FOX EXHIBITION PLANNED
Canada to Receive Entries From Many Countries.

OTTAWA, Ont.—The importance by the Canadian government to the development of the breeding of fur-bearing animals in captivity is indicated by the fact that its committee on conservation will hold the first international exhibition of live, ranch-bred silver foxes at Montreal beginning Wednesday, November 24. Many entries already have been received, notably from Prince Edward Island, while fox breeders in the United States and other countries have promised to be represented.

During the exhibition it is expected to form a fur breeders' association of Canada to organize and manage future exhibitions which it is expected to hold annually, and to include not only foxes, but mink, beaver, muskrat and other fur bearers reared in captivity.
