

IDAHO DEMOCRATS BUSY DIGGING OUT

Situation Bad One but Not
Altogether Hopeless.

NON-PARTISANS CRUSHED

Question Arises Whether Senator
Nugent Will Be Able to Regain
Power Lost by Defeat.

BOISE, Idaho, Nov. 20.—(Special).—Since the disastrous defeat of November 2, when the entire ticket was lost under the republican hand, the democrats of Idaho have been struggling to extricate themselves and casting about for solid ground on which to start anew. Their situation is a bad one, but not altogether hopeless. For its own preservation, the republican party has no desire to see the democratic party become extinct, for that would mean the formation of another party which might in time prove decidedly more dangerous than any the democrats might have.

Both democrats and republicans agree that the last election definitely eliminated the non-partisan league as a party organization in this state. That they are satisfied with this result goes without saying. The league failed to elect any of its candidates, either state or legislative, and lost ground when it withdrew its candidate for senator and threw its support to the democratic candidate, who also went down to defeat.

No League Candidate Elected.
Not a league candidate was elected to the legislature, although there were 15 in the race. The republicans, too, walked away with that, leaving the democrats very poor second.

If the league expects to be a factor in Idaho's political arena again, it will have to show decidedly more strength in the future than it has in the past. Conservative party leaders who have studied the league's activities the past four years have come to the conclusion that the league is about through in this state and will not attempt to carry on its organization work on so extensive a scale, which means disintegration and ultimate loss of force.

Many of the more prominent democrats are inclined to the belief that the defeat at the last general election is not so serious from a standpoint as it first appeared. They honestly express the opinion that the league hereafter will not be a factor and because of that fact reorganization work can start with a view of bringing solidly together all of the factions within.

Leadership Matter of Doubt.
Just who will be the leader in the reorganization is not clear. State Chairman I. P. Pope has been the movement to organize for the 1924 campaign and at his suggestion a club was perfected in Boise with that object in view. Pope is classed with the Nugent faction of the party. It is expected the supporters of United States Senator Nugent will be active in the reorganization work.

This brings to the front the position Senator Nugent is left in after his defeat by Frank R. Gooding, republican. Will Nugent seek to regain the power he has lost? It is not known in preference to another leader as yet unnamed? Nugent has been active in the party for years, but he has bitter enemies in the legislature. Just as he has staunch supporters. It is considered more than likely by those democratic leaders willing to discuss the subject that Nugent will attempt to regain his lost power and that he will again be the party's candidate for senator. It will be four years before he can take up the senatorial fight. In the meantime a number of things may happen, including the developing of a new party leader to replace Nugent. Much depends on the success met with in the reorganization movement.

Democratic Daily Talked Of.
An effort is being made to establish a democratic daily paper in Boise as one of the links in the reorganization plan, but the impression seems to prevail that it will hardly succeed, as the establishment of a daily paper is a venture, to say the least, and takes a great amount of capital. There also seems to be a well-established opinion that papers run exclusively for politics are not a profitable investment.

Former Attorney-General T. A. Walters, defeated democratic candidate for governor in a letter to governor-elect David E. Shaw, declared that on his victory and wishes him success during the next two years of his administration. Walters attacked the commission form of government, claiming that it has greatly increased taxation, he did not make his attacks personal but declared that he felt only the most kindly feeling for the man who defeated him.

Utah Governor Pays Visit.
The cabinet of the government which has been in force and effect now almost two years is to have two more years to operate. Within that time Governor David E. Shaw will be proven conclusively that it is a great improvement over the older form of government, and that it can be operated at less expense and at the same time there will be greater efficiency.

Governor-elect Mabey of Utah spent several days here last week going over the Idaho system and studying it. He may recommend a change in form of government to the next Utah legislature. The general impression secured from Governor-elect Mabey was that he was impressed with the Idaho system, although he made no statement as to what recommendation he would make to the Utah solons.

HUSBAND, 53, IS SEPARATED
FROM 16-YEAR-OLD WIFE.

Moral Leper Is Term Judge Calls
P. G. McLean, Who May
Face Next Grand Jury.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 20.—(Special).—Phineas Gortley McLean, 53-year-old actor, who persuaded a 16-year-old Mary Parker to marry him so he could win a bet, was styled a moral leper today by Judge P. G. McLean, who annulled the marriage upon petition of the girl.

After he had heard the girl's story, Judge Shortall ordered a writ of habeas corpus prepared and asked the girl's attorney to present the case to the grand jury. He advised the girl to return to her mother in Chicago. McLean and the Parker girl are touring the Low circuit in the same act. They recently appeared in Portland.

outraged all laws of decency," declared Judge Shortall. "If she had a father or brother he should give McLean an excellent beating."

"There certainly should be some way to punish a man who outrages public morals by treating the sacred institution of marriage in this light manner. The large number of divorces that come before our court is a sad reflection on our national life, but I hope the time has not come when a man can perpetrate such a crime in San Francisco and go unpunished. The testimony is that he persuaded the 16-year-old girl to commit perjury in swearing that she was 19 years old when they applied for a license. Upon that point I think the members of the grand jury can act."

The girl said she left Chicago with a vaudeville troupe. This was with her mother's consent. Six weeks ago, in Yakima, Wash., she was introduced to McLean by another member of the company. She said he had paid no particular attention to her and had never made any declaration of affection for her until last Sunday.

FLAMES FATAL TO NINE

EVERY MEMBER BUT ONE OF
THREE FAMILIES DIE.

Apartment House Fire Sweeps Upward Through Stairways,
Halted Escape.

NEW YORK, Nov. 20.—Nine persons, constituting every member but one of two entire families, lost their lives here early today in a fire which destroyed a five-story apartment house. Fanned by other families escaped or were rescued by firemen.

Originating, fire authorities say, in a baby carriage on the first floor of the brick structure, the fire swept upward through open stairways, cutting off escape through the halls. Nearly a hundred men, women and children, clad in night clothes, swarmed to the fire escapes. Some made their way to the ground, while others, huddled in terror-stricken groups on platforms in mid-air until carried to safety.

All the dead were found on the top floor after the flames had been controlled.

UNION HIGH SCHOOL OPEN

Malin and Shasta View Districts in
Klamath Combine.

MALIN, Or., Nov. 20.—(Special).—Klamath county's first union high school opened here last week with the two upper classes attending in the stage part of the Bohemian National hall, mainly used for dance purposes.

The districts uniting to form the school are Malin and Shasta View. Two classes at present are being taught in the public school building at the latter place. A. W. McComb, graduated with the 1920 class from the agricultural college, is principal of the new school.

Plans are under way for the erection of a stone building for the union high school, to be finished in time for school next year.

WRANGLER TALKS FIGHT

General Says His Forces Are Ready
for Another Campaign.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 19.—(By the Associated Press).—General Wrangel declared today he and his army and navy were ready to recommence fighting immediately, but that his future course had not yet been determined. General Wrangel's ship is anchored in the Sea of Marmara, but he has refused to debark.

General Wrangel expressed his thanks to the American nation for the aid given him by the American Red Cross.

"I have done all humanly possible and my conscience is clear," General Wrangel said. "My troops were overpowered by the desperate onslaughts of six soviet armies."

PASCAL GETS LIFE TERM

Man Who Kidnaped and Smothered
Coughlin Boy Sentenced.

NORRISTOWN, Pa., Nov. 20.—August Pascal, alias Pasquale, "the crank" in the Coughlin kidnapping case, was sentenced to life imprisonment today by Judge Seward. Pascal had pleaded guilty to second-degree murder and kidnapping for extortion. He stole Blakely Coughlin, the 11-month-old baby of Mr. and Mrs. George B. Coughlin, from their home near Norristown, June 2 last, and smothered the infant under his coat. Pascal was sentenced upon the kidnapping charge and sentence was suspended on the second-degree murder charge.

LIQUOR POURED IN RIVER

Vancouver Officials Unbans Flood
Gates of Forbidden Beverages.

NOTED HOTEL MAN DEAD

Leopold Michels Passes Away at
San Francisco Home.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 20.—Arrangements were made here today for the funeral of Leopold Michels, wholesale clothing merchant, capitalist and former lieutenant in the Confederate army. He died here last night at the age of 70.

Michels was one of the owners of the St. Francis hotel here and also was interested in the Bowman hotel system and the Ritz-Carlton Hotel company of New York, London and Paris. He was president of the Winnemucca Water & Light company.

Is Little Greater Than That
of Railway Mail Clerk.
