

COX FINISHES TRIP TIRED BUT HOPEFUL

Swing Through West Ends at
Kansas City.

220 SPEECHES DELIVERED

22 States Covered by Governor in
Campaign for Democracy;
Tour South Is Next.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Oct. 2.—Governor Cox of Ohio closed his month-long western campaign trip here tonight with a mass meeting at convention hall, at which crowds from Missouri and Kansas heard and cheered the league of nations and other battle standards of the democratic presidential candidate.

With special reference tonight to the Irish question, in all ten speeches of today's finale of his "swing" through the west, the league was preached by the governor. He reiterated arguments that it was "pledge" to Americans in the war, a bond of honor with the allies and a medium for moral and material betterment for America and the world.

His speech tonight made a total of 220 speeches in his tour, exclusive of many others. He visited 22 states—all but three of those west of the Mississippi—he has visited, and a total of 220 speeches since his notification last August. On arriving here at Dayton, Ohio, tomorrow evening, to rest and prepare for his trip into Kentucky and Tennessee late next week, the candidate will have traveled about 11,000 miles on his western tour, or an average of 364 miles daily since starting out one month ago tonight.

Cox Tired but Confident.
Great satisfaction with the results of his western trip and confidence in the result of the election a month hence were expressed by the governor. He said that from tonight on the fight would be like "winning." He said he was extremely tired, but, with a few days' rest next week, expressed assurance of a strong finish fight.

A rousing reception was given the governor here. Arriving at 10 o'clock, he was met by a band and escort drawn from the Legion of Honor and women's clubs. Motoring to a park on the Kansas side of the river, he addressed a workingmen's meeting, discussing labor questions. Before his audience of 10,000, he was the dinner guest of the women's club. Earlier in the day he made addresses at the Ohio, Kan., Pittsburg, Kan., and Mulberry, Kan., and at Joplin, Richards and Hume, Mo. Criticism of the league in this community by Irish sympathizers resulted in an extended statement by the governor that he proposed to bring the Irish question to the attention of the league if elected president. The league, he reiterated, would give the Irish people a forum, not lacking for bringing their cause to "the bar of public opinion of the world."

Irish Rights Asserted.
Under article 10, the governor declared, Ireland "has the right to separate from Great Britain and establish its own government—and to that end may wage such internal aggression as it deems necessary to accomplish the results. This is a matter wholly without the purview of the league."

Charges of a "political conspiracy" by the national oligarchy to deceive the people regarding the league were repeated by Governor Cox. He also continued attacks on Senator Harding as a "reactionary" and upon Senator Lodge of Massachusetts.

Progressive government also was championed further by the governor and he again urged settlement of industrial controversies by public opinion.

"Big business is fighting me," he said, "because I favor the golden rule and not the bayonet to settle industrial controversies."

Short Trip South Next.
Governor Cox is due at Dayton at 6 o'clock tomorrow night. According to present plans he will leave Wednesday night on another trip, including Elizabethtown and Paducah, Ky., and Nashville, Tenn., preceding itineraries in Indiana and Illinois. Most of the east also will be covered by the candidate before election day.

TAFT STATEMENT IS DENIED

Charge of Attack on Associated Press Held Unfounded.
KANSAS CITY, Mo., Oct. 2.—Governor Cox of Ohio, democratic presidential nominee, tonight issued this statement:

"My attention has just been called to a syndicated article by William Howard Taft in which he makes the misstatement that I have attacked the Associated Press for failing to give to the American public a fair account of my speeches and phases of my campaign. This would appear to be a part of the deliberate conspiracy on the part of the reactionary politicians, and on to which I am loathe to believe Mr. Taft would knowingly lend his name.

"Upon reaching the coast we found that not only was the reactionary press refusing to carry advance news of meetings, but affidavits of republican editors established the fact that scores of the republican organization were demanding of the so-called republican press silence regarding the meetings and suppression of the facts after the meetings.

"In bringing these matters to the attention of my audiences, I several times made the statement that the Associated Press and other press organizations had representatives in my party; that they all were carrying the news; but that reactionary editors were failing to give their dispatches to the public. As a matter of fact, I have unwittingly offended representatives of other press associations by inadvertently using the words 'Associated Press' when meaning 'press associations' in complimenting them upon the work they were doing."

DEMOCRATS PLAN BIG DRIVE

Army of Campaign Speakers Will Take Field Shortly.

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—William G. McAdoo, former secretary of the treasury, will start his speaking tour to the Pacific coast in the interest of the democratic presidential and vice-presidential candidates, about October 15, it was announced at democratic national headquarters here today.

Secretary of Labor Wilson will begin a speaking tour of the west October 5; Senator Morris Sheppard of Texas will start a western trip next week; J. Bruce Kremer of Montana, vice-chairman of the democratic

national committee, will start his western speaking tour immediately and Home Cummings, former chairman of the democratic national committee, will leave for a tour of the Pacific coast October 6.

Senator Pat Harrison of Mississippi, chairman of the democratic speakers' bureau, declared that of 500 speakers who will begin campaigning for the democratic national ticket October 4 100 will be speaking in Ohio and 100 in Indiana. The total number will be increased until election day, said Senator Harrison, adding that the bureau had set aside October 16 and 22 as democratic speakers' days throughout the United States.

He said that democratic county chairmen from coast to coast had been urged to call for volunteer speakers to deliver one or more speeches in their territories on those dates.

CHIEF 9 YEARS OUSTED

Seattle Mayor Silent on Action Affecting Fire Department.

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 2.—Frank L. Stetson, chief of the Seattle fire department for the last nine years, was removed from office by Hugh M. Caldwell, mayor, today and George L. Mantor, a battalion fire chief, was appointed in his stead. Mayor Caldwell declined to discuss his action today.

Chief Stetson was chief of the fire department at Minneapolis for 30 years before coming to Seattle. His successor, Chief Mantor, has been in the department for 20 years, and during the war was for 18 months in charge of the fire department at Camp Lewis, Washington.

ORIENTAL TOURISTS BACK

12 Representatives and One Senator Reach San Francisco.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 2.—Twelve representatives and one United States senator, members of a special congressional party which toured the far east recently, arrived here today on the army transport Madawaska.

The party departed from here early in July.

THE PENALTY

FIDELITY WRECKED IN DIVORCE COURT

Wife of Man Involved in Swope
Death Asks Freedom.

FORTUNE SPENT ON MATE

Mother and Friends Given Up by
Mrs. Frances Hyde to Clear Hus-
band of Murder Charge.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Oct. 2.—(Special.)—After having given up mother, friends and a large part of her fortune to clear her husband, Dr. B. Clark Hyde, of the charge of poisoning Colonel Thomas H. Swope, millionaire stockman, and five members of his family, Mrs. Frances S. Hyde's romance ended today in the divorce court.

Mrs. Hyde charges extreme cruelty and violence and asks the court for custody of their two children, a son six years old and a daughter of four years.

Mrs. Hyde states that she is able financially to take care of and educate her children and that her husband is "not the proper person or properly situated or financially able to care for them." The petition asks also for a restraining order to prevent the defendant from interfering or intruding at her home at number 2216 Forest avenue. The couple were married June 21, 1905, and had lived together until August 1, 1920.

Cruelty Is Charged.

The petition states further: "The defendant disregarded the duties of a husband and has been guilty of repeated and constant acts of cruelty and violence toward the plaintiff of such a nature to endanger her life, and has applied opprobrious epithets to her and to her friends in the presence of their children. He has tried to estrange her children and her friends from her and has exhibited a sullen, morose and cruel disposition and demeanor and devoid of any sentiments of affection, which has caused the plaintiff to be in constant fear for the welfare and lives of herself and her children. He has persisted in that conduct until her health has been undermined and her nervous system broken down, and he has offered such indignities to her as to render her condition intolerable."

Death Is Mysterious.

Mrs. Hyde was Miss Frances Swope, niece of Colonel Thomas H. Swope, a wealthy stockman. On October 2, 1909, Colonel Swope died mysteriously. In quick succession five members of the Swope household died.

Dr. Hyde was indicted for the murder of Colonel Swope, and at the first trial he was found guilty, but was saved from a life sentence by the supreme court, which ordered a new trial.

The second trial ended when one of the jurors escaped. The third trial, in

1913, ended in a hung jury. The case was then continued eight times and finally dropped in 1917, when the state and the Swope estate, which was providing the expenses of the prosecution, refused to finance the trial.

The divorce petition marks the end of one of the most remarkable examples of fidelity on the part of a wife on record.

Mother Given Up.

Mrs. Hyde gave up mother, sisters and brothers to stand by her husband. Day in and day out she sat in the courtroom at the various trials of her husband, to all outward appearances a total stranger to her mother and the rest of her family. No sign of recognition passed between them. She spent a fortune inherited from Colonel Swope with lavish hand to clear her husband.

A year or so ago Dr. Hyde was ousted from the Jackson county medical society, of which he was president at the time he was arrested. Hyde was alleged to have displayed a violent temper and used obscene language in a letter concerning the other members of the medical society and a library project of the organization.

FIRE BURNS UNCHECKED

FLAMES EATING THROUGH
BALES OF SISAL.

Galveston Firemen Aided by Rangers, National Guardsmen and Police.

Galveston, Oct. 2.—Fire department officials tonight were reluctant to commit themselves as to the origin of the disastrous waterfront fire which broke out early today and which was unchecked late tonight.

The fire was slowly eating its way through 15,000 bales of Mexican sisal stored in section A of Pier 41.

The local firemen are being assisted by Texas Rangers and national guardsmen, recently brought here in connection with a strike of longshoremen.

No estimate of the damage was obtainable tonight.

Four fireships were endangered by the flames. The fire was first noticed when an explosion blew out windows and doors, followed by flames and smoke.

Five tugs were aiding the fire fighting force.

Governor Orders Protection.

AUSTIN, Tex., Oct. 2.—Ranger Captain H. B. Brooks, in command of police at Galveston, was ordered today by Governor Hobby to furnish adequate police protection to guard the entire waterfront in such a manner as will prevent disastrous fires, "if it takes the entire national guard and every man in Texas to do so."

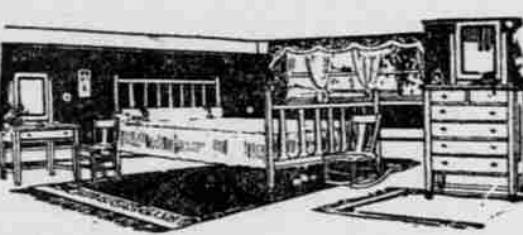
