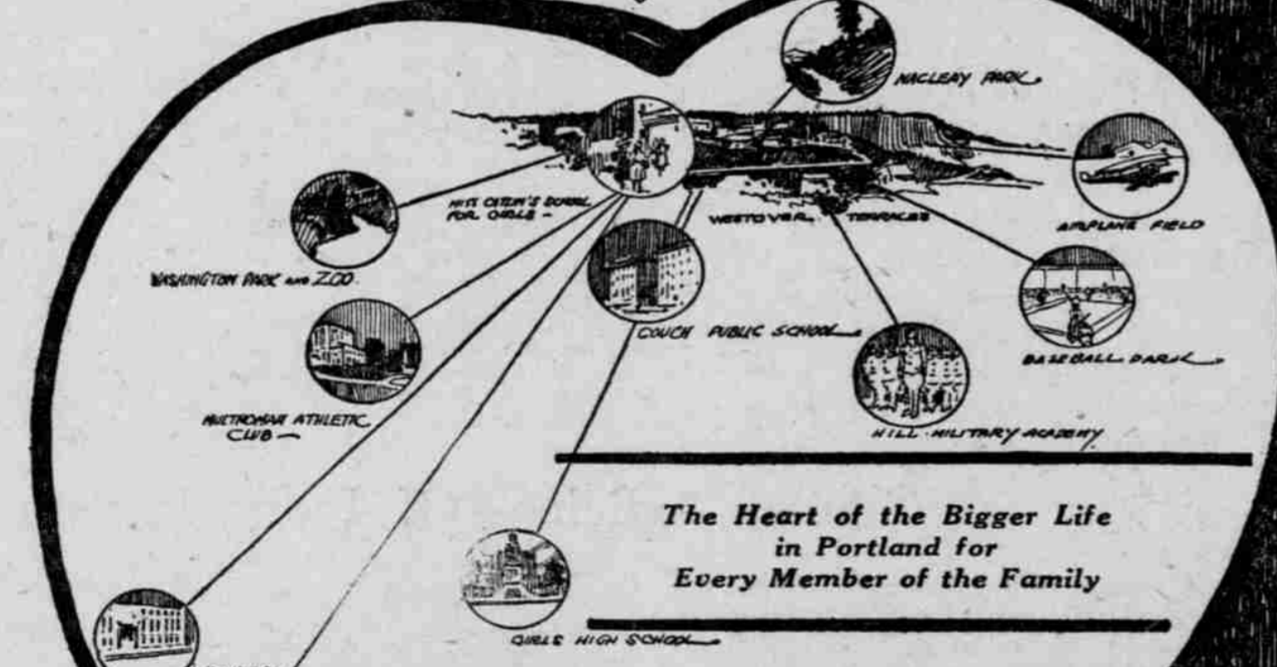
COMING EVENTS.
