

ROUND TRIP TICKET SALE STILL BRISK

Many Take Advantage of Rates Available.

ONE CONDITION IMPOSED

Trips Under Traffic Ruling Must Start Before Sept. 1—Little Complaint Is Heard.

Scores of nine-months round-trip tickets have been bought at the local consolidated ticket office of the railroads in the last three days, since the fact became known that transcontinental tickets could still be bought at the fares in effect prior to August 24. The sale of these tickets at the rates prevailing before the increase was not disturbed by the order, and tickets still may be purchased without change of price until Tuesday night.

There is one condition that must be complied with to make them effective for use within their long limit—the tickets must be used to start the trip before September 1. Thus local travel between Portland and near-by stations on the various railroads has been stimulated beyond the date of changing tariffs. As the support of the transportation effective of the old rates despite the increase of 20 per cent in railroad passenger tariffs, it is imperative that the trip be started before September 1.

Little Complaint Heard.
The majority of people who come to the ticket office accept the increased fares without any complaint or comment. General Agent Stinger of the consolidated ticket office yesterday. "While many persons have purchased the one-month tickets to eastern points, others have declined to buy when informed that they would have to start their trip not later than next Tuesday. Today a party of three came to buy tickets, and when told that it would be necessary to begin their journey within a few days remarked that they would wait until ready to start and pay the fare, as the railroads need the money."

"There seems to be about the usual volume of travel. There is a large amount of summer tourist travel passing through that makes it difficult to judge what effect, if any, may be attributed to the change in rates. So far as the man in the ticket office can judge, it is not influencing conditions. To be sure, there was an abnormal movement for a few days of people who advanced their dates in order to start before the new tariffs became effective."

Steamer Rates Go Up.
Steamship rates have also gone up or are to be advanced in accordance with the lift in railroad fares. The San Francisco & Portland Steamship company has announced that it will raise its rates between Portland and San Francisco 20 per cent, effective October 1. The first-class cabin fare will be advanced from \$24 to \$28.50. Other steamship companies have made corresponding advances in their rates. The McCormick line has increased its fare, including war tax, between Portland and San Francisco from \$21.50 to \$25.50; Los Angeles, from \$23.45 to \$27.45; San Diego, from \$23.34 to \$27.34.

MARKET MEN ARRESTED

EIGHT SALESMEN ACCUSED OF ANNOYING PUBLIC.

Ordinance Forbidding Crying of Wares Held Violated; All to Have Hearing Tomorrow.

As the result of a raid made on Yamhill street markets adjoining the public markets yesterday eight fruit and produce salesmen were arrested, charged with violating the ordinance by crying their wares.

Those arrested were Sam Renala, 273 Yamhill street; Morris Alaraz, 265 Yamhill street; Morris Alaraz, Second and Yamhill; H. Suwoi, Third and Yamhill; J. J. Benson, Fourth and Yamhill; M. Eastern, Third and Yamhill; Joe Jaidleor, Third and Yamhill; and E. Meneshe, Third and Yamhill.

The raid, conducted by Inspectors Morak, Abbott, Tichenor, Schum and Schuppius, came as a result of numerous complaints that salesmen were annoying the public.

All eight of the men arrested put up \$25 bail and will have a hearing in municipal court tomorrow.

VETERANS TO BUILD SOON

Legion Clubhouse at Vancouver to Cost About \$80,000.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Aug. 28.—(Special.)—The club house of the Smith-Reynolds post, American Legion, is to be built on the east plus plan, according to a decision reached at a meeting last night. The veterans have decided to start construction of the building as soon as possible and not wait until all of the bonds issued have been sold. M. Y. Teegarten has been appointed building supervisor and will be the purchasing agent.

The building is to cost about \$80,000 and will be on the block bounded by Thirteenth and Fourteenth streets and Broadway and C streets.

TREES KILLED BY COLD

Oaks, 100 Years Old, Succumb to Last Year's Zero Weather.

ALBANY, Or., Aug. 28.—(Special.)—That the 16-below-zero weather ex-

perienced in this section of the state last December was the coldest weather in this vicinity in more than a century is shown by the fact that some oak trees more than 100 years old were killed.

While the great majority of the oak trees in this section of the state survived the cold weather, it has been definitely established in the past few weeks that some were killed by the record-breaking temperature.

Weather records and the memories of old residents established the fact at the time that it was the coldest weather recorded here in at least 50 years, and the killing of the old oaks now establishes the fact that the mark reached in December is a record for a period twice that long.

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DR. BOUCHET PUT IN JAIL

Man Held on Murder Charge Is Removed From Hospital.

Dr. Norman Bouchet, who soon will face a jury on a charge of murder in the first degree, changed quarters yesterday, being moved from a local hospital to the county jail under heavy guard, his condition being such as to permit the transfer.

A guard had been stationed at Dr. Bouchet's bedside to prevent possible attempt to escape from the hospital. Deputy Sheriff Schirmer and Kendall escorted him to the county jail. Though still weak from his attempted suicide, Dr. Bouchet was able to walk. He is charged with the murder of Mrs. Ruth Richards on August 7.

ROAD PAVEMENT ASSURED

Bids for Dalles-Hood River Section to Be Let Soon.

THE DALLES, Or., Aug. 28.—(Special.)—According to a statement accredited to C. C. Kelly, assistant state highway engineer, who is now in the Columbia river highway from Hood River to The Dalles will be let this fall and the work of paving will commence early in the spring.

The programme calls for two years' work and time must be allowed for the present grading to settle before the paving is put on. The work of graveling the road between Mosier and The Dalles will start September 1. It is announced. The contract means an expenditure of \$700,000.

The exhibit will include registered stock from various sections of the state, many specimens of which will be sent to the middle west show at Chicago this fall and national show in New York.

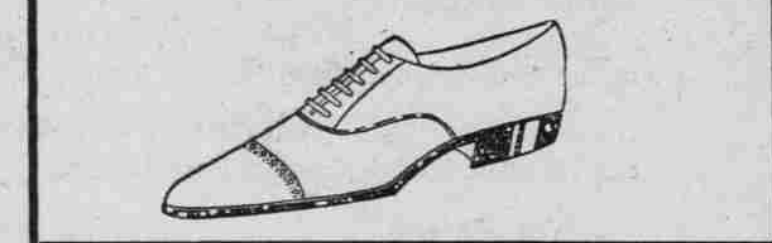

FIRE DEVICES USELESS

ELTON COURT GONG, HOSE AND ESCAPES RENDER NO AID.

Inspector Says Only Protection Is to Enclose All Vertical Openings in Buildings.

That the usual fire-protection devices in use in hotels, rooming and apartment houses are of little value is the statement of Building Inspector Plummer in a report completed yesterday, covering an investigation of the Elton Court fire, in which four lives were lost. Mr. Plummer says this fire demonstrated the impracticability of devices, such as automatic fire gongs, standpipes for hose and lights and signs for fire escape.

The Elton Court was provided with the various kinds of fire-protection devices required by the building code, says Mr. Plummer in his report. "As far as the usefulness of these devices was concerned it must be admitted that most of them might as well have been left out of the building. The reason for this ineffectiveness can be very easily accounted for by calling attention to the rapid spread of the fire, which made it difficult or impossible to get at the devices."

"For instance, take the standpipes and hose. The spread of the fire was so rapid that no one could get at the hose or standpipe to use them; again, in the case of the fire gongs, the spread of the fire was so rapid that the wires conducting the electricity to operate the system were injured, and when the switch in the basement was operated the gongs failed to ring."

"Again, in the case of the fire escapes lights and signs. These rendered no service for the reason that the corridors were so filled with smoke, fire and heat that occupants could not get to their rooms to use the fire escapes. The only person benefited by the fire escapes, in all probability, were the persons occupying rooms which opened directly upon the stairs. The seriousness of a fire of this kind, therefore, can be readily appreciated when it is seen that ordinary fire protection devices are of little use."

"The best means of preventing rapid spread of fire in a building is to enclose elevator shafts, stairs and other vertical openings in the floor construction of any kind of building. This protection can best be afforded by using partitions or walls of fire-proof materials. Enclosures of this kind will shut off the draft and after a fire is under way these enclosures will make it necessary for a fire, in communicating from one floor to another, to burn through the floor, which takes a considerable amount of time."

Tomorrow night (Monday) Miss Haupt will speak in the St. Helen's Methodist church on "Our Red and White Brothers." Plans are also being completed for a mass meeting of Portland children on September 5, when Miss Haupt will tell some Indian folk tales. Time and place for the meeting will be announced later.

The Whitney boys' chorus of 43 lads, ranging from 4 to 17 years, will give a concert this afternoon at 3 P. M. at the city auditorium, and open tomorrow night at 8 P. M. both free. The concerts will be under the auspices of the Portland Boy Scouts, the Y. M. C. A. and the local churches. These boys are returning to Seattle from an extended tour.

Permit to Sell Assets Asked.

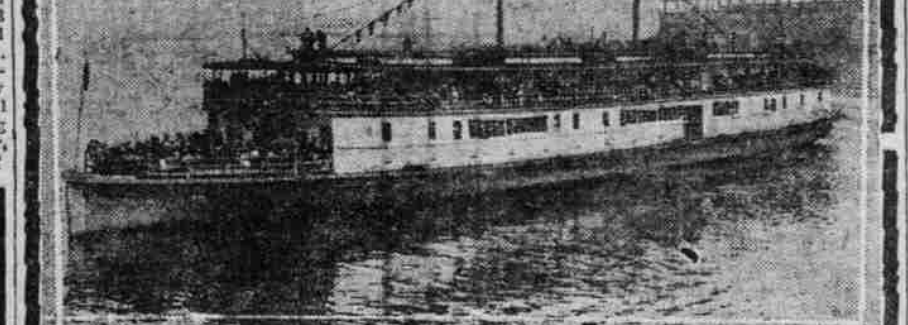

Pear Orchard Sets Record.

ROSEBURG, Or., Aug. 28.—(Special.)—The W. C. Harding pear orchard in Winston valley has set a record which the owner challenges to be equaled in the state or California. Mr. Harding's orchard consists of ten acres, and from it he has taken \$5500 worth of pears, which are selling at \$50 per ton. Out of the entire 58 tons gathered, the lot has graded No. 1 fancy. There still remains \$1000 worth of fruit in the orchard. Mr. Harding has been extremely careful with his pears and has succeeded in keeping out all diseases which would lessen the crop's value.
