

COX'S "PARASITES" STRONG FOR HARDING

Traveling Salesmen Pledge
Aid to Republicans.

THOUSANDS GO TO MARION

Force and Determination Mark
Conduct of Knights of the Grip
on Visit to Senator.

CLEVELAND, O., Sept. 27.—(Special Correspondence).—Five thousand traveling salesmen journeyed to the famous "front porch" last Saturday and the writer made the pilgrimage with them. It was a gala day in Marion, with enthusiasm running high. Every United States Senator from Ohio was represented, from Boston to San Francisco and New Orleans to Chicago. Had the democratic leaders witnessed the interest demonstrated by these representatives of the 600,000 "knights of the grip," the best body of "propagandists" in America, they no doubt would be ready to shut up shop and quit the field. Cox's "parasites" were there in force and determination marked their conduct. Even the excessive heat did not put a damper on their enthusiasm.

And speaking of Marion, it is practically unanimous for its favorite son. Nearly every business and private house in the city boasts a Harding lithograph. I say "nearly," for, to be perfectly frank, there are a few pictures in evidence. As we left the train and started up Marion's "Broadway," the first unharmonious thing we witnessed was a Cox lithograph hanging in a drug-store window. We did not know whether this was a "hope," a "threat" or a promise. Some of the boys wanted to investigate, but time prevented. You know "prescriptions" are still listed in some places in the middle west.

Marion All Dressed Up.
Marion was dressed up in her best attire. To the stranger an impression was made of a town in a hurry. A celebration was in progress. It reminded the writer of Dallas, Tex., during the days of the "cowboy" fair. It is a quiet town, just such a one as offers the proper surroundings for serious thinking and intelligent expression upon the subject of the skyscrapers are limited to four stories, but it has taken on some metropolitan airs. It is a plain wooden structure of two stories, painted green, with a broad veranda. It is most unpretentious, and there are no other buildings within the town much more expensive, and in Portland there are probably 10,000 private homes which are of far greater financial value. In pre-war days, it would have cost about \$5000 to have built this house in Oregon. The house did not stand the use given it by the thousands of visitors, hence it has been covered with grass and flowers. It is fairly large, is filled with flowers and beautiful shade trees.

The senator delivers his address from his front porch, his feet standing upon the lawn and out in the street. The senator is not a wealthy man; just a plain, ordinary, successful business man who has made enough money to live comfortably the rest of his life should he retire from active participation in business. He lacks many hundreds of thousands of dollars a millionaire. There is a striking contrast between this home and the home of his democratic opponent, who counts his wealth by the millions.

Newsboy Gets Indignant.
But returning to the home town interest in the candidate. To them, he is just one of the home-folks. And what is said with reference to the republican candidate in this respect applies also to Mr. Harding. Both are local American, patriotic, home-loving, common citizens. And the inhabitants of Marion, men, women and children, love them both. I met a newsboy on the street. I tested him by asking him if he wanted a campaign button. He said he did. I then told him it was a Cox "rooster." He asked him if he was not for Cox. He was indignant, and he answered me in characteristic American newsboy fashion, his words proper to repeat under certain conditions, but not printable. I stepped into a drug store to buy a drink. I gave my order and then asked the clerk to give me one if she was going to vote for Cox. She was red-headed, and I should have remembered the old saying that "discretion is the better part of valor." Believe me, I asked no more women in Marion how they were going to vote. And in this is typical of the Marion atmosphere.

They are ready to fight at the drop of the hat for Harding. While sight-seeing with the president of the chamber of commerce, W. H. Holmstrom, he called my attention to the county headquarters of the democratic committee. I did not locate it at first. All I could see was "Hess & Markert, Undertakers." Looking more closely I noted the democratic sign. The democratic campaign is being run from these undertaking parlors. For all the activity around these headquarters they might as well have opened their offices in the cemetery. And in this connection I should add that there are many, many other sections of Ohio where the sentiment is almost as strong as in Marion. No one need feel himself or herself about Ohio. Harding will sweep Ohio just as he is going to sweep the whole of the middle west. You cannot get down in Ohio without sensing this atmosphere. They know Cox here, and though he may be able to "jimmie" some of the people outside the state, you can take it from me that the great majority of Ohio voters are not being fooled in the least.

Several Hands in Parade.
But I commenced to tell about the traveling men. The parade from downtown to the Harding home started at 2:30 o'clock. It was a long parade and several bands were in evidence. It was a noisy parade. Different delegations had different banners with their own slogans. The largest delegation was from Columbus. The banner read: "Some town 'Tome Folks, we love it, Senator Harding, too." The second largest delegation came from Dayton. Governor Cox's home town. Their banner read: "Senator Harding, we represent business, and we want you to represent us." The parade was led by some salesman carrying a large banner reading: "Senator Harding, are you coming 600,000 strong?" The Lincoln republican club from Franklin county, Ohio (negro), preceded by the "Jazzies" negro band, I ever heard, were there in force with a banner reading: "We were for Harding when we started, and we are for him still." Other slogans appearing upon banners in the parade were: "A few of Jimmie's parasites from Newark, O.," "Jim Cox's Parasites," "The whole damn family has agreed on Harding," "Sen-

ator Harding, the parasites, the public nuisances, and unmitigated bores are all for you, 600,000 strong." "We love every foot of the U. S.," "Look out for the prairie peddlers, some hustlers," "Harding and horse sense, not Cox and chaos," "They are but typical of the hundreds appearing in the parade. And it might be added that it was not only traveling salesmen who were there but there were a large number of traveling saleswomen.

The parade ended in front of the Harding porch. About 16,000 persons were gathered to hear the senator deliver his talk on his business. When he appeared, he received a real ovation. He has a wonderful personality, a good voice and a pleasing delivery. His address was impressive and well received. The keynote was contained in his statement "It is no crime to be successful." Following his speech, he and Mrs. Harding held an impromptu reception, and for two hours shook hands with the visitors. The "hard-boiled" politician upon the road when "barn-storming" occasionally picks up a baby and kisses it, or shakes the hand of a child, simply for effect. Senator Harding loves children; the children love him. In the line were many children. He never missed one of them, and in shaking their hands and patting their heads, one could feel the absolute sincerity of the man; it was his love for little children which prompted his act. Most of them were home children; he could well have passed them up without offering offense to anyone, but he showed them more real consideration than anyone else. As I stood on the steps of the house immediately behind him and Mrs. Harding, I could not help but feel the powerful attraction of the man, as well as his life help-mate, who is every inch a woman; a woman who has said that her only hobby is her husband.

Traveling Men Powerful.
It was a successful day. The traveling men came there because they are for Harding; they went away from there with unbounded enthusiasm to take an active part in the campaign. They comprise an element in American life that is most important; they are a power to be reckoned with, and their influence is going to be felt in this campaign as never before. They are an army in the field who know how to sell their goods, and who are going to put their influence to use for the power of his "parasites."

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FLEET BACK IN HARBOR

CRANE FUNERAL TO BE TOMORROW

Public to Be Admitted and
Casket Will Be Open.

BURIAL TO BE IN DALTON

Death of Ex-Governor of Massachusetts Ascribed to Inflammation of Brain.

DALTON, Mass., Oct. 2.—Winthrop Murray Crane, ex-United States senator and ex-governor of Massachusetts, who died early today at his residence, Sugar Hill, here, passed from life quietly and unconsciously in an attack of sleeping sickness which followed an illness of seven weeks, due, according to his physician, to inflammation of the brain. At his bedside, summoned when the attendants saw that the end was near, were his wife and son, W. M. Crane Jr., his sisters, Mrs. Harry Ogden Bates of Morristown, N. J., and Miss Clara L. Crane of Dalton, and Dr. Bruce W. Faddock, his medical adviser. The end came at 4 A. M., with no sign of recognition of those who watched.

Funeral to Be Public.
The funeral will be on Monday at 2 o'clock at the residence and will be public. During the hour preceding the service the public will be admitted to the house and the casket will be open. The burial in the Dalton cemetery will be private. Rev. Ralph M. Timberlake, pastor of the Congregational church in Dalton, which Mr. Crane attended, will conduct the service.

Mr. Crane's last illness dates from August 6, when he was compelled by what was described as a disease of the circulatory system to take to his bed. Previous to that time, at the residence, he had been suffering from the exercises in Northampton notifying Governor Coolidge of his nomination for the vice-presidency, the former senator had suffered fainting attacks, but he regarded them lightly.

Sleep Exceedingly Heavy.
On the day after the illness at Northampton he went to New York on a business trip, asserting he felt fully equal to it. He continued to attend to his affairs until a week later, when he submitted to the advice of his physician that for a time at least he take a complete rest. His problems confronting the state and other cities were called into consultation at different times. For the last few days he had been in a heavy sleep, from which he could be aroused only by the greatest effort.

of Rathie, Kerby, the other defendant, took the stand and detailed his treatment from the time he was lodged in the Union county jail at La Grande after his capture until his appearance before the grand jury which indicted him. He testified that when brought from La Grande to Pendleton his escorts threatened to hang him to every tree on the way over and that after the arrival here, men in the county jail cross-questioned them, attempting to gain information as to the murder, escape and flight. "They beat me up and threatened to throw me out to the mob on the outside," Kerby testified, and also said that both Bancroft and himself were treated with ammonia. He testified that his lips peeled off and his nose and lungs were sore for a week following the application of the ammonia. He declared that one of the men in the jail said: "The district attorney will come. If you don't talk there is plenty more ammonia." 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vile and profane language was used against them. When asked by the attorney for the defense if the men were maltreated that night the witness answered, "I should say they were." He alleged that Bancroft was choked by one of the men giving the third degree and declared that ammonia was used on both Kerby and Bancroft. Henderson was the last of the five prisoners to appear on the stand. He asked that the court excuse him from testifying. Judge Phelps ruled that he should not incriminate himself but that he must answer questions put to him. The prisoner then stated on the stand that ammonia had been given to both Bancroft and Kerby and that he saw their mouths, noses and lips swollen afterwards. He stated that one man came down from Kerby's cell to him and said, "You made my ammonia left." He added that a quart bottle with some of the liquid in it was shown him.

Mistreatment Not Denied.
State attorneys called several witnesses to show that the district attorney had warned the defendants before going into the grand jury that they did not have to make any statements and what they did make would be used against them. No evidence was introduced in contradiction to the alleged third degree treatment of prisoners.

The last witness on the stand was District Attorney Keater, who was called by the prosecution to show that he had warned the defendants of their rights. On cross-examination by the defense, however, it was found that none of the defendants had been informed of their right to counsel or had been taken before a magistrate previous to the grand jury session. He denied any intimidation of the defendants.

Argument Is Heard.
Judge Phelps then called Rathie to the stand and asked him a few questions. Judge Phelps then declared that he was ready to hear argument on the evidence presented as to why the testimony of the grand juror should not be allowed. Then, after the defense, then argued that the statements of influence of the third-degree gruelings which they received during their confinement should not be allowed. The motion of the defense was overruled by the court on the ground that the statements were not under the influence of fear when appearing before the grand jury. Judge Phelps then ordered the jury returned to the courtroom after an absence of five hours and Fletcher was returned to the witness stand.

Three witnesses were called by the state before court adjourned until Monday morning at 9 o'clock. Emmett Bancroft testified that Kerby had told him to shoot Taylor.

Bancroft Called by Defense.
Emmett Bancroft, testified to die for the murder of Till Taylor, was then called to the stand by the defense. Ammonia was poured on him, he declared, his face slapped, and his head bumped against the wall by men who were demanding information from him. He testified that he saw a man whom he said he thought was detective from Portland, give ammonia to Kerby and that after the ordeal was all over the beds in the jail were all removed from the cells and they were forced to sleep on the bare floor. He stated that he had a black eye the next day from a blow which he received that night.

Cross-examination by the prosecution brought out the statement that he could not talk, breathe or do anything after the application of the ammonia. Bancroft charged that the men who were grueling him, "were all drunk."

Stoop Called to Stand.
Fourth of the five men indicted for the murder to be called as witnesses was Stoop, who was convicted and sentenced on Wednesday night. Stoop denied that he saw the actual mistreatment of the defendants on trial but said that he heard a commotion in the jail above him.

Strongest testimony of the maltreatment of the prisoners was given by Ben F. Young, of this city, for many years a member of the Denver police department. Young alleged that he was present when the prisoners received the alleged third degree treatment.
