

NOMINATING METHOD UP TO REPUBLICANS

44 Idaho Counties to Be
Heard From Tuesday.

CONVENTION IS AUGUST 24

Conflicts on to Gain Control of
Delegates—Candidates Not Sure
of Forces to Be Counted On.

BOISE, Idaho, Aug. 14.—(Special.)—Republicans in 44 counties in this state will determine on next Tuesday just how the first state nominating convention is to be held in Idaho since 1908, at Pocatello August 24. The convention will name its congressional and state ticket. Under the amended law, August 17 is set as the date when the conventions of all political parties in the respective counties must be held to select their delegates to the state convention. Democratic county conventions will be held on the same date, but the interest is not directed toward the democrats at this particular time, because there do not appear to be conflicts over delegates on the part of aspirants for office. Such a situation is not true of the republican party. Every effort is being made by its several leading candidates to gain sufficient delegates in the state convention to control. It can be said now, however, that the county conventions on Tuesday will not instruct a majority of the delegates to the state convention for any candidate for senator, congressman, governor or other state office. The majority in that convention will be uninstructed delegates, who may enter into a series of combinations in order to nominate what they believe will be a winning ticket.

Senator and Governor In Contention. Candidates have had an opportunity to check up their forces, but if the truth were admitted it would be conceded the survey has been highly unsatisfactory. Relatively speaking, it is possible, to give an idea of the strength these candidates are likely to have when the state convention is called to order. The contest is to resolve entirely and almost exclusively around the senatorship and governor. If certain combinations and trades are made it may have some bearing on the representative, but that does not seem likely now.

It seems to be quite generally conceded by republican party leaders that Representative French will be renominated from the 1st congressional district and the Addison Smith will be renominated from the 2d congressional district; that present state officials will be renominated, as follows: Attorney General Black, Secretary of State Jones, State Auditor Gullett, Superintendent of Public Instruction Ethel E. Redfield.

Two Vacancies Remain. Two vacancies remain to be filled on the state ticket, state mine inspector and state treasurer. State Mine Inspector Bell will not be a candidate for renomination. He has held the office for many years and has decided to retire. There are two known candidates in the race for the nomination, W. V. Leonard of Boise and Stewart Campbell of Halley. State Treasurer Eagleson is not a candidate for renomination, but is in the gubernatorial contest. Captain Banks of Caldwell is among those actively contesting for the treasurership.

The senatorship is, of course, the hub around which the entire political and pre-convention situation is revolving. Frank R. Gooding, Colonel L. V. Patch and Captain A. H. Connor are the three leading contestants. Three other candidates in the running, C. W. Beale, Colonel R. G. Davis and Miles Cannon, are taking more of a secondary position, but if there is not a quick nomination of one of the first three named they will develop into decidedly important factors.

New Factor Enters. Gooding, because of the forcefulness of his campaigns in the past and present, is making a strong showing. He was defeated by Eugene at the general election two years ago, which is an argument that is being used with some effectiveness against him.

Colonel Patch and Captain Connor may be reviewed so far as their political strength is concerned, collectively. Considering them so, they represent the new and highly important factor in Idaho politics, the ex-service men's vote. Both saw service at the front and have excellent war records. With neither is it widely known as Gooding, they still have a big acquaintance over the state.

SAFETY IS DISCUSSED

Luncheon Spread for Officials of
Insurance Company.

Problems relative to safety propaganda and education were discussed at a luncheon given by the local branch of the National Safety Council in honor of Lew R. Palmer and Dr. Franklin C. Wells, both of New York, at the Chamber of Commerce yesterday.

Palmer is a member of the executive committee of the national council and director of safety and personnel of the Equitable Life Assurance society. Dr. Wells is medical director of the same company. These officials are making a tour of the Union Pacific lines in the interests of the safety movement. A mass meeting of employees of the Alhambra shops of the O.-W. R. & N. company was held Friday, at which Wells and Palmer spoke briefly on the safety movement, and R. N. Stockelager, superintendent of group insurance of the Equitable organization, made a short address.

Group insurance was adopted by the Union Pacific company two years ago, when a group policy insuring its 40,000 employees was taken out.

Portland Pastor on Visit. HOOD RIVER, Or., Aug. 14.—(Special.)—Rev. W. L. Van Nuy, former pastor of the Upper Valley Union church, who is now in charge of a Portland Presbyterian church, accompanied by his brother, Rev. E. A. Van Nuy, of Chicago, has been visiting friends and participating in recreation in the Upper valley. The Chicago minister is national secretary of men's work for the Presbyterian church.

MILK REPLY IS FILED

INJUNCTION DEFENDANTS AT-
TACK DAIRYMEN'S LEAGUE.

Nestle Food Products Co. Declares
Intention to Continue Un-
restricted Purchases.

Charges that the Oregon Dairymen's Co-operative league exists for only two motives—"to increase the price of milk to the consumers of the state of Oregon to the very highest possible point, regardless of the market price and regardless of competition," and to force the buyers of milk to purchase their milk solely from it, were contained in an affidavit filed in the circuit court yesterday by Frank S. Glass, representing the Nestle Food Products company, Inc., one of the defendants in injunction proceedings begun last week by the league.

The petition seeks to dissolve a restraining order issued by Circuit Judge Tucker last week by which 11 Portland dairies, Frank S. Glass, A. M. Work, manager of the Portland-Damascus Milk company, and C. M. Gregory were enjoined from publishing advertisements or circulating propaganda which it was claimed were intended to persuade members of the league to violate the terms of their contracts with the league. The defendants yesterday received an extension of time to August 20 in which to file their answer to the complaint.

Affidavits in support of the charge that the league, through its agents,

has used "coercive methods" and made "false and misleading statements" to persuade farmers to discontinue the sale of milk to the Nestle's company, signed by George Robinson, Eugenia Robinson, William Hankins, Peter Peterson, Fred Snyder, Oscar L. Chenoweth, Walter L. Toole, C. S. Magee, N. W. Olson and W. H. Hobson, were also attached to the petition.

In conclusion the affidavit stated that the Nestle's Food Products company, Inc., would continue to refuse to submit to the "dictation" of the league, would refuse to do business through or with the league or its officers, and would continue to purchase milk from persons who have milk to sell and pay for the same at the price agreed upon.

PIER BUILDERS STRIKE

Work on Astoria Port Terminals
Halted Temporarily.

ASTORIA, Or., Aug. 14.—(Special.)—All work on the construction of pier 2 at the Port terminals was stopped temporarily this morning when the laborers and carpenters, totaling about 125 men, struck, and the other employees were laid off. The trouble arose over the employment of George Geisendorfer as foreman. At the meeting of the union last night the foreman's application for membership was rejected on the ground that he had refused to join a strike at the Astoria Marine Iron Works several months ago.

This morning the union demanded that Geisendorfer be discharged, but Manager Marshall of the foundation company refused.

MISS HAUPT TO LECTURE

INDIAN LIFE TO BE THEME OF
TALKS AT CHURCH.

Washington Woman Contends Red
Men Entitled to Equal Chance
With White Brother.

Miss Hope Elizabeth Haupt of Washington, D. C., has just arrived in Portland and expects to deliver lectures here on Indian life, speaking at noon today at the First Methodist church. While in Oregon she recently visited the Smith river Indians, those in Coos and Clatsop counties, the Siletts and the Indian school at Chemawa. She is particularly pleased with the school and conditions on the Siletts reservation.

Miss Haupt is in Portland to present a congressional petition for signatures, asking that the Indian bureau be taken completely out of politics. She is interested in securing for the red man "an opportunity equal to that of his white brother."

In speaking of her visit to this state Miss Haupt says: "I found Chemawa the best conducted Indian school I have ever visited. The 600 Indian boys and girls there, representing many tribes, are the best mannered and hence the most delightfully interesting and charming young Indians I have ever met at any school."

She says of her visit to Siletts: "I found the Siletts wonderfully encouraging place. Edwin L. Chalcraft, who has been twice superintendent of Chemawa and also a skillful supervisor

over the whole Indian country, has been doing a wonderful work."

EXAMINATION CALL MADE

Fire Chief and Battalion Chief to
Be Named for Department.

The scope of the examinations call for chief of Portland's fire department and also battalion fire chief were announced yesterday. Both examinations are promotions and consist mainly of the filling of experience and reference papers. The experience statements must cover the extent of the education of the applicants, service in various ranks held in the fire department. In the case of both examinations, a physical test will be conducted.

The examination to fill the vacancy caused by the retirement of B. F. Dowell as fire chief will be held Tuesday, August 21, and the examination for battalion chief, limited to men who have served as captains in the fire bureau for five continuous years or more, will be held September 10.

Road Bonds to Be Sold.

ALBANY, Or., Aug. 14.—(Special.)—Linn county will offer \$50,000 worth of its road bonds for sale September 4, at 2 o'clock. This is part of the road bond issue of \$600,000 voted in June, 1919. Two hundred thousand dollars worth of these bonds have been sold.

Alleged Offender Released.

Andrew Kerstaff was dismissed in the federal court yesterday morning. He was charged with having liquor in his possession. The case was dropped for insufficient evidence.

Sports of All Kinds and an Exhibition for Firemen Is Scheduled on Programme.

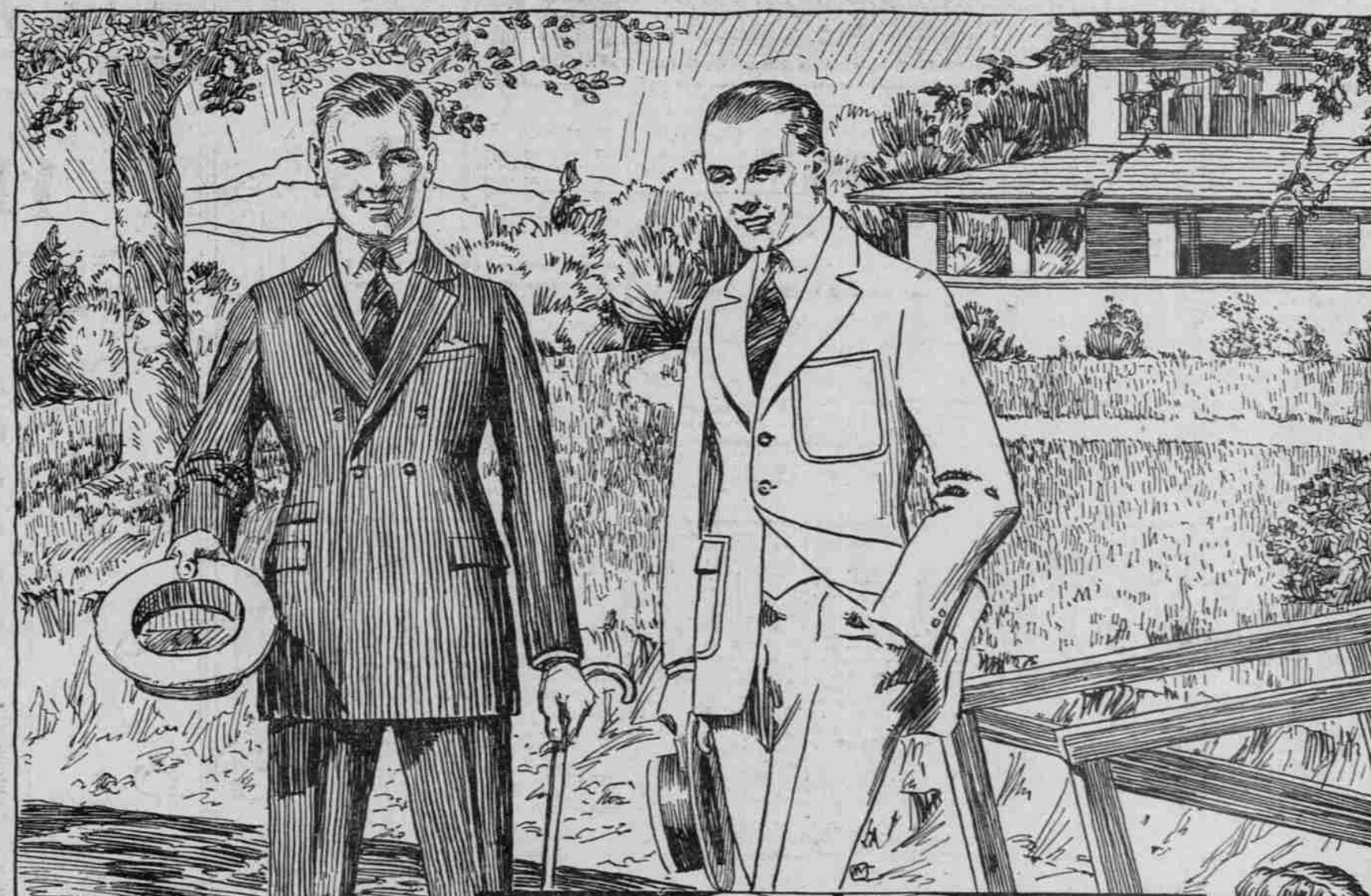
