

FRENCH OVERTHROW PARTY NOW FORMING

Extreme Element in Labor Unions Active.

MARCEL CACHIN LEADER

Would-Be Lenin of France Openly Challenges Associates to Join Red Movement.

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PARIS, Aug. 28.—(Special Cable.)—A communist party, frankly devoted to the violent overthrow of bourgeois civilization according to the doctrine of the third internationale and allied with the extreme element in labor unions, is now in process of organization.

Marcel Cachin, who since his return from Russia has gained the leadership of an openly revolutionary faction in French socialism, has already thrown down the gauntlet to his associates of the united socialist party—united in name only. Cachin means to become the Lenin of France, with L. O. Frossard, his companion on the Russian trip, as a French Trotsky.

As a first step in this direction he has notified the moderate leaders, both among the socialists and the labor unions, that on his return from a fortnight's vacation in the country he would split the socialist party wide open unless they rallied to the blood-red banner of Moscow without delay.

Split Is Probable.
Since moderates like Albert Thomas, Renaudel and Ernest Lafont, the last named of whom was expelled from Russia at Trotsky's behest, have no intention of subscribing to Cachin's radicalism, there is no longer any doubt that in the near future French socialism, like those of America and Great Britain, will form two warring groups, one pledged to pacific and constitutional establishment of a dictatorship and the other committed to revolution by violence.

In the chamber of deputies socialist representation in which heretofore has been deemed an index of the party's policy, the former group would undoubtedly prove the stronger. Of 60 odd socialist deputies scarcely more than a dozen would be likely to follow Cachin in the new communist fold. But what the attitude of the rank and file would be is less easy to foresee.

The younger militants, virtually without exception, are thoroughly bolshevik. They not only demand affiliation with the Third Internationale, Lenin's chief instrument of world revolution, but even clamor for the immediate establishment of a dictatorship of the proletariat.

Leadership Is Assured.
Hitherto—a fact which was recognized with extreme bitterness in Moscow—there has been no leader in France able or willing to undertake this perilous task. Today, however, Cachin appears to be not only willing but absolutely determined to serve as standard bearer in the open and, if need be, bloody warfare against the bourgeoisie.

To this end he has strenuously struggled to effect an alliance with the central confederation of labor, thus far, however, without success. The confederation, which unites all French trades unions, was quick to second Cachin's campaign against the government's support of Poland. Like the British council of action, it is prepared to oppose with a general strike any attempt to involve France in a war against the soviets.

But it is still far from convinced of the wisdom of adopting the revolutionary programme urged by the socialist envoy to Moscow. Socialist and labor papers are full of warnings to the proletariat against the war-like schemes of "the capitalist holy alliance." But they are noticeably chary of proposing a dictatorship of the proletariat as a remedy immediately applicable to the ills caused by capitalism.

Moderate Element Scores.
The labor confederation's policy probably will be defined at the congress to be held in Orleans early next month. Meanwhile, at a general meeting of the state railroad workers' union, just adjourned, the moderate element scored a considerable victory. The radicals held responsible for the unpopular strike of last May were censured and voted down.

Industrial controversies and public opinion always will.

World Declared Menaced.
The governor also at the luncheon gave what he termed a "word to business men." "Many," he said, "are helping to install an administration which intends to tear the league of nations."

"If the league does not become a thing in fact," he continued, "it is my judgment that not a single European nation will ever be able to pay its national debt, and if that is not paid then what becomes of fiscal conditions overseas? The financial stability of the world depends on the adoption of the league of nations."

Governor Cox added that public confidence must be given to industrial readjustments and he said "millions of dollars are being contributed to guarantee an unfair adjustment."

Industrial Danger Seen.
"I know men," he asserted, "that are making contributions for the purpose of using the bayonet to settle industrial differences. Nothing could be more dangerous than that. That is building a bolshevik factory."

The governor said he proposed to use the "golden rule" in settling industrial disputes. He also promised to remove war taxes unjustified during peace.

PROGRESSIVISM HELD ISSUE
Roosevelt Speaks Against Reaction in Omaha Address.

FREMONT, Neb., Aug. 28.—Franklin D. Roosevelt, democratic candidate for vice-president, today asserted the big issue of the campaign is progressivism against reaction.

PROGRESS ROOSEVELT'S PLEA

Democratic Programme Promises Most, Says Speaker.

GRAND ISLAND, Neb., Aug. 28.—Franklin D. Roosevelt, democratic vice-presidential candidate, addressing a crowd at the Union Pacific depot, devoted most of his attention to the proposition that the democratic party this year offered the most progressive programme presented to the American electorate and declared that the front-porch rocking-chair plan of presenting issues by the opposition party resulted from the disastrous "let-it-awful-Mabey" touring of Hughes in 1916.

Special stress was laid on the point that "Germany herself looked forward to the league of nations for reconstruction and justice" and that it was "America's high duty to aid the German people themselves, now that the war was over, as well as to aid other European nations."

Turning to the question of campaign expenditures, Mr. Roosevelt said the fund being raised by the republicans was so vast as to warrant the fixed conviction in advance that it could not all be expended legitimately.

"And this was attempted at a time when the public had begun to believe we had got by the lavish expenditures of money in political campaigns and the contributions of corporations and individuals for selfish purposes."

At the conclusion of his address Mr. Roosevelt descended from the train and shook hands with many of his listeners.

FLOWERS SHOWERED ON COX
Governor Gets Enthusiastic Welcome in New York.

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—Governor Cox was showered with flowers at the Grand Central station today when he arrived for a two-day visit to New York. The democratic presidential candidate found thousands of men and women massed in the terminal to greet him.

As he left his train he was greeted by a committee of democratic women. Proceeding down the platform, he found the train crew lined up, and with each man the governor shook hands.

The real reception, however, came when Mr. Cox entered the rotunda. An aisle had been roped off. He found a great line of flowers that the galleries and the grand staircase thronged.

As a nominee, who this afternoon delivered an address at the police games at Gravesend, reached the center of the hall, prolonged cheering broke out, followed by cries for a speech. Then came the rain of flowers.

WALLA WALLA TO HEAR COX
Democrats Rejoice When Welcome Telegram Arrives.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Aug. 28.—(Special.)—Local democrats rejoiced today when they received a telegram that Governor Cox will be in Walla Walla on the evening of September 2.

The local democrats had the promise of a visit from Franklin D. Roosevelt, but he did not come. They were promised a visit from Cox and his itinerary afterward appeared without Walla Walla. Even the wheel horses began to doubt the promises of the political leaders. All is now serene, however.

GOBS TO VISIT PRUNES
Destroyers Will Visit Vancouver During Harvest Festival Week.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Aug. 28.—(Special.)—Two torpedo-boat destroyers from the Pacific fleet will be in the Vancouver harbor September 16, 17 and 18 during the second annual prune harvest festival to be held here at that time. Albert Johnson, representative from this district, today telegraphed M. S. Cohen, president of the Prunarians, that the commander of the Pacific fleet will send these boats.

The queen's contest is being led by Miss Wright of the Elks with 4728 votes; Miss Fletcher of the Oddfellows 2658, and Miss Sanderson of the American Legion 1753.

DENVER TO HAVE GUARDS
Constabulary to Take Over Police Power in Mountain City.

DENVER, Colo., Aug. 28.—Immediate organization of a state constabulary to take over police powers in Denver when federal troops, sent here because of rioting growing out of the street car strike, are withdrawn, was agreed upon today.

The meeting was attended by state and city officials. United States army officers and Denver business men.

The suggestion for such a constabulary was made by Major-General Leonard Wood, commandant of the central division of the United States army, who said federal troops now in Denver would be withdrawn about September 6.

DALLAS, Or., Aug. 28.—(Special.)—L. C. Muscott, for many years proprietor of the Star Transfer company, this week disposed of his business to A. W. Thornton of this city, and will leave within a short time for Tillamook county to engage in farming and dairying.

Klamath Falls Rate Hearing Set.
SALEM, Or., Aug. 28.—(Special.)—The Oregon public service commission will consider the application of the California-Oregon Power company for an increase of rates at Klamath Falls at a hearing to be held at that city on September 23.

The application asks for a rise in its tariff, aggregating 15 per cent.

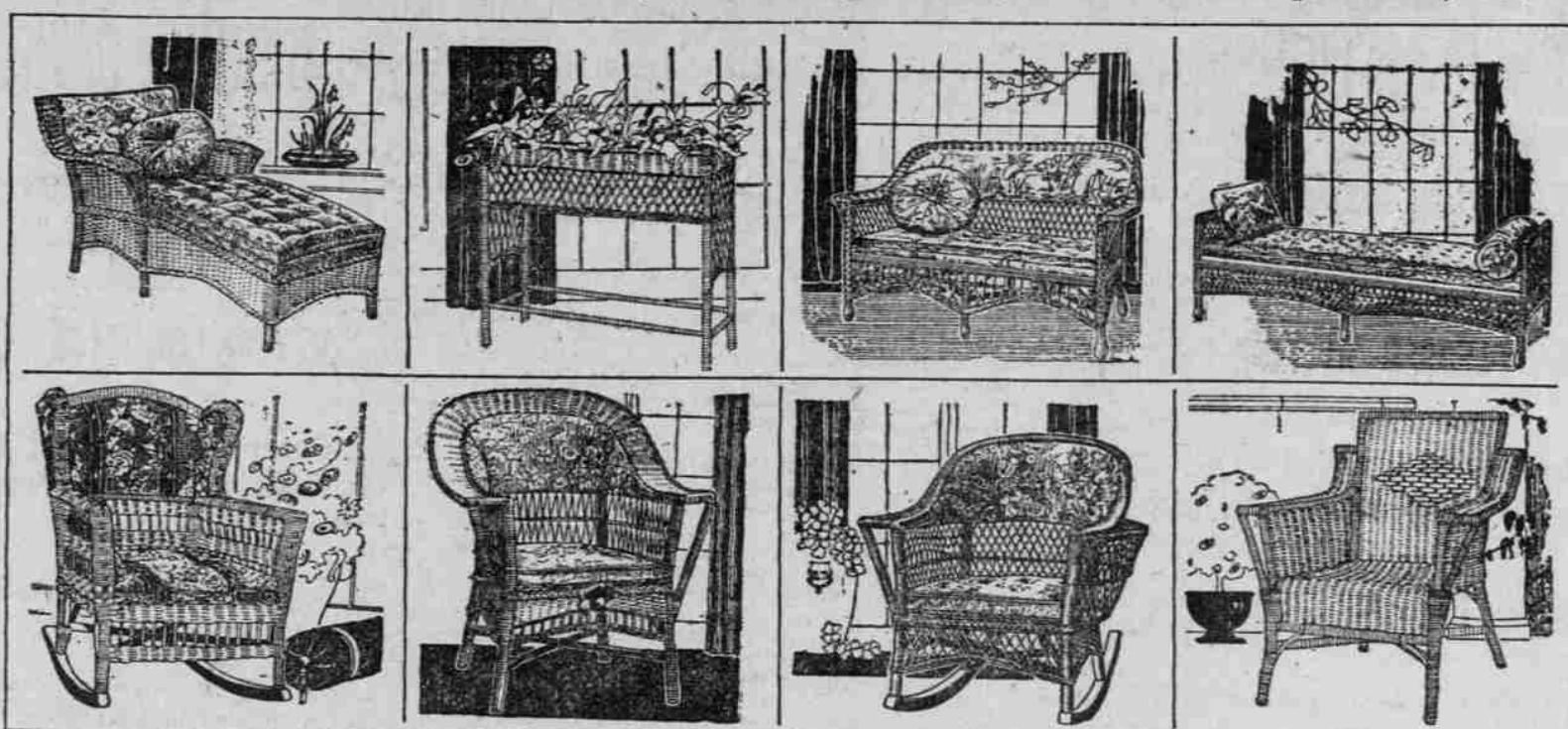

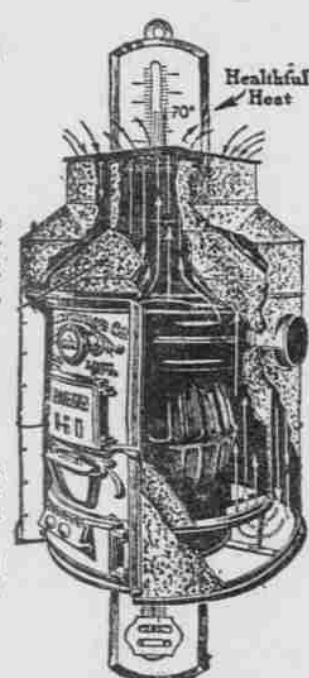
