The Portland Beavers won a double-header from Oakland yesterday at Coast league park and jumped two notches in the percentage table. Scores were 4-3 and 3-2.

Low Blue got back into uniform and it was his scorching triple to deep center, scoring two runs in the fourth, that paved the way for the Beavers' initial win. Cox belted Blue home with the winning run in the fifth. The Oaks hit Polson for 13 at-bats—Coxer bagging four hits in five official trips—while Kramer held the Beavers to six safe blows.

"Suds" Wins in Duel.

The second game, 3-2, developed into a pretty pitching duel between "Suds" Sutherland and Joe Boehling. Boehling seemed to have all the better of the argument until the eighth inning, when he struck a wild streak and let the locals cram three runs across the plate.

Sutherland won his own game by doubling past third base with bases full, scoring two runs and enabling Spranger to cross a momentum on Mabel's sacrifice fly.

Low Blue's hitting was a prime feature. Carl Spranger negotiated a sparkling fielding play in the ninth. It was another fine afternoon for the Beavers, who were looking for a home run to pack the well known vacation trunk. 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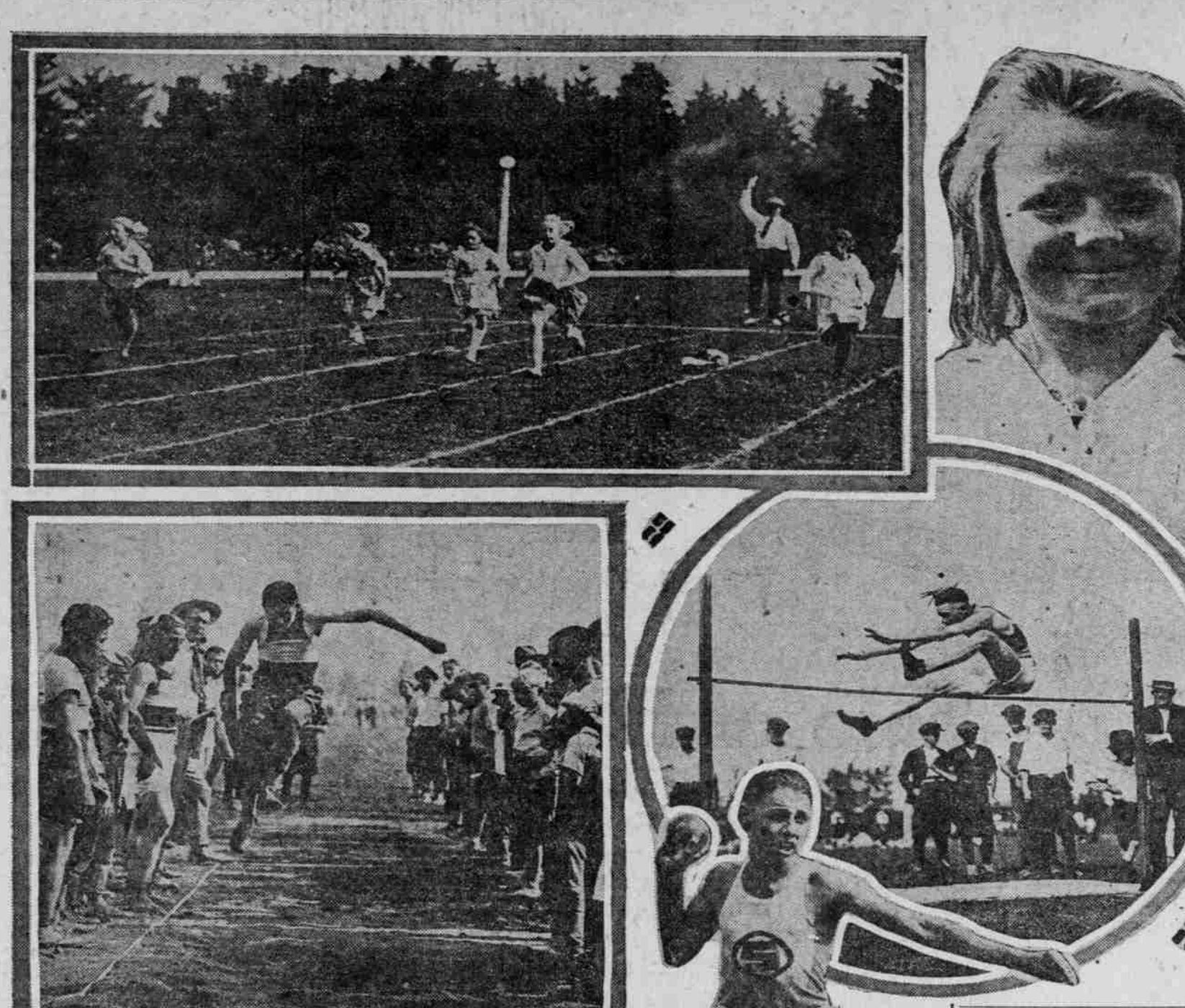
