

HAVE LUTHERAN CHURCH TO BE DEICATED

Services to Begin When Doors Are Opened at 10 o'Clock With An Appropriate Ceremony—Sermon for Deaf to Be Preached

A HANDSOME new church will be dedicated this morning at 10 o'clock, when the doors of Trinity Lutheran will be opened with appropriate ceremonies, in which the entire congregation will take part. The pastor will read the Scriptures, and offer the dedicatory prayer, in the service following, which will be featured by congregational singing accompanied by the pipe organ, a solo by Mrs. John Valentine and a selection by the choir. Rev. Mr. Westerkamp of Sherwood will deliver the morning sermon. The language used throughout this service will be German.

In the afternoon, beginning at 2 o'clock, services will be held in English. Rev. Oscar Feder of Seattle will preach. The choir will furnish music, and Mrs. Valentine and Mrs. Kulman will sing duets. Miss Christian and Miss Rieg will sing solos.

At 4 o'clock Professor Becker of the city will give an organ recital, and at 5 o'clock Rev. Mr. Meyer of Portland and Rev. Mr. Gaertner of Seattle will give a service for the deaf in the sign language.

Fifty-one Baptist Institutions Get Fund Money.

Total of \$125,440 Distributed to Schools and Colleges Nation Over.

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—Fifty-one Baptist schools and colleges of the Northern Baptist convention have received a portion of the \$100,000 fund being collected to cover a five-year extension program. Dr. Frank C. Schaeffer, secretary of the denomination's board of education, announced here today.

The fund, totaling \$125,440, representing \$125,440 in payments which will be followed by others until approximately \$500,000 has been distributed for educational purposes. Dr. Padesford said that second payments would be made before the end of the vacation. The fund is being used to support the various institutions with funds for immediate equipment.

"Does Death End All?" Preached by Dr. W. B. Hinson, pastor of East Side Baptist church, of which he is pastor. Job 14:14.

YOU know I am made serious by the thought that that question is 3500 years old. The man who asked it died when the world was young. And I am further impressed by the consciousness that it is the universal question. All over the world—every generation—that question has palpitated on the live air of God. "If a man die, shall he live again?" And I am impressed very markedly by the fact that this is a pertinent question. For we have seen people die, and whether or not they are to live again is a matter of perennial interest to us. And I say it cheerfully as well as calmly, you will have me to die; and I should like to know whether a man die he shall live again. And while I speak many are passing out of this realm of sense and sight, and we see nothing go, though the doctor may have said, "He is gone." And apparently there is an entire cessation of existence, some
