

OHIO STATE BEATS ILLINOIS FOR TITLE

Western Conference Honors Go With 7-0 Win.

RECORD CROWD SEES GAME

Losers, Weakened by Absence of Captain and Star Kicker, Make Stubborn Fight.

Urbana, Ill., Nov. 20.—Ohio State took the 1920 football championship of the western conference back to the presidential state tonight.

In the most spectacular finish seen on Illinois field in years, the Ohioans defeated Illinois, 7 to 0, in the deciding game of the title fight today, when Myers, in the last 19 seconds, snatched a 37-yard forward pass from Workman, and kicked across the line for the only touchdown. Pete Stinchcomb, the brilliant Ohio left halfback, kicked goal. By winning today Ohio has undisputed claim to the title. Both teams fought virtually on even terms until the final few minutes.

Illinois Fights Stubbornly. Illinois, weakened through the loss of Captain John Dapler, all-western center, and further crippled by injuries to Carney and Ralph Fletcher, star kicker, fought stubbornly to check the smashing Ohio attack. The Ohioans carried the fight into Illinois territory most of the game, although each eleven got within inches of the goal, but lacked the drive to put it across.

After the game the 5000 Ohio fans poured onto the field as Stinchcomb's goal was a success.

The Ohioans followed their 100-piece band in a wild and dance, while Illinois rosters remained in their seats singing "Illinois Loyalty."

Crowd Breaks Record. The crowd was the biggest that ever witnessed a football game here. There were 22,000 persons jammed within the gates. Thousands were turned away.

To Stinchcomb fell the main task of carrying the ball for Ohio. In the second period he gained 100 yards to gain that placed the ball on Illinois' 17-yard line. From there it was a dance to Illinois' one-yard line, where the Illinois stiffened. Again at the opening of the second half Stinchcomb received the ball from the Illinois kickoff for 48 yards, but Illinois kept the Ohioans away. Unable to make consistent gains near the end of the game Coach White sent in several fresh players and the famed Ohio forward pass was brought into play. Workman heaved four passes, but two were incomplete. The first placed the ball on Illinois' 42-yard line. The next two missed. On the fourth attempt Workman shot the ball 37 yards to Myers, who raced across the goal.

WISCONSIN DOWNS CHICAGO

3 to 0 Victory Places Winner Second in Conference Race.

CHICAGO, Nov. 20.—Allen Davsey's drop kick in the first quarter today gave Wisconsin three points to none for Chicago in a game in which Chicago gained much of its success fighting. A crowd of 30,000 witnessed the game.

The maroons, apparently facing a big defeat at the hands of the eleven which a week ago conquered Illinois, rushing into the contest with aggressive spirit, and the White Sox on the defensive in the first quarter.

The superiority of Wisconsin began to show in the second half. The victory placed Wisconsin in second place in the conference race.

MINNESOTA ENDS BAD YEAR

Michigan Winner in Football Contest by 3-0 Score.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Nov. 20.—Minnesota's first victory in its disastrous football season today when Michigan snatched a 3-to-0 victory, marking the Gophers' sixth straight big ten conference win this year. Tonight the "little brown jugs" emblematic of the gridiron supremacy, is on its way back to Michigan. The jug, which became a trophy in 1903, was recaptured by Minnesota last year after it had been in Michigan's possession 10 years.

It was the toe of Left Halfback Stuckey that made the difference in the game. Twenty thousand saw the game.

Dartmouth Revenged on Brown

BOSTON, Nov. 20.—Dartmouth won its first football victory over Brown in 15 years today in a bitterly fought contest that ended in a 14-to-0 score. The Green battled hard for its 14 points, all of which were scored in the first half, but was forced to fight even harder to stop the Brown eleven from wiping out the lead. Spectacular forward passing, punting and broken field running by both teams marked the whole game.

Notre Dame Wallops Northwestern

EVANSTON, Ill., Nov. 20.—After Northwestern university's football team had held the Notre Dame eleven scoreless for the first quarter, the visitors threw in the first-string men and later added Gipp, sensational halfback, whipping the western conference aggregation, 33 to 7. More than 18,000 persons saw the contest.

AMATEUR IS REAL SPORT

PROFESSIONAL AS RULE LOOKS ONLY FOR DOLLAR MARK.

Man Who Enters Athletics for Pleasure of Game Works Hard. Cares Only for Laurels Won.

Have you ever stopped to consider why one man takes a delight in entering competitive sports, or his pleasure, while the other man refuses to do so unless he is paid?

It is the old question of amateurism and professionalism. The professionally inclined man considers pugilism, as an example in point, his business. Some call it a "profession." Such a man will not start unless he is paid. Take the other man who indulges in boxing as a sport for sport's sake. This man has to go through just as severe training as the professional. He has to stand just as many bumps and bloody noses and yet many times gets nothing for his trouble of training. His hard knocks, or broken nose, is not even a ribbon indicative of victory. He gets a real thrill out of his competition and is more enthusiastic over the sport than the professional.

Take the college man in any type of sport. What does he get? He goes all through a season of many months, track, baseball, football, swimming, boxing, wrestling. There are no prizes, no medals, no cups. When it comes down to money prizes the college man would start a lynching party on the man who even suggested such a thing. The college man is all over and a team of boxers or what not has defeated its most deadly rival, the victory itself is the payment. When a college man "makes" his varsity team and plays or competes against the varsity considered the "big event" of the season or in a college conference series, that man is entitled to a sweater with the initials of his college. This is given him as a badge of honor and means more in the life of a college man than many thousands of dollars.

Why has the amateur this viewpoint, as opposed to the financial consideration the minority of men in sport have? The answer is simple. In many cases the man who demands money and becomes proficient in his sport, either cannot or will not bear himself to enter a substantial life of business. The majority of these men have not the brains, ability or ambition to do anything real. They prefer to hang round street corners, and once a week or twice a month engage in a boxing match. They are paid according to their rating in their so-called profession. Their life in competition as a general rule is short lived and their earning power quickly finds its end in this endeavor. Then he starts to look for work and very few make anything of themselves.

No laws will ever change this peculiar condition. The fact remains that the amateur sportsman not only gets more real fun out of his sport than the professional, but that the future holds greater possibilities for him in a business life than for the man who insists on payment for his services. There are exceptions, of course, but these exceptions are the brainy, thinking minority of the professional athletes.

JOE GANS THOUGHT PREMIER OF BOXERS

Negro Declared Better Than Benny Leonard.

AL HERFORD GIVES VIEW

Present Champ Miraculous Fighter, but Fails to Class With Great Colored Man.

Al Herford concedes that Benny Leonard is one of the greatest lightweights in the history of pugilism, but won't admit that he is really the superior of Joe Gans.

Herford brought Gans from obscurity to fame and handled him through all the years of greatness. Herford knew Gans as no other man knew him and since then has insisted that Gans was a peerless lightweight.

So much was said about Leonard—and much of it to Herford—that the veteran manager decided that he would see Leonard in action. He picked out the night when Benny took on a youngster named Loughlin and whipped him to a frazzle.

Afterward Herford said: "Leonard certainly is a miraculous fighter—but he is not another Joe Gans. There was but one Joe Gans—and there will never be another. I admit that Leonard has certain things that Gans lacked, but as an offset Gans had something that Leonard never will have. Each man has his own peculiarities; his own individual trickeries. And that's what makes them distinctive."

Gans had a way of tricking his opponents into coming to him. He never would rush when a rush wasn't of vital necessity. He would stand back and wait for his opponent to step into the trap. Leonard, on the other hand, is a rushing, aggressive fellow, who doesn't wait for the other man to come to him. He goes out after him.

Gans Had Great Night.

"Leonard said it on Gans inasmuch as he can knock out a man with either hand. Gans did most of his work with the right. He used his left hand mainly to wear down opponents to a point of exhaustion. Probably, if he had tried, he could have scored innumerable knockouts with his left. But he was always content to use the left for chopping purposes only. Leonard uses the left to drop as well as chop them down."

"Leonard knows nothing much about the art of conservation—which was one of Gans' mightiest assets. The negro never wasted an ounce of energy. He was all action, all fight—when the moment for it came. At other times he simply nursed along his endurance and his strength."

"Perhaps Leonard doesn't need to conserve his strength like Gans did, for he is constituted differently than Gans. He is a rugged, powerful chap with a seemingly inexhaustible supply of stamina. Gans was, despite his fist's greatness, a rather frail warrior. He had to save his strength as he could, and he certainly knew how to save it."

Leonard Fails to Conserve.

"Perhaps if Leonard had the Gans physique and knew that his endurance powers weren't so amazing he might learn conservation. But he never has needed to learn it because he has an inexhaustible supply of energy. But it may be well for him to learn it because the day might come when he will need every ounce of energy which he has."

"I feel that the greatest lightweight battle of all time that is conceivable would be one over a distance route involving Benny Leonard of the present time and Joe Gans when he was at his superlative best. It would be a fight worth going across the continent to witness; a battle between men so evenly matched that none would dare to make a definite prediction as to the winner."

HARVARD ELEVEN IS PLAYED

University Paper Says Team Falls in Courtesy to Visitors.

The Harvard Crimson, the university daily, came out on the eve of the football game with Center college with an editorial saying Harvard students for their failure to recognize good playing by visiting teams.

"The best host is the one who creates an atmosphere in which all his guests want to join," said the Crimson. "Is there any reason why the Harvard side of the stadium should show a silent indifference to its present, a sort of cold superiority to the presence of smaller colleges? Why should the University of California games the exhibition of enthusiasm and fine sportsmanship which Harvard can and has shown?"

"So far the host in the stadium has done too little to create an atmosphere which will make those who 'bo' feel decidedly out of place. We expect the team to act like sportsmen. Why not expect as much from the Harvard supporters, instead of a passive indifference?"

DARTMOUTH WILL GET ROYAL WELCOME TO SEATTLE.

Hanover Eleven to Play University of Washington and Will Be Greeted in Western Fashion.

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 20.—(Special.)—Dartmouth alumni of the Northwest are planning on giving the Dartmouth eleven a royal reception when they arrive in Seattle to meet the University of Washington football team in the new Stadium, Saturday after Thanksgiving.

According to present plans the Hanover team will leave Boston, November 20, a few hours after it has played its last game at Harvard field. It is scheduled to arrive in Seattle the following Wednesday over the Milwaukee. Delegations from the Dartmouth Alumni association here and of the University of Washington will be on hand to give the men from Hanover a typical Seattle reception.

Two sections have been set aside for the supporters of the visitors. One section and part of another will be occupied by the Dartmouth alumni and rooters. The remaining part, according to plans of Hanover alumni, will be set aside for all alumni of eastern colleges who want to be in that section.
