AMERICAN OARSMEN WIN OLYMPIC RACES

U. S. Places in Four Out of Five Final Events.

SINGLES TRIAL IS CLOSE

England Faces Strong Competition
Today as Honors Will Be
Settled.

BRUSSELS, Aug. 28.—(By the Associated Press.)—The oarsmen from the United States will enter the Olympic finals tomorrow in four out of five events. The Americans did not compete in the event for paired oared boats with coxswain.
Today's contests produced several excellent races. Hatfield, the New Zealand sculler, gave Jack Kelly of the "Vesper" Boat Club, Philadelphia, single sculls champion of the United States, a hard battle in the first half of the course in the single sculls event. The American won by two lengths. America and Great Britain will meet in the finals of the eight-oared boats with coxswain.

Kelly to Meet English Star.
Interest is keen in the fight to be staged between Kelly and J. Beresford Jr. for the single sculling honors. Kelly defeated Hatfield in 7 minutes 46.1-5 seconds.

The first preliminary heat of the four-oared event was won by Switzerland in 7 minutes 3 seconds. The second heat was won by Norway in 7 minutes 17 seconds. The third heat was won by the United States in 7 minutes 17.2-5 seconds. The first crew in each heat qualified.

America in 6-Oar Finals.
In the semi-finals of the eight-oared event, England won the first heat in 6 minutes 26 seconds and America took the second heat in 6 minutes 24 seconds.

Jack Kelly won the second heat of the single sculls competition in 7 minutes 46.1-5 seconds. The first heat went to a British entry in 7 minutes 45 seconds.

In the event for paired-oared boats with coxswain the first heat went to Italy in 8 minutes 10 seconds; the second to France in 8 minutes 14 seconds; and the third to Switzerland in 8 minutes 30 seconds. The United States entry withdrew from the second heat and the Brazilian entry from the third.

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Norman Ross, Illinois Athletic club, won the 400 meters free-style in 5:28 4-5. Ludy Langer, Honolulu, was second in 5:42 4-5.

First honors in plain diving for women went to Denmark, Miss Fryland of Norway. The Americans, Allen Riegin, New York, and Betty Grimes, Minneapolis, were fifth and sixth respectively.

In the semi-finals of the 200-meter breast-stroke, J. Howell, Oakland, Cal., won his heat.

In the trials of fancy diving, C. Pinkston, San Francisco; H. Prieste, Los Angeles, and L. J. Bahaback, New York, qualified.

The American team defeated Spain, 5 to 0, in the semi-finals for second place in water polo.

Except taking third place last week in the team foil competition Americans went unplaced in the six Olympic fencing events, which have just ended. The fencing competition was a great victory for Italy.

The American boxing team, which finished second in the Olympic contests, is planning a European tour before returning to the United States.

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Many Local Nimrods to Hunt.

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Reports made to A. E. Burghdoff, state game warden, by his deputies, indicate that deer will be plentiful. Quite a number of local sportsmen will be numbered among the nimrods who will invade the brush the opening week. While southern Oregon will be the mecca of most, a few will head themselves to favorite spots elsewhere.

Dan Powers has selected the headwaters of the Nehalem river as the spot to bring down his two deer. Dr. R. C. McDonald, who leads a party of four into the southern Oregon region, while another party consisting of Walter Evans, Tom Honeyman and General Fleming will go to Grants Pass.
