

ROUMANIAN PRINCE DUE IN CITY TODAY

Heir-Apparent Accompanied
by Retinue of 17.

EUROPE IS DESTINATION

Special Car to Stop Over in Port-
land Only 3 Hours Before
Going to Seattle.

Crown Prince Carol, heir to the throne of Roumania, largest of the Balkan countries, which underwent great sacrifices during the war to do its part in crushing Germany's dream of world conquest, is scheduled to arrive in Portland this morning, and will spend less than three hours here, according to news received by local Southern Pacific officials.

Prince Carol, according to the railroad dispatches, will arrive here at 7:30 A. M. today, on the second section of the Southern Pacific early morning train from San Francisco. He and his party will leave over the Great Northern for Seattle at 10 A. M. Tentative arrangements were made yesterday by officials of the Chamber of Commerce to take the prince on a drive about the city at 3:30 o'clock.

The Roumanian heir-apparent is traveling in a special car, 17 people being included in his party. He is on his way to Europe, after a visit to the orient, and will leave at once for Chicago, upon his arrival in Seattle. It is understood. The party arrived in San Francisco Thursday on the steamer Korea Maru.

Fought With Allies.

Roumania, the largest and most prosperous of the Balkan countries, played a heroic part in the late war, and Prince Carol has been on a tour around the world after having borne the burden of war leadership for over two years. The little country entered the war on the side of the allies August 27, 1916, and almost immediately afterwards was made the subject of one of the most violent and successful attacks made by Germany during the entire war. By December 5 of that year the country had been divided, the German army, the capital, Bucharest, taken, and vast quantities of loot carried back to Germany.

Roumanians Turn Tide.

The government remained intact, however, and the people of the country maintained their courage and ultimately had the joy of seeing the tide turn, the German hordes driven back and defeat and humiliation of the huns at last brought about.

Samuel Hill, prominent Pacific northwest railroad builder and capitalist, and friend of the crown prince, greeted the party on arrival in San Francisco, according to word received here yesterday, and who made definite news to that effect has been received. It is expected that he is making the trip north with Prince Carol.

CHILD IS DENIED MOTHER

HUSBAND SLAYER DECLARED
UNFIT TO HAVE LAD.

Guardian Allowed to Keep Boy
She Cared For While Mother
Was in Prison.

SHERIDAN, Or., Aug. 14.—(Special.)—Efforts of Mrs. Anna Booth Ross, recently paroled from the penitentiary where she was serving a sentence for the slaying of her husband, to obtain custody of her boy, Ernel Booth, aged 12, were unavailing this week when Judge Asa Robinson of the circuit court at Dallas denied her application on the grounds that she was not considered a proper person to care for the child.

At the time of Mrs. Ross' joint conviction with William Strasson—her name was Mrs. Booth then—for the murder of her husband, William Booth, near Williamson, October 3, 1915, the boy was placed under the guardianship of Mrs. Cal Harrington, who resides at Buell, in the Gooseneck district, eight miles southwest of here.

Last January Mrs. Booth was paroled, on April 1, married Claude O. Ross, also a paroled convict, who was employed here in a shoe shop. The marriage was in Vancouver, Wash. They then went to Turner, Or., to reside, and Mrs. Ross began her legal fight to obtain the custody of her child.

Judge Robinson declared Mrs. Harrington was entitled to retain the guardianship previously granted her as a reward for her services during the incarceration of Mrs. Ross at Salem.

I. W. W. RANKS DIVIDED

OFFICIALS ACCUSED OF USING
"DEFENSE" FUNDS.

Information for Two Raids at Seattle
Is Given Police by Dis-
granted Member.

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 14.—(Special.)—Names of all the "inside" officers of the I. W. W. in the Pacific northwest were in the hands of the Seattle police "red squad," following two raids this week, one on the Finlay hall, 636 Blaine boulevard.

The officers also discovered that the radicals are at war among themselves, charging their organizers and other officials with "double-crossing" them and with pocketing large funds raised for defense of prisoners in jail.

The raid tips were given by an ex-I. W. W. organizer, who declared most of the money collected went to officials and not to assist prisoners. He furnished the names of delegates assembled in Seattle to hold an I. W. W. convention and also places of meeting.

One charter, signed by Thomas Whitehead, national secretary-treasurer; John Burke, James Scott, J. J. McMurphy, John Korn, John Doyle and W. T. Fisher, was seized.

Indian Murderer Executed.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Aug. 14.—Vac Tobay, full-blood Choctaw Indian and a native of Oklahoma, was electrocuted today for the murder of C. C. Smith near Springdale, Ark., last May. White Tobay was receiving the sentence last June he winked and smiled at the judge. Robbery was given as the motive.

ROOSEVELT COMING SOON

MR. COX' RUNNING MATE DUE
HERE SATURDAY.

Salem, Oregon City and Portland
to Hear Democratic Candidate
for Vice-Presidency.

Franklin D. Roosevelt, democratic nominee for vice-president, will address citizens of Portland at the auditorium Saturday evening, August 21. Mr. Roosevelt will arrive in Portland at 7:20 o'clock Saturday morning. He will be taken by automobile to Salem, where he will deliver a speech at noon. From Salem he will be conveyed by machine to Oregon City, where he will speak at 8 o'clock, and from that place he will return to Portland for his night address.

This arrangement was telegraphed to State Chairman Smith yesterday and is in conformity with the desires of the Oregon democratic leader. Originally the plan was to have Mr. Roosevelt speak in Portland at noon and then go to Salem for his night speech. The democratic managers protested. It is the purpose of a number of democrats to accompany Mr. Roosevelt to Salem and Oregon City, spending the day with him.

Mr. Roosevelt will leave Portland for San Francisco Sunday morning.

RUSSIA IS SPLIT 3 WAYS

SOVIET SUPPORT WAXES AS
ONE LEAVES MOSCOW.

In Remote Sections of Siberia Bol-
sheviki Admit Failure to Es-
tablish Their System.

TERIJOKI, Finland, Russian Frontier, Aug. 14.—(By the Associated Press.)—Development of the soviet government in Russia has been such that today the vast Russian territory is divided into three distinct sections in the attitude of the people toward bolshevism.

In a recent 4000-mile trip from Vladivostok to the Finnish border the Associated Press correspondent observed that soviet support diminishes with increasing distance from the capital at Moscow.

In the remote eastern section of

Siberia the bolsheviks admit failure to establish their system and are seeking to create a buffer state known as "the far eastern republic." Siberia proper, from Irkutsk to the Urals, where eight months ago bolshevism was welcomed as a relief from the Kolchak regime, is ready for another change to anything which will bring economic betterment. Proceeding westward the traveler finds European Russia like a great mobilized army in starvation circumstances and cursing the reds, yet executing their orders passively.

The apportionment of food as well as the relative proximity to the military headquarters apparently is a vital factor in maintaining soviet support. Everywhere through Siberia one hears stories that the peasants are refusing to plant their fields or raise stock because of repeated requisitions. From Samara, on the Volga, to Moscow, hundred of miles of wheat fields at the height of harvest late in July were filled with countless aged peasants, women and children. Many of the reapers were women and children who came from Moscow and Petrograd declaring they had been promised a share in the crops.

SCHOLARSHIP NOW OPEN

CHANCE TO GO TO OXFORD
AWAITS OREGON BOY.

Selection of Beneficiary of Rhodes
Fund to Be Made September
25, Says Secretary.

The Rhodes scholar from Oregon for 1921 to go to Oxford university, England, will be chosen September 25, when the selection committee meets here. C. H. Gray, secretary of the committee, has just announced.

Students in their junior or senior years or graduates of universities and colleges are eligible. Any student who wishes to become a candidate is asked to send his application to the president of his college. If he receives the appointment from his college or university he may then apply to the

committee. Applications should be addressed to Mr. Gray at Reed college and sent in before September 1.

President Campbell of the University of Oregon is chairman of the committee. Other members are Professor J. B. Harrison of the University of Washington, a former Rhodes scholar, and A. C. Newell, director of the Portland school board and president of the Oregon Civic League.

Paul T. Homan of Willamette university and Frank Hunt of Reed college are representing Oregon at present at Oxford. Stephenson Smith, a graduate of Reed college, will go to Oxford in the fall.

LOAFING HELD COSTLY

W. E. Humphrey Declares Bill for
Nation Is Billions.

ABERDEEN, Wash., Aug. 14.—(Special.)—W. E. Humphrey of Seattle, ex-representative in congress, addressed the Aberdeen Kiwanis club at a luncheon meeting yesterday noon and in the evening formally

launched the republican campaign in Grays Harbor county with an address in the Weir theater. "The High Cost of Loafing" was Mr. Humphrey's topic in the Kiwanis speech.

"Idleness resulting in under-production is the greatest crime of which Americans are now guilty," he declared. "Four hundred thousand men are now producing what 200,000 produced during the stirring days of the war. That should illustrate the nation's financial loss through lack of industrial efficiency and industry. Loafing has cost the nation \$9,000,000,000."

Elopers Arrested.

EUGENE, Or., Aug. 14.—(Special.)—Sherman Douglas, 31, eloped with Tessie Yingling, 15, of Springfield in an automobile a few days ago and was arrested at Klamath Falls yesterday, according to a telegram received by Sheriff Fred G.
