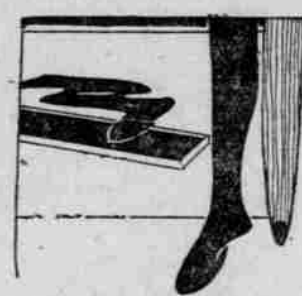

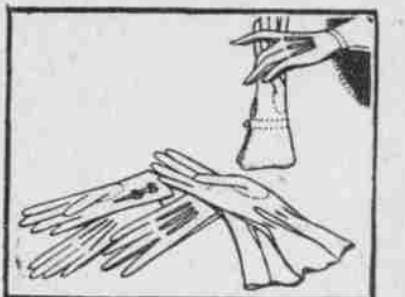

STUDENTS TO EXCHANGE

American Business Men Seek Better Relations With Mexico.

NEW YORK.—In an effort to improve and strengthen the relationship between the United States and Mexico, the American chamber of commerce, Mexico City, is now enrolling business men, chambers of commerce and public-spirited institutions throughout the United States in support of this project.

"One object of this plan," says the national foreign trade council, "is to place Mexican students in American colleges and technical schools so as to fill them for useful careers. Another object is to place young Mexicans as apprentices in American mills and factories where they will get industrial training."

The American chamber of commerce of Mexico is also arranging to provide opportunities for young men

from the United States to study in Mexican schools and industrial establishments. In this way, mutual understanding between the two countries will be greatly improved.

Over 80 scholarships have already been offered by various colleges throughout the United States. It is expected that many more will be available for this purpose. The committee on Mexican-American scholarships of the American chamber of commerce, Mexico City, is now enrolling business men, chambers of commerce and public-spirited institutions throughout the United States in support of this project.
