

MILITARY TRAINING TAKES MAJOR RANK

Course at University Graduates With Commission.

MAJOR BAIRD IN CHARGE

Work Intended to Prepare Students for Examination for Standing in Regular Army.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Oct. 2.—(Special.)—Military training now ranks among the major departments in the university. Beginning this year the department of military science and tactics offers to students a major course carrying with graduation a commission in the reserves. The course is intended to prepare students for examination for commissions in the regular army.

The R. O. C. will be commanded by Major R. C. Baird. Major Baird, who was commandant last year, received a promotion in the regular service a month ago. His new commission dates from July 1. During the war Major Baird held the rank of lieutenant-colonel, but was mustered out as a captain.

A new ruling of the department is that all cadets must deposit \$10 before drawing a uniform. If the uniform is returned in good condition the money is refunded.

Building News Completion. The new women's building, which has been under construction since last August, is nearing completion. The west end, in which are classrooms and a gymnasium, will be ready for use by the department of physical education for women by November 1.

The alumni hall and the main stairway in the east end of the building will be the last to be finished. As soon as the grounds surrounding the building can be cleared the hockey field will be put into condition, as well as the new tennis courts and a field for archery.

The enlargement of the library to the point where law students will be enabled to do most of their studying will be one of the chief aims of the law department this year, according to Dean Hale. An appropriation of \$5000 for the library has been obtained, a large part of which has been expended already for books which are expected to arrive shortly.

Lack of room is one of the main handicaps to the department. Dean Hale states. But efforts are being made to relieve the congestion.

Outside States Represented. One of the most remarkable things about the registration of students at the university this year, according to Mrs. George Fitch of the registrar's office, is the number of students enrolling from other states. Approximately 150 students are coming to Oregon this year with advanced standing from other colleges. This is a gain of about 33-1/3 per cent over that of last year.

Religious organizations working under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A. will give special courses in religious education in the university, open to both men and women. The courses are non-sectarian. Rev. Edwin V. O'Brien, D. D., will deliver the first course, which is called "Christian Ethics." "Masterpieces of Religious Literature" is the title of a series of lectures to be delivered by Rev. Bruce J. Giffen, M. A., B. D.

Beginning in January, Rabbi Jonah E. Wise, D. C. Kohs and others will offer a course in the history and culture of the Hebrew people.

Fraternity Grades Given. The first official fraternity grade list for the spring semester of last year has just been issued by the registrar's office and for the second consecutive time Sigma Delta Phi, local sorority, heads the list.

The Delta Tau Delta fraternity for the second consecutive semester leads the national fraternities. For two terms the Pi Beta Phi sorority has been second in the entire list. The greatest advance in grades was made by the Sigma Delta club, whose average jumped from the 15th to the 11th place. MONEY OFFERED WHITMAN

INCREASE IN ENDOWMENT BY \$500,000 IN PROSPECT.

Offer Proposes Gift of \$125,000 if College Will Raise \$250,000. Aid to Salaries Is Aim.

WHITMAN COLLEGE, Walla Walla, Wash., Oct. 2.—(Special.)—Whitman's endowment will soon be increased close to a half million dollars, providing an offer made by the general education board is completed with by the college, it has been announced here. The offer proposes to give Whitman \$125,000 provided the college raises \$250,000. The income from this added endowment is to be used for professors' salaries.

Already \$125 has been received at interest at 5 per cent, which is being paid until the college proposition is raised.

Of the \$250,000 that Whitman is asked to raise, one-half is already pledged, leaving \$125,000 to be raised. There is little question that the sum will be raised before the end of the year, according to President Penrose.

I. W. W. SCORED BY JUDGE Jurist Says Reds Are Menace to American Government.

SALEM, Or., Oct. 2.—(Special.)—That the I. W. W. organization is the most serious menace now confronting the people of the United States was the opinion expressed by G. G. Ding-

ham, circuit judge, when addressing a class of applicants for naturalization here today.

"The red flag has no place in the United States," said Judge Bingham, "and the sooner these radicals are returned to their native shores the better it will be for the future welfare of this country. To harbor and encourage men who would destroy our government is not American, and we should all cooperate in alleviating this menace."

William Smith, naturalization official, assisted in conducting the examinations, with the result that four of the applicants were granted their papers.

They are: Samuel Blakely McElnea, Salem; William Lenta, Portland; John Zehner, Silverton, and John Filosi, Turner.

Five other applicants were told to appear some time in the future for examination.

WIFE LOYAL TO WESTON

ALIBI FOR ALLEGED MURDERER PLANNED.

Bend Woman Starts Search for Man She Believes Will Prove Husband Innocent.

BEND, Or., Oct. 2.—(Special.)—That an attempt will be made to establish an alibi for A. J. Weston, held here on a charge of murdering Robert H. Krug, hermit rancher of Sisters, on the night of March 24, 1919, was indicated today by Mrs. Weston, wife of the accused, when she let it be known that she is searching for a former Sisters man, who will testify, she is confident, to having occupied the same bed with Weston on the night the murder is alleged to have occurred. She has not given out the name of this man.

Mrs. Weston arrived here today, called from Portland by the news of her husband's arrest, to consult with him regarding the details of the trial. She declared he could not possibly be guilty of the crime charged, and said she was ready to use every penny of their resources in defending him. Frank and visibly grief-stricken, she determinedly voiced her faith in the prisoner's innocence.

In the defense she will have the assistance of Weston's daughter, Mrs. A. J. Moore, wife of the Deschutes county district attorney, who, although unwilling to do anything to deter her husband from his duty in prosecuting her father, is nevertheless convinced that the defendant is guiltless.

"I regret deeply that it is necessary for my husband to direct the case against my father," she said.

FLEET NAMES EXPLAINED

TOYO KISEN CHRISTENINGS ARE NOT HAPHAZARD.

"Yo" Appearing at End of Appellation of All Vessels Means "Ocean" in Japanese.

The meanings of the euphonious names of the vessels of the Toyo Kisen line, given in a communication received from the head office of the Japanese line by George Powell, fact that the names of the vessels of this fleet end in "yo" is not due to a desire to rhyme, it appears, but instead to the fact that this word in Japanese means "ocean."

Thus Koyo means sweet-scented ocean, Choyo is "morning ocean," Tenyo is "celestial ocean" and Shinyo is "springtime ocean." The exact meaning to the oriental mind of the (century ocean) is not clear, and the English language is said to be incapable of expressing exactly the shades of meaning conveyed by the names Selvo, Anyo and Melyo, meaning respectively peaceful, calm and civilized ocean.

The suffix "maru" appended to the name of each of the vessels has defied all attempts at translation into English. It is a part of the name of every Japanese merchant vessel from the smallest sampan to the largest passenger liner. The original literal meaning of the word is "round."

BAPTISTS WILL CONVENE

CENTRALIA, Wash., Oct. 2.—(Special.)—The annual convention of the Centralia Baptist association, which includes all of the territory between Centralia and Vancouver, will be held in Winlock next Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday.

Burton, pastor of the Centralia Baptist church, and an address on Baptist Young People's Union work by Mrs. Burton. At the annual congregational meeting of the Centralia church Thursday night, growth in all departments was reported for the year. The meeting was preceded by a supper. Rev. Burton has been granted a substantial increase in salary.

PRESERVE NEED IS SHOWN

MALHEUR LAKE MIGRATORY GROUNDS UNEXCELLED.

U. S. Biological Chief Declares Sportsmen Should Retain Bird Reservation.

That Oregon sportsmen will have perpetuated the finest migratory bird hunting grounds in the country should the Roosevelt bird reservation bill be passed at the coming election, is the word of E. W. Nelson, head of the United States biological survey bureau, who was in the city yesterday. Mr. Nelson, who departed for Washington, D. C., after conferring with men of his department in the northwest, regards Malheur lake as undoubtedly the finest breeding ground in the United States.

"There is no place in the country that can be compared with it," he declared. "There are probably not even a dozen left that anywhere approach it and its value in keeping up the supply of wild game and birds. The future of wild fowl depends upon having the best breeding places, and Oregon particularly should consider that the lake is the extreme northern belt for two of the most picturesque of sub-tropical birds, the ibis and the white heron."

Mr. Nelson calls attention to the soil expert sent to Oregon last year by the department of agriculture upon his request to determine the best use of the ground in that region. The report showed that it was not suitable for development under irrigation and that its present forage is its most important purpose. It will increase in value, he contends, and eventually be on a par with national parks.

STUDENT BODY GROWS

WILLAMETTE UNIVERSITY MAKES ATTENDANCE GAINS.

Greater Number of Transfers Than Usual Being Received at Salem College.

WILLAMETTE UNIVERSITY, Salem, Or., Oct. 2.—(Special.)—Approximately fifty students have enrolled in the university since the regular classwork was begun, making a total of 412. Only 33 more students are needed to eclipse the enrollment of both semesters of 1919-1920.

The registrar's books show a greater number of transfers from other colleges and universities than usual. Washington State college leads, with an offering of four former students, while the University of Oregon, Oregon Agricultural college and Reed college have each furnished two students.

Of the present enrollment, the state of Washington has given 72 students, Idaho is credited with nine, California four, Kansas two, Indiana one, and Oregon the remaining 324.

Twenty-five of this year's students claim Portland as their home, seven of them being alumni of Washington high school. Jefferson high is second in rank, with six graduates attending Willamette, while Lincoln
