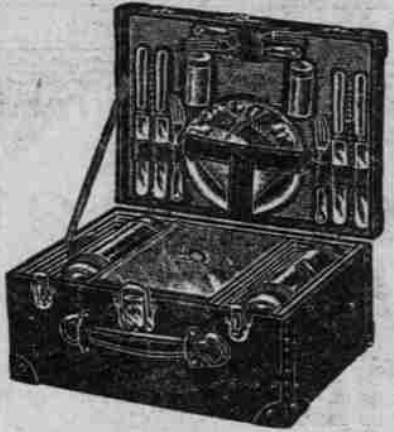

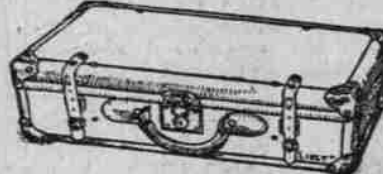
