Day Ideal for Fray.

Two weeks' rain ended last night, and old Sol poked his nose out early this morning, making possible a football game, but the turf field was a bit soggy to the advantage of the heavier blue and gold.

The atmosphere around Berkeley tonight is decidedly "rah." It is the end of a perfect season for California. The Bruins have downed the Oregon Aggies and Washington State, and Stanford having kicked both Oregon and Washington, today's triumph is a glorious one for the Berkeleyites.

Sprott is the big noise on the Berkeley campus tonight. It was this 166-pound halfback who registered three California touchdowns. This boy Sprott is also a great tackler. Five touchdowns with each goal kicked and a successful drop-kick by Toomey comprise the total score.

Morrison opened the fray by kicking to Levi, who fumbled on Stanford's 25-yard line and Captain Majors recovered for the Bears. It was a poor kick and a lucky break for the Bears. Sprott, Morrison and Toomey gain yardage and after a series of plays, Toomey kicked goal. Score, California 3, Stanford 0, at the end of the first quarter.

Toomey Toss One Over.
A few minutes later the great California back worked the Stanford 20-yard line, from where Toomey drop-kicked between the posts.

Walter Powell's outfit caused the loyal Cardinal rooters to perk up a bit during the second quarter, holding the Bears twice for downs, once on their two-yard line and again on their ten-yard line.

Stanford kept the score down in the third quarter also, the Bears registering just before the close of the quarter. The rapid-fire attack which led to this touchdown started after the blue and gold had drawn a 15-yard penalty for holding and which placed the line through the Stanford defense considerably.

Stanford's defense posed as if he intended to start a forward pass, Toomey slipped behind him, grabbed the oval and skirted left end.

A well-rehearsed forward pass then put the ball 20 yards nearer the goal. Toomey tossed it to the marvelous end, "Buck" Muller. Successive rushes terminated in Morrison crossing the line through the Stanford defense and a yardage gain made by Center Latham, who played like a champion, which is remarkable, in view of the fact that he was opposed by "Swede" Righter, a very capable performer. Toomey converted, making the score California 17, Stanford 0.

Cards Bare Their Teeth.
Templeton started the fourth quarter by kicking to Morrison. Three successive forward passes, one, Sprott to Muller, and two, Sprott to Hall, brought a total of 37 yards. Fighting like so many Kilkenny cats, the Cards were penalized for holding on their eight-yard line. The ball is now four yards from the goal and the gigantic bruin backs have four downs in which to make it. Degroot is sent in a right guard in place of Deeds to plug a hole in the center of the line.

Deeds fumbled, but recovered and Morrison scored on an "off-tackle" buck. Erb kicked goal. California 24, Stanford 0.

Nisbit replaced Morrison at full-back for the Bears. Morrison had covered himself with glory and coach Smith wanted to give Nisbit a chance. Nisbit kicked over Stanford's goal line and the ball was brought out 20 yards and placed in scrimmage. Stanford became desperate and tried anything. Sprott intercepted one of Quarterback's forward passes and after a series of line bucks carried the ball over for the fourth touchdown. Erb kicked goal. California 31, Stanford 0.

Sprott Over for Fifth.
Campbell took Captain Wilcox's place at halfback. Nisbit intercepted another forward pass on Stanford's 30-yard line and a Bear forward pass, successfully executed with speed and precision, and going from Deeds to Muller, gave California 30 yards and put the stitched oval on Stanford's five-yard line. Sprott sailed through the guard for the fifth and final touchdown. Erb again kicked goal. The score, 38 to 0.

The game ended just as Sprott intercepted another Stanford forward pass on the Cardinals' 30-yard line. The entire California team played wonderful football. Fullback Patrick and Reb Shlademan did well on the defensive for Stanford.

CALIFORNIA GALLOPS BY STANFORD, 38-0

Tornado Crashes Through Porous Cardinal Line.

GLORY GOES TO SPROTT

27,000 See Game in Stadium While Thousands Watch Through Glasses From Hills.

BERKELEY, Cal., Nov. 20.—(Special.)—The California golden tornado mopped up Stanford, its ancient and legendary foe, here this afternoon, 38 to 0.

First down after first down through the center of the Cardinal line and off tackle bucks tells the story of the Bear triumph. Any Smith's well-oiled machine improved as the show progressed and the Cards tried in vain for three touchdowns during the last period.

Tommy Milton in his high-powered Deussenberg could not have made much more yardage than did Pesky Sprott, Toomey, Morrison and Karl Deeds.

Tornado Awaits Princeton.
This quartet of sterling backs tore Stanford's line asunder, and the greatest Pacific coast creation since Hugo Bezdek's 1916 Oregon juggernaut won the Pacific Coast conference championship and the undisputed right to play Princeton or whatever school comes from the East to Pasadena New Year's day.

Twenty-seven thousand howling students, alumni and just plain bugs howled themselves hoarse as the battle progressed. Every seat in the huge stadium was sold days before the contest and thousands were unable to see the game. The hillside on the east side of the enclosure was a mass of humanity, some watching the feud through field glasses and others containing their breath in a bird's-eye view on the west side of the coliseum.

Between the two minutes to be played next year will retain the cup permanently. Over the par 75 course Stein shot a 75, Stoll 76 and Will 77.

80,000 SEE HARVARD TOE TAME YALE, 9-0

Crimson Wins on Kicks When Savage Ellis Hold.

TEAMS FREE WITH PASS

Contest Is 39th Between Two Schools and Good as Triumph in New Haven.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Nov. 20.—(Special.)—In their attacks at the Yale goal today, Harvard resorted to kicking and with three field goals defeated the Elis, 9 to 0, in the annual football combat in the Yale bowl.

The contest, witnessed by nearly 80,000 fans, and the 39th between the two universities, was a remarkable exhibition of the open and aerial game.

While loosely played at times it fairly bristled with thrilling forward passes and sweeping runs.

The Yale players, though occasionally they battled as savagely that although Harvard's campaign several times drove the Elis back to the shadow of their own goal posts, a touchdown was beyond the physical ability of the crimson eleven, led by Arnold Horner.

Three of Five Trials Succeeded.
In this crisis Harvard fell back upon the kick and three times out of five booted the ball between the uprights, while Yale left the field with the satisfaction of having partially checked its greatest rival in a triumph considered such a foregone conclusion that Harvard cohorts were offering odds of three to one before the game.

Both teams showed a stronger defense than attack and this was particularly notable in the case of Yale. Harvard found it reasonably easy to gain ground between the 35-yard lines, but once within striking distance Yale stiffened. Considered entirely from a technical standpoint, Harvard was the better team, but the individual efforts of the eleven offset this team advantage.

Against the simple plays of the home team Harvard dug a compact or wide defense as the attack required, and seldom did the Elis ball carrier find an avenue of advance open for more than a second or two.

Two Barred for Roughness.
The very intensity with which Yale made its last stand added to the thrill and excitement. So keen did the rivals struggle that toward the close of the third period the unusual spectacle of two players being retired for roughness from a big eastern football classic was witnessed, when Quarterback Hampton of Yale and Leftback Gaston of Harvard were sent out after a brief conference.

While Harvard could not cross the Yale goal line, it could and did move when necessity required within striking distance of a field goal. Harvard gained 210 yards in 66 rushes, which gave five opportunities for field goals. Yale gained but 60 yards in 33 rushes and never seriously threatened the crimson goal, while Harvard was once within eight yards of a touchdown.

The scenic side of the contest surpassed any similar game staged in the Yale bowl.

80,000 in Yale Bowl.
Between 75,000 and 80,000 persons were seated in the concrete tiers. Viewed from the topmost tier, the East Avenue stadium appeared like a multi-hued flower bed in a sunken garden, with the brilliant red, purple and green turbans of the feminine spectators serving as the blossoms and the darker masses of other garments the earth from which the flowers sprang.

A fumble by Walker led to Harvard's scoring in the opening period. Owen had punted from the 40-yard line to Yale's 35-yard mark, where the ball bounded out of Walker's hands. Two Harvard players pounced on it. A forward pass to Owen gained 11 yards when Owen failed to gain. Buell tried to pass ahead again, but Yale boxed Harvard receivers effectively and the ball grounded. Rush and forward passes having failed, Buell used the kick and, standing on the 34-yard line, booted the ball over.

Teams in Punting Duel.
The teams fiddled for a time through a punting duel at the opening of the third period each waiting for a chance to take advantage of a punting advantage. After a series of plays a touchdown appeared to be no nearer accomplishment than before. The Crimson again had to kick for a score, but this time Captain Horner was on the propping end of the box.

The fourth period saw Harvard's advance reach its highest stage. Humphrey got it under way from Harvard's 40-yard line with a 23-yard run. The Crimson then tried to break through the Elis line. But the Blue held firm.

Yale then scattered to check a continued aerial offense and Owen and Horner took advantage of the openings and drove again and again into the separated Elis line for small gains. A first down on the Yale 13-yard line was the immediate reward.

Then Horner, for four yards, and Owen for one went ahead with the ball. Yale learned its lesson and moved into a closer line of defense, and Harvard's progress was seemingly stopped eight yards from the goal. Buell decided again to try for field goal. The scrimmage was on the eight-yard line, but he dropped the ball to the 13-yard mark and shot the ball through for the third field goal. Harvard played a defensive game thereafter.

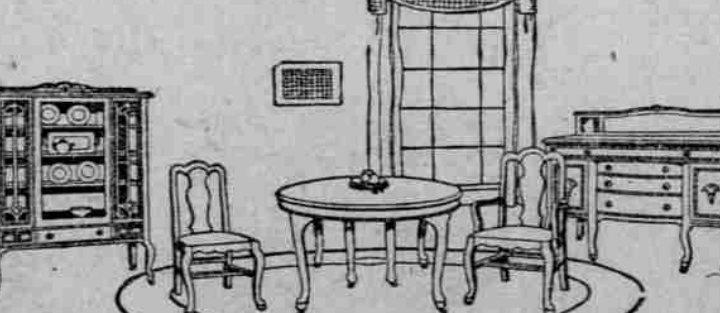
