

SUFFRAGISTS HERE CELEBRATE VICTORY

Luncheon at Benson Attended by 230 Women.

MAYOR BAKER SPEAKS

Leaders Familiar to Campaign in Oregon for Many Years Mingle With New Generation.

Suffragists of Portland and Oregon gathered yesterday at the Benson hotel to celebrate the national suffrage victory and to pay tribute to the women who gave many years of their lives to the cause in this state. Women familiar for the last 40 years in the political activities in Oregon mingled with the younger generation in the celebration.

The luncheon, attended by 230 women, was Portland's share in the nation-wide jubilee. It was presided over by Mrs. C. B. Simmons, president of the Oregon League of Women Voters, who called for talks from Mayor Baker, Mrs. M. L. T. Hidden, Sarah A. Evans, Dr. Viola May Coe, Mrs. Eva Emery Dye, Mrs. Vincent Cook, Mrs. Bronson Salmon, Mrs. Ada Wallace Unruh, Mrs. Millie R. Trumbull, Mrs. Helen Ekin Starrett and Dr. Esther Pohl Lovejoy, all women who have borne the burden of Oregon's suffrage fight.

Campaign Stories Related.
Stories of campaigning under such leaders as Abigail Scott Duniway were related and the lives of Susan B. Anthony, Anna Howard Shaw, Frances E. Willard, Mary Walker, Carrie Chapman Catt and a dozen others were held up as examples. The meeting voted to send Mrs. Catt a telegram in appreciation of the recent victory in Tennessee, which achieved the national ratification.

To the tune of "Onward, Christian Soldiers" the women sang a song of jubilation, written by Mrs. Starrett. Suggestions for the women of the future were offered by Mrs. Trumbull and Dr. Lovejoy.

"Refining the legislature is not an easy job," declared Mrs. Trumbull, referring to a statement by Mayor Baker that women would have a refining influence on politics. She told of the before and after of the passage of suffrage in Oregon with special reference to activities in Salem.

Solidarity Is Advised.

"Women have got to learn to shoot straight," the speaker continued. "They have to learn the lesson of solidarity." Laws put over by the women she characterized as "legislative heads."

"This is our cross," she said, "although men tell us we are fine and helpful, still we can't sit on a jury. And so there are some things we still need. We should watch our schools and our district judges and we should put up to Mayor Baker the proposition that if we re-elect him he should see that we have a woman physician at the Coderg. Those are just a few of the places where we can help."

Dr. Lovejoy touched on woman's part in doing away with the present condition of unrest.

Mayor Is First Speaker.

Mayor Baker was the first speaker. "Here man stands before you, conquered and on his knees," he said. "That might apply in our country, state, but not in Oregon, because here we know what the influence of women means in politics and now that this is to be nation-wide women should use the same gentle influence they hold over the boy and girl with the man in politics and tell him he has to shoot straight from now on."

He told of the change in the attitude in the last five years and declared: "It's a fine feeling to have the respect of the good women of a community. Together the men and women of our country are going to run our country."

Mrs. Hidden touched on her 40 years' experience in the suffrage and Mrs. Evans related the earliest history of the movement in Oregon. Mrs. Starrett gave sidelights on the national convention.

Governor Asked to Quit.

MURKESBORO, Tenn., Aug. 28.—Resolutions calling on Governor Roberts to give up the democratic nomination for re-election, because of his activities for ratification of the suffrage amendment, were adopted today at a meeting of anti-suffragists.

ANNUAL REUNION TO BE HELD IN INDIANAPOLIS.

Arrangements Under Way to Accommodate 100,000 Guests.

Committees at Work.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Aug. 28.—After a lapse of 27 years Indianapolis will again entertain the annual encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic. For the first time since 1893 the national meeting of the Grand Army will be held this year in the Hoosier capital, September 19 to 26.

Civic committees are now planning to entertain 100,000 visitors during encampment week. A list of homes which will accommodate one or more of the civil war heroes is being compiled and committee members say comfortable quarters will be available for everyone.

Numerous entertainment features are being prepared. There will be airplane rides for veterans who may retain some of their wartime courage. Automobile trips have been arranged for others.

Hotel headquarters have been assigned the 33 state departments of the Grand Army of the Republic. Arrangements for the gathering are being made by a committee of 500 business men who are working under the direction of an executive committee of five members.

PRIZES CREATE INTEREST

GRANGES TO ENTER CONTEST AT COUNTY FAIR.

Various Departments Being Gotten Into Shape for Opening September 20.

OREGON CITY, Or., Aug. 28.—(Special.)—From present indications there will never be stronger competition for the prizes offered for grange and community exhibits at the Clackamas county fair than at the fair of 1920, which will be at the Clackamas County fair association's grounds at Canby, commencing Monday, September 20, and continuing four days.

Among the granges that have already signified their intention of competing for the prize of \$100 are Oswego, which won first place last year; Warner, Harding and Garfield granges. This will be the first time that Garfield grange has entered.

The second prize will be \$75; third, \$50; fourth, \$25, and fifth, \$15. A special prize will be awarded to the grange having the most beautifully arranged booth. Edith Tozier, who was in charge of the Oswego grange exhibit at the 1919 county fair, will be superintendent of the time department this year.

A prize of \$20 is offered for the most unique booth, while the second will be \$10.

There will be competition in the floral display this year, for the Starkey conservatory at Jennings Lodge is to make an attractive display.

Mrs. Bertha Hurst of Canby will have charge of the floral display, but greenhouse flowers will not be allowed in the cut-flower contest.

A special prize will be offered in the dahlia class, and a special prize for best display of cut flowers.

Mrs. J. L. Waldron is in charge of the ladies' textile department. Mrs. Adam H. McKnight will be in charge of the domestic science department.

Miss Romney Snedeker and Brenton Vender will be in charge of the juvenile department. Miss Snedeker is the country club leader and Mr. Vender will be the superintendent.

Prizes are to be offered in this department.

In the juvenile department there will be canning contests. Each club will enter one team of three members, who will be chosen from a regularly organized club.

At the close of the county fair at Canby many exhibits will be taken to Salem, where they will be placed in the Clackamas county booth, as the county is to strive for one of the big prizes. It secured first place last year.

OREGON MEN REMEMBERED

50 MILITARY OFFICERS TO BE MEMORIALIZED.

\$2,000,000 Army and Navy Club House to Engrave Names on Bronze Plaques.

Fifty military officers of Oregon will be among those who will be memorialized in the new \$2,000,000 clubhouse of the Army and Navy club in the Clackamas county booth, as the county is to strive for one of the big prizes. It secured first place last year.

Official casualty lists, as issued during the war, are believed by directors of the Army and Navy club to be incomplete, and for that reason a search is being made throughout the country for those next of kin to officers killed so the list may be made complete.

To this end lodges, societies, organizations generally and individuals are asked to communicate with the club officials, 261 Madison avenue, New York City, giving whatever information they have.

Portland, according to the official

lists, contributed 13 of its officers to the death column. These were:

A complete record of each officer killed or who died in the war will be kept at the memorial structure. For this purpose questionnaires have been mailed the next of kin of those known to have died. Similar action will be taken as the organization adds names to its list.

While the prime purpose of the building is as a testimonial and memorial of those who gave their all in the war, the fact is stressed that the building will contain all the comforts and conveniences of a modern clubhouse. Four hundred bedrooms, dormitories, library and reading rooms, billiard rooms, dining rooms and an auditorium are but a few of its features.

Rear-Admiral Bradley Fiske, U.S.N., retired, is president of the club.

JUNKET PLANS COMPLETE

EXCURSIONISTS TO SEE 25 EAST OREGON TOWNS.

Trip Will Occupy Six Days and Limit for Special Train Is Placed at 150.

The eastern Oregon excursion to be run under auspices of the chamber of commerce will visit 25 towns and will devote six days to the trip.

The special train is scheduled to leave Portland the night of October 17 and return the morning of October 24. The committee recommended that the number be increased to allow as many merchants as possible to join the party, and the limit has been placed at 150.

The itinerary will be arranged so that the greater distances between points will be made on night trips and an average of four towns will be visited each day, permitting stops of several hours at each. In the case of Milton and Freewater, the railroad station is Milton-Freewater, though they are separate towns in Union county, the business districts of which are about a mile apart. Some other towns are only a few miles apart so that little time will be wasted in travel between. In some instances the entire party will be taken for automobile rides between towns and the special train will move between the points to pick up the excursionists when ready for a longer journey.

The towns to be visited are Union, Cove, North Powder, Haines, Baker, Nyssa, Vale, Ontario, Joseph, Enterprize, Walla, Elgin, Imbler, La Grande, Adams, Athena, Weston, Milton, Freewater, Pendleton, Pilot Rock, Echo, Stanfield, Hermiston and Umatilla.

STILL IS FOUND IN CAVE

50 GALLONS OF WHISKY AND MALT CACHE SEIZED.

Plant Found on Andrews Farm Near Cottrell and Three Men Are Arrested.

Three men were arrested and a still and a quantity of whisky seized yesterday in a raid on the farm of Stillman Andrews, near Cottrell, Ore., by Ed. R. Wolfe of the revenue office, M. R. Burnett, deputy federal prohibition agent, and Deputy Constable Squires.

The still had a capacity of 150 gallons. It was found in a cave near the Andrews home. Fifty gallons of corn whisky and six barrels of mash were seized.

Following a trail over the hill from the cave the raiders came to the Andrews farm, where Stillman Andrews resided knowledge of the liquor. The raiders found a quart of whisky and a cache of whisky in the barn, however, in Mr. Andrews' barn, however, and placed him under arrest. The prisoners were brought to Portland last night and taken to the county jail.

Those arrested were Melvin Andrews, 23; Lester Talmadge, 20, and Stillman Andrews, 25. They were charged with violating the federal prohibition law.

STORE DOOR BATTERED

Logger Arrested on Charge of Trying to Get Phonograph.

Henry Smith, a logger, was arrested last night by Sergeant Mearns and Special Patrolman Simpson, charged with battering down the door of a store at 123 First street in an attempt to steal a phonograph. Smith told the police he wanted to take the machine to the logging camps.

The police said Smith battered the door down with a steel bar weighing about 50 pounds. The crash was heard four blocks away. When Smith refused to the scene they found \$150 which had been lost in the change, striking matches to find his way about.

STANFIELD FORCE FORMS

UNION LABOR REPUBLICANS ARE ORGANIZED.

Election of National as Well as State Senatorial Ticket to Be Club's Aim.

The Harding-Stanfield union labor republican club of Multnomah county, an organization of union labor men and women of republican belief in this county, which will have for its object the boosting of the republican party candidates and particularly the presidential vice-presidential and senatorial tickets, was organized last night at a meeting held at the state republican headquarters.

An executive committee will be appointed, consisting of the officers and one representative from each labor union which is represented or becomes represented in the club membership.

A committee was appointed, consisting of the president, the secretary, H. J. Parr, Thomas O'Neill and W. H. Smith, which will meet Monday evening at the Oregon state republican headquarters to draft a constitution and bylaws for submission to the club at its next meeting, Friday night, September 3.

Negress Accused of \$110 Theft.

Marie Waterson, negress, was arrested last night by Patrolmen Forcken and Simpkins and charged with vagrancy following a report that she had stolen \$110 from Oscar Jentech. Jentech was arrested on a charge of disorderly conduct. He had \$300 in gold in his pockets and put up \$150 bail to insure his appearance in court.

Home Ransacked by Burglar.

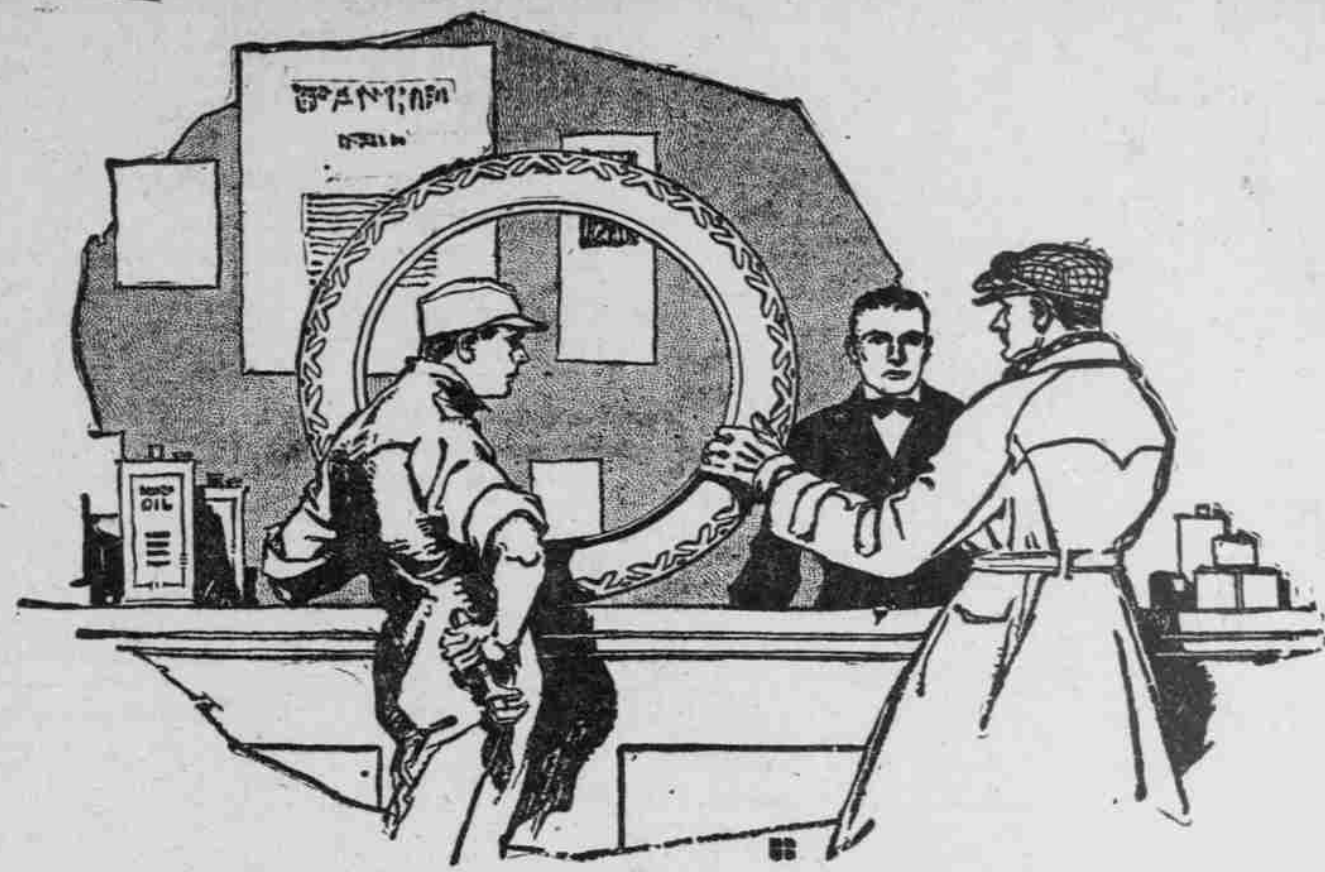

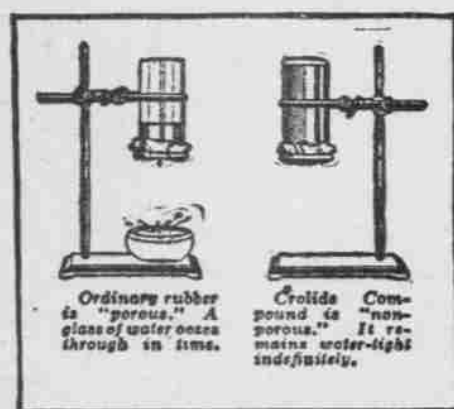
