115 Booths are on West Side, 264 on East Side; Country Precincts Have 34; Locations and Numbers Listed for Voters.

- There are 413 precincts in Multnomah county in which votes will be cast at the election Tuesday. Of these 115 are in Portland on the west side and 264 on the east side and 34 in the country. The west side precincts run from 1 to 379, the east side precincts from 380 to 758, also including numbers 317 1/2 and 318, and the country precincts run from 299 to 327. There are 85 precincts numbered one-half.

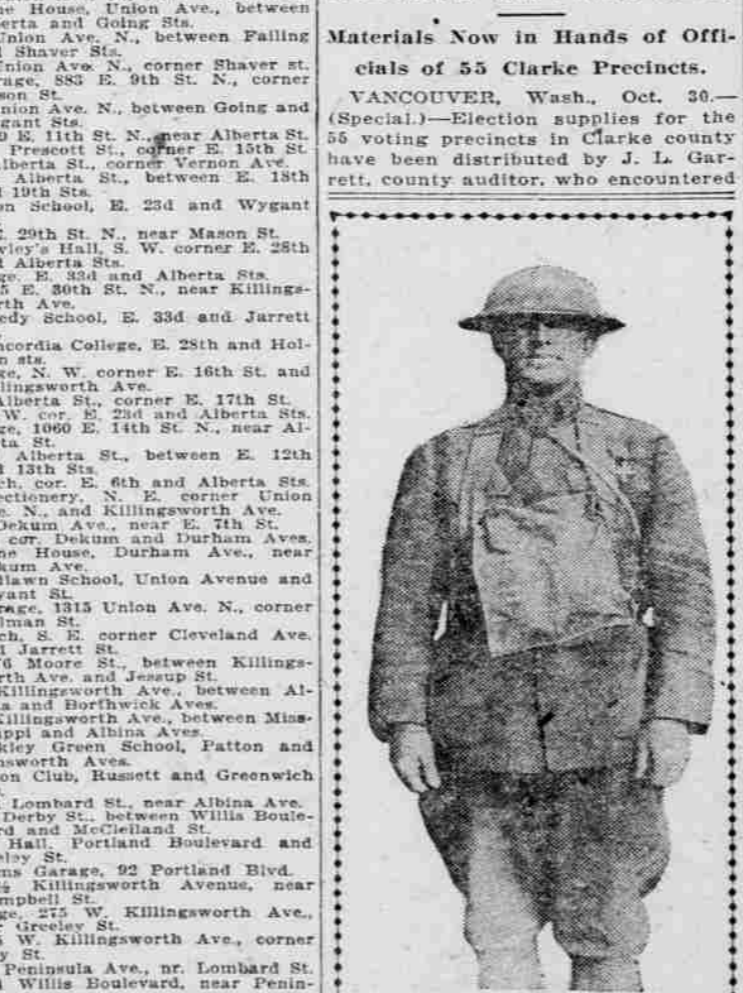
