

ALL U. S. WATCHING CITY ROSEWAY GROW

Boy Scouts May Plant Around Home for Aged.

PERMANENT ARCH SCHEME

Material Left From Festival Can Be Used for Project, Idea of H. H. Haynes.

Portland's proposal for a roseway along Sandy boulevard is attracting nation-wide attention. H. H. Haynes, whose suggestion to transform the thoroughfare into a bower of beauty is being backed by various clubs here, told members of the festival auxiliary at its last session in the Chamber of Commerce green room. Various suggestions for being submitted, Mr. Haynes said, with a view to making the proposed roseway as beautiful as possible. One of the best proposals is that Boy Scouts of Portland and vicinity be assigned the grounds surrounding the P. J. Mann home for the aged for planting rose slips and that they perpetually attend to their upkeep, thus performing a service of much value to the scheme itself, but assisting in addition to contribute a wonderful feature to inmates there.

Archway Is Planned.
Another plan is to erect an arch typifying the spirit of the rose festival. The arch would be constructed at the city entrance of the roseway. At the corporate limits, Mr. Haynes would like to have built a suitable arch with words signifying that the visitor is about to enter Portland, the rose city, with something worked out to emphasize the welcome.

"I do not know whether this plan can be worked out or not," said Mr. Haynes, "but I hope it will be. I am told there is considerable material left over from each rose festival that should be utilized for some permanent purpose. It seems to me that we should be able to work out this archway feature by conserving our materials by means of planning for its use in some way along the roseway. Of course, I am very anxious to see the name of the thoroughfare changed from Sandy boulevard to Roseway."

"Our plan for planting climbing roses on the poles along the way has met with the opposition of the Northwestern Electric company, but we have countered on that by starting a movement to have the city order the poles removed. That would be even better than our original plan."

35,000,000 See Pictures.
"The roseway has already attracted nation-wide attention and is giving Portland more publicity perhaps than any other single thing just now. In the first place, there was the newspaper publicity attending the planting of the first roses recently. Then came the exhibition of motion pictures throughout the country, these having been shown, according to the Pathé people, to approximately 35,000,000 people everywhere."

"From all sections of the country we are receiving letters from people interested in rose culture and city beautifying and clippings from various publications. For example, one of the St. Louis newspapers having a circulation of 200,000 daily devoted nearly a column editorial to the subject, the editor writing to the effect that the mayor of St. Louis had been called upon to assist in practically every conceivable form of civic enterprise, but that he had never yet been asked to officiate at any such feature as planting roses like Portland's mayor did."

Mr. Haynes announced that there will be ample slips eventually to execute the plan to make this roseway into a long bower of beauty as C. F. Keyser, superintendent of parks, has planted more than 15,000 slips in the Mount Tabor school grounds in preparation to providing plenty for the big job, including the boy scouts feature.

CAMP LEWIS IS SEVENTH

PLACE IN RECRUITING FOR QUARTER ANNOUNCED.

Because of Geographic Location and Population, Mark Is Declared Equal to Any.

TACOMA, Wash., Dec. 4.—(Special.)—Camp Lewis ran seventh in order for new recruits obtained during July, August, September and October, according to an official report which has just reached Tacoma from the war department. With geographic location and population considered, the showing made by Camp Lewis was declared to equal the best in the country.

With a total of 30,518 enlistments reported during these months, Camp Lewis obtained 805, with 270 to its credit for the month of October, Camp Gordon, Ga., was credited with the largest total, 2659 men. Camp Pike, Ark., with 2315, ran second; Camp Dix, N. J., 2072, third; Camp Grant, Ill., came fourth with 1631; Camp Zachary Taylor, with 988, and Camp Meade, Md., ran fifth and sixth, respectively. Enlistments for foreign service for the four months shown by the report included 3771 men for service in Germany, 1829 for Hawaii, 883 for Panama, 186 for the Mexican border, 153 for Philippines and 103 for Alaska.

LUMBER MILL TO CLOSE

Galvin, Wash., Plant Will Suspend Till Market Improves.

CENTRALIA, Wash., Dec. 4.—(Special.)—The Lincoln Creek Lumber company, operating at Galvin, will close down on December 15 until market conditions improve. The Emery & Nelson, O'Connell and W. P. Graham mills at Napavine are in operation. The Emery & Nelson plant, however, is scheduled for a three weeks' shutdown in the near future for repairs.

The Carlisle-Pennell mill at Unalakleet will continue to operate it is said. A notice has been posted at the mill announcing a 20 per cent reduction in wages, effective Monday.

COLLECTORS' MEET SET

Others on the programme include J. S. Hutchinson of the Portland bureau of license, Will F. Lipman of Lipman, Wolfe & Co., F. D. Wisner of San Francisco; Gus C. Moser of the Oregon senate, and L. M. Travis, president of the Lane County Credit association of Eugene, Or.

At 11:30 the convention will adjourn its business session to take a ride on the river to view Portland's waterfront and harbor facilities. Luncheon will be served at terminal No. 4, St. Johns. At 6 o'clock there will be a banquet in the main dining room of the Chamber of Commerce and at 8:15 a theater party will conclude the programme.

The Oregon association, which had 25 members last year, has 44 this year.

WELFARE WORK EXPANDS

CHILDREN FARM HOME DRIVE BY W. C. T. U. IMPORTANT.

Organization Will Care Properly for Homeless and Orphan Waifs Under Correct Influences.

Giving aid and succor to women and children in distress for many years has been one of the leading functions of the Oregon Women's Christian Temperance union, and the present drive for a \$125,000 fund for the establishment of a children's farm

home for homeless and orphan waifs is but a continuance and enlargement of the work which this organization has been doing for more than a quarter of a century.

It was only last week that Mrs. Mary L. Mallett, state president, saved a 17-year-old girl from the state reform school, after the girl's family and friends had deserted her. This girl is now in the home of a well-to-do Portland family and is attending a business college in order to fit herself for a life of usefulness. Had it not been for the offices of Mrs. Mallett, the girl now would be an inmate of the girl's reformatory, with the stigma of that institution always upon her.

In connection with the present drive for a children's farm home, the state headquarters has received a letter from a despondent mother at Lebanon, begging the W. C. T. U. to assist her in finding a good home for her two boys, 11 and 13 years old. The mother wrote that her husband recently had been sent to the state penitentiary to serve a ten-year sentence. She is unable to take care of her sons, and she likewise fears that unless the boys are able to find a home with the proper influence they will follow in the footsteps of their father, who has been convicted as a felon of the most degraded type.

"Please assist a broken-hearted mother to find a home for her two sons whom she dearly loves," is the pleading tenor of the letter. Officials of the organization are now bending every effort to find a suitable home for the youngsters.

EX-CLERK IS NOT LIABLE

Judge Rules County Has No Right to Sue F. S. Fields.

Circuit Judge Gatens yesterday held that the county had no right of action against F. S. Fields, ex-county clerk, for recovery of the unearned portion of funds lost in the failure of the American Bank and Trust Co. The money consisted of unearned fees totaling \$15,255 paid in advance by litigants.

Mr. Fields, who was in office prior to 1913, deposited the surplus money in the trust company which later failed. The legislature in 1917 provided for payment to litigants of a certain portion and 55 per cent went out in dividends. There remains now as cause of action about \$2500 in earned fees which will remain in the county's complaint. Judge Gatens held that Mr. Fields had acted merely as custodian for the litigants, the money having been deposited \$10 at a time. The ruling followed arguments by Deputy District Attorney Pierce and C. D. Christenson.

NORMAL SCHOOL PRAISED

Steward of Benson Hotel Thinks Methods Are Good.

Praise for the scientific management of the school and dormitory of the Oregon state normal school at Monmouth, Or., was the chief note in the remarks of Henry Thiele, chief steward of the Hotel Benson, upon his return from a visit to the school, where he lectured Friday morning on "Discipline of Employees" and "Economic Home Life." Mr. Thiele especially commented on the efficiency of President Ackerman and Mrs. Tutt, dean of women.

"It is a wonderful school," said Mr. Thiele. "The students are not instructed only in modern methods of teaching. Wholesome living is a part of each day's programme. Many people have the impression that a good education could only be acquired in Europe, but American schools by far excel those of any of the countries I have visited."

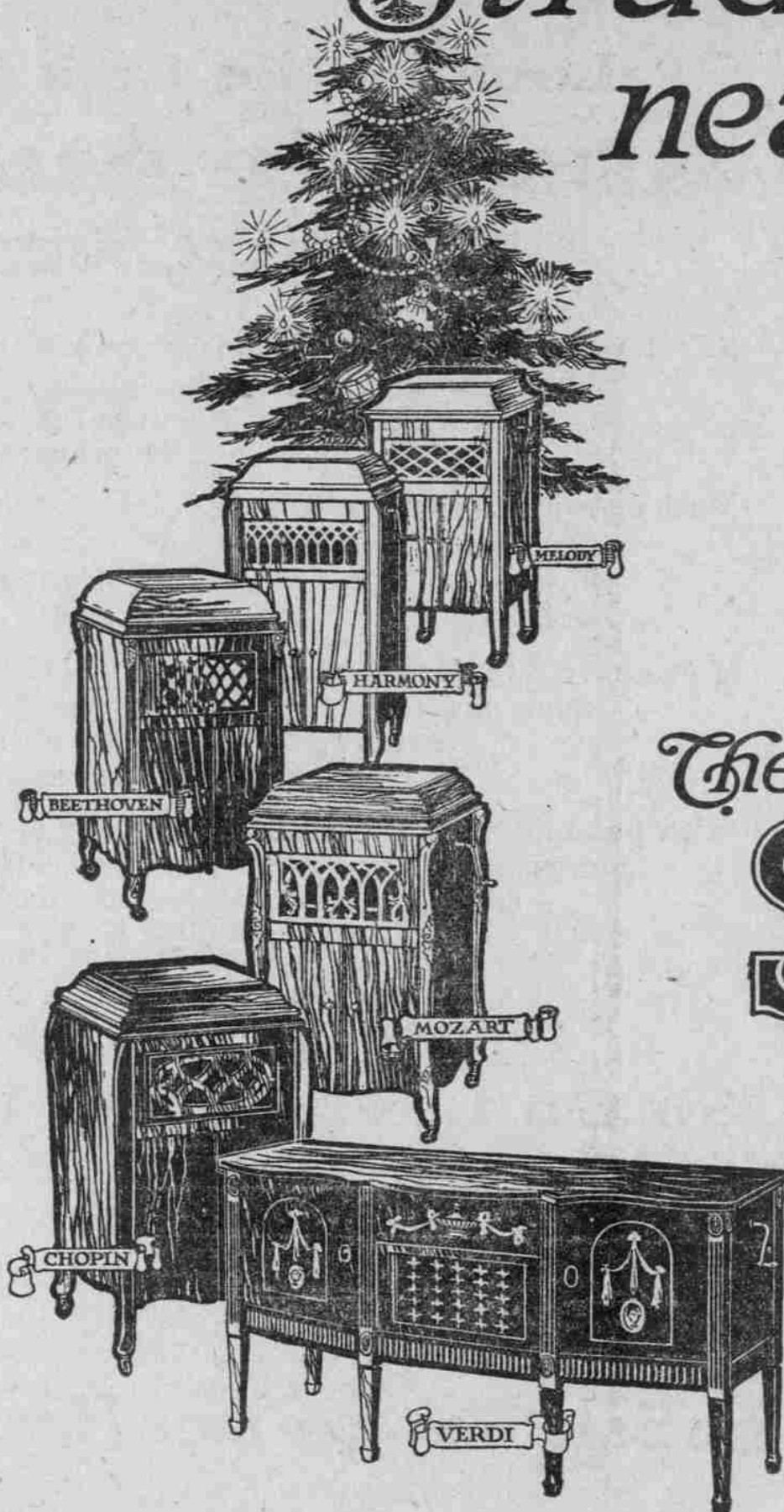
Bend May Get Sewer System.

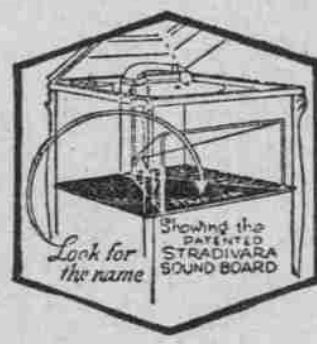
