

SEVERAL COUNTIES TO LOSE SENATORS

Redistricting State Task of 1921 Session.

NUMBER NOT TO DECREASE

30 Now in Upper House; Joint Districts in Isolated Sections Is Popular Plan.

Redistricting the state into legislative districts will be one of the features of the 1921 session which will arouse the interest of each of the 90 members of the senate and house. Many of the present districts will probably be revised and this is especially true of the districts embracing several counties.

Thirty are members of the senate and there will be that number after the reapportionment, but some striking changes will be made. Jackson county may lose its senator, but will have an interest in two joint senatorships. One plan under process of incubation is to throw Jackson county and Josephine county into one district instead of each having a separate senator. By this arrangement Dr. J. C. Smith, newly-elected senator for Josephine, would become joint senator for Josephine and Jackson.

Thomas Will Lose Out.
C. M. Thomas, now senator for Jackson, would be on the cold outside, as his term expires with the coming session, and if he wanted to be re-elected he would have to seek support in Josephine county two years hence, and Mr. Thomas isn't believed in Josephine county, particularly among the fishermen. Mr. Thomas might try his luck for the other joint senatorship.

This other possible joint senatorship is supposed to consist of Klamath and Lake counties and Jackson. At present Klamath and Lake are coupled with Crook, Deschutes and Jefferson, making the largest joint district in Oregon. There has always been considerable fighting between the two ends of this district, so Klamath and Lake may be put off into a district by themselves, adding Jackson to assure a sufficient population for the district. In such a district, Klamath would probably control the senator.

Plan May Satisfy Voters.
With Klamath, Lake and Jackson linked, this would leave Crook, Deschutes and Jefferson a joint district, and would probably satisfy the voters of those three counties. Grant, Harney and Malheur now form a district. There is a prospect of a district being formed of Harney and Malheur. As Crook is represented by three and his residence is at Burns, he would be the joint senator for Harney and Malheur. This arrangement leaves Grant to be accounted for.

Baker has an individual senator. Grant county is adjacent so it can be linked to Baker. Democrats may be observed, have a shade the best of it in Baker county, but Grant is strongly republican, with Grant and Baker a joint senatorial district, the republicans of Grant county, with their partisans in Baker, would dictate the election of the senator. This is an unfortunate circumstance for W. H. Strayer of Baker, who is the only democrat in the senate, and a joint senatorial district of this character would practically prevent his return to the upper body of the legislature.

Marion May Lose Senator.
Marion has two senators. Some members of the legislature consider Marion has one too many. Clackamas has one senator and a joint with Multnomah and Columbia. It is suggested that Marion and Clackamas each have one senator and the two counties have a joint senator. This arrangement would slightly decrease Marion and give Clackamas half of a joint senator instead of one-third of a joint.

With Marion and Clackamas in a joint district, Clackamas some time might get the joint district, whereas in the joint district with Multnomah and Columbia it will never have the chance, as Multnomah will control the district.

These are only some of the possible combinations which are being mulled over by members of the senate who are thinking of such things.

The reapportionment will be in the hands of a joint committee, to be appointed by President Rittner and Speaker Beane. It will probably consist of five members of the senate and five from the house, with the president and speaker being included. Presumably the respective chairmen of the committees on resolutions will be on the special committee.

S. B. HUSTON EULOGIZED
Judge Pipes Offers Resolution in Honor of Late Attorney.

Resolutions eulogizing the late Samuel Bruce Huston, state senator and prominent attorney, were adopted yesterday by the Multnomah County Bar association. A large number of attorneys and all of the members of the circuit bench gathered in the courtroom of Presiding Judge Tazewell to participate in the services.

Addresses were made by Judge Martin L. Pipes, M. B. Meacham, E. B. Tongue, James B. Kerr, Dr. C. E. Cline, Chief Justice McBride and Circuit Judge Stapleton. Mr. Huston's early career and later participation in public affairs were outlined.

The resolutions, presented by Judge Pipes, cited Mr. Huston as a lawyer who exemplified in his life and profession the highest traditions on the due and orderly administration of justice, and declared that he had served the people of the state with distinction and honor.

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16 TRACTS OF STUMP LAND TAKEN BY PURCHASERS.

Johnson-Dodson Company Reports Results of Development Programme Near Oak Point.

A total of 16 tracts aggregating 595 acres of stump land have been sold by Johnson-Dodson company in the vicinity of Oak Point, Wash., as the result of the stump land development programme which they have been carrying out in that district.

Purchasers of land in that section, they report, include four men from the state of Utah and another from Arizona. They report considerable demand for the property from new arrivals in this section and also considerable correspondence with non-residents who are contemplating coming to this section.

A new road is now being built through the section and preliminary work is being done for the erection of a shingle mill. With this in view the Oak Point Shingle company has been organized and plans for the proposed mill are being prepared. It is expected to have the mill erected so that operations can be started in the spring, it was announced. The mill will be operated with a double crew, day and night.

The Johnson-Dodson company is especially advocating the purchase of the tracts and the growing of evergreen blackberries or other berries while the work of clearing out the stumps is in progress. It is declared that these berries may be grown and made to yield a profit before the stumps have been removed. An investigation as to the feasibility of such a plan, they declare, has received favorable reports from various sections.

S. Christensen, vice-president and general manager of the Battle Ground Canning company at Battle Ground, Wash., reported that his company paid out \$2800 this year to one family for evergreen blackberries, which were picked from six acres of natural growth vines on stump land.
