

NON-PARTISAN TICKET AID TO REPUBLICANS

Idaho Election no Surprise to
Students of Politics.

NUGENT WEAK CANDIDATE

Democrats Declared to Have Split
in Contest Which United
Opposition Party.

BOISE, Idaho, Nov. 6.—(Special).—The result of Tuesday's election in Idaho was no surprise to those who have had an opportunity to study political atmospheres and situations in this state. Nor was it difficult to forecast.

Besides having on their side the advantages of strong sentiment evident everywhere in favor of a change in the national administration and a break in the tariff issue because of the fall in price for all products, the republicans stood united against a divided democracy, partly split this year just as it did two years ago on account of the activities of certain ambitious leaders and the non-partisan league.

But probably more important than these reasons was the nomination of a state ticket by the league. In this three-cornered contest, the republicans were bound to win.

Race for Senate Interesting.
Passing over for the moment the presidential situation, it is interesting to review the senatorship, for the race was really the heart of the contest in the November 2 contest. The verdict was that Senator John F. Nugent, democrat, must retire after serving the balance of the unexpired term of the late James H. Brady, or two years, and will be succeeded on March 4 by Frank R. Gooding, former governor of this state.

There were democrats in Idaho willing to wager almost anything they had that Nugent would win. In fact not a few of them did, much to their sorrow today. Democratic leaders were supremely confident that although they might lose the state for president and the entire state ticket, Nugent would be elected by a majority ranging from 5000 to 15,000.

Crop Prices Factor in Defeat.
Senator Nugent was in real danger from the very start. If Idaho is anything politically, it is republican. That was the first serious handicap. The second was that the state, like the nation, had been under democratic rule for eight years, the present incumbent at the White House was not a candidate and a new aspirant was in the running. This was not an asset. Third, Idaho producers found the sweat of their brow wasted, for the high-priced crops they had raised were being dumped on the market, to the detriment of their individual and collective loss.

During the campaign, Nugent himself urged the president to place an embargo on Canadian wheat. This was taken as an admission of the republican charges that free trade and a tariff-for-revenue policy was bringing ruin to the producers. It was after Senator Nugent's appeal that the real break in favor of Gooding was seen.

Non-partisan Treaty Suspected.
The split within the ranks of the democratic party, through which the democratic loyal legion came into existence, was costly to Nugent. It grew from the belief that there was a pre-arranged understanding that the non-partisan league would withdraw H. F. Samuel, its candidate for senator, for and in behalf of Nugent.

Idaho was conceded to Harding after Cox finished his campaign in this state. Cox did not make the impression that had been expected. The explosion of his campaign charges proved disastrous. Idaho, like the rest of the nation, understood a change in the management of national affairs was necessary. It was for Harding from the start. Idahoans liked Harding's dignified utterances and his front-porch campaign.

Three-cornered Fight Aid.
All doubts as to the re-election of Governor Davis was removed when the fight became three-cornered. It would have been a closer race had the non-partisan league not put its candidate in the running, but in face of the returns it is very doubtful if Davis could be defeated even if only one opponent for the governorship. Fairchild, the league candidate, had no chance of election. Not only had he the united opposition of the republicans but the opposition of the democrats as well. Walters, the democratic candidate, faced almost the same identical situation.

The republicans won three supreme court judgeships, one of which is for the regular six-year term to be filled by Robert N. Dunn, one for the conditional six-year, for which William A. Lee was elected, and one for the conditional four-year for which Charles P. McCarthy was elected. The entire state ticket was carried into office and both houses of the legislature will be republican, giving the latter full control to carry out republican policies.

The J. H. Tillman company of Astoria was more than \$100,000 lower than the next lowest bidder for the Skippoon section of the Coast highway. It developed that Tillman, after working until late yesterday morning on his bid, neglected to include the price of asphalt and one or two items in his bid.

Contractor Faces Ruin.
Members of the board of the commission admit that the contract will ruin the Tillman company, but say the only thing the commission could do was to make the award. Tillman had a check with his bid for \$12,000, but instead of forfeiting it informed the commission that he would go through with the job as far as he can.

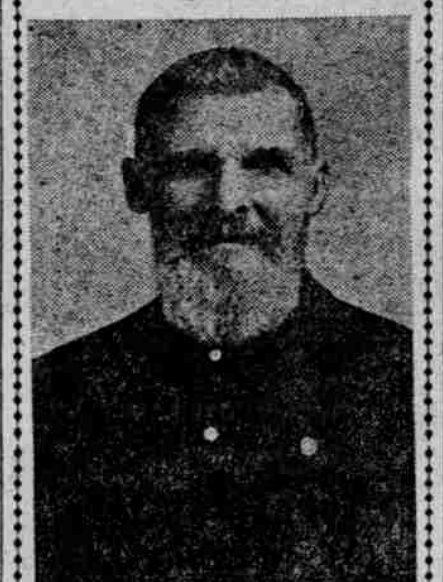

A substantial start has been made on the Crater lake highway, for the commission awarded contracts for 14.55 miles of grading on the Agate-Trail section and awarded contracts for the bridges as well.

Highway Bonds Sold.
Henry Teal was the successful bidder for \$1,500,000 of 4½ per cent state highway bonds, the first batch of the \$10,000,000 authorized by the 1920 session of the legislature and ratified by the people in the special May election. Mr. Teal's bid was \$1,418,700, or \$81,300 less than the face value. The price paid by Teal was \$945.8. Mr. Teal bought the large block of bonds in September, when the price was \$91.101, an improvement of \$3.74 a \$100. Mr. Teal won the bonds by a narrow margin, the next highest bidder offering \$1,413,900. A delegation from Wasco county

informed the commission that the county voted bonds last Tuesday to co-operate in the paving of the road between The Dalles and Dufur, the end of The Dalles-California highway. The commission explained that this paving cannot be contemplated by the commission for some time to come and advised Wasco county to fix up the worst spots and gravel it.

LIGHTNING SETS 24 FIRES

CARELESS CAMPERS ARE TO
BLAME FOR 14 BLAZES.

Forest Report Charges Brush
Burners With Two Fires in
Woods, but Damage Is Small.

EUGENE, Or., Nov. 6.—(Special).—Last summer lightning caused 24 fires in the Cascade national forest, according to the annual report on fires just finished by N. F. Macduff, supervisor of the forest. The report shows that careless campers left burning 14 camp fires and careless brush burners set two fires, comprising a total of 40. Two lightning storms, July 16 and August 8, each set about a dozen fires, says the report. Of these 18 were extinguished before they had covered more than a quarter of an acre, five before they had reached an extent of 10 acres and but one spread over more than 10 acres. It covered 23 acres, having smoldered unseen by lookouts for 10 days after it started. The total area burned over by lightning fires was 32½, destroying 35,000 board feet of standing timber valued at \$81. To find these fires and put them out cost on an average \$48 a fire, most of this expense being due of course to the difficulty of finding the one tree among so many says the report.

Campers who left 14 fires burning, most of them along the McKenzie highway, were not all entirely careless for some of their fires showed that water had been poured on them to put them out.

The two fires escaping from brush burning covered an area of 26½ acres, destroyed 4000 board feet of stumpage and considerable second growth of a total value of \$70.

Although compared with the summer of 1919 nearly as many fires occurred, climatic conditions during 1920 were much more favorable to the control of fires. Since 1911, in only three years have more fires been recorded than this year, 1911, 1914 and 1919. For the period 1911 to 1919 inclusive, 58½ per cent of all fires were caused by lightning, 41½ were due to carelessness or maliciousness. For the year 1920 60 per cent were set by lightning and 40 per cent by human agency.

HOUSE SYSTEM IS NEW

Dean Fox Organizes Women Who
Live in Annexes at Oregon.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Nov. 6.—(Special).—A new residence system for women has been started this year at the university under the direction of Elizabeth Fox, dean of women, and Mrs. Edna Datson. This system is an outgrowth of the Hendricks hall annexes which were established last year.

The annexes last year were directly connected with Hendricks hall, but this year they are independent. Each house is organized with a president and house officers. They have their house meetings instead of going to Hendricks as before, their own social affairs, and will be represented at the council of the presidents of houses and other campus meetings.

A charge of powder was also set among the boxes and what the fire failed to accomplish the powder did. Toledo voters Tuesday overwhelmingly defeated the farmer-labor ticket.

Willamette Classes to Debate.

WILLAMETTE UNIVERSITY, Salem, Or., Nov. 6.—(Special).—In accordance with the suggestion of the interclass rivalry committee a series of preliminary debates to decide class supremacy is scheduled for the middle of December. "Resolved, That the Japanese should be granted the privilege of citizenship on the same basis as Europeans" is the question for debate. Negotiations have been opened with other schools in order to complete the debating schedule.
