### Baby, Carefree, Is Hero of Party of Castaways.

Storm Wrecks Lumber Schooner  
Inca—Survivors Picked Up by  
Freighter West Holbrook.

HONOLULU, T. H., Jan. 22.—The 8-months-old boy of Captain James J. Winther of Oakland, Cal., master of the lumber schooner Inca, was the happy, carefree little hero of a party of castaways numbering 11 who were picked up by the freighter West Holbrook after drifting three days in an open boat and brought here en route to the mainland recently.

The story of the survivors, who were Captain Winther, his wife and babe and nine sailors of the Inca's crew, was that the schooner, laden with 1,600,000 feet of lumber from Eureka for Sydney became water-logged December 8. The captain put his wife and child and the nine sailors in the schooner's boat, while he and one man stood by the Inca, whose decks were awash, and the deckhouse and three of the five masts carried away by the storm. Radio advices later reported that a steamer took the Inca in tow and brought her to Sydney.

Meanwhile the castaways drifted 73 hours in the ship's boat with only a little canned meat for food and a few gallons of water to drink.

The storm that practically wrecked the Inca drove the West Holbrook 150 miles out of her course and she sighted the 11 from the Inca, with a piece of old shirt hoisted on a boat-hook as a signal of distress and a piece of canvas for a sail.

"The baby cooed through it all," said one of the survivors. "He was the most carefree of any of us and took the whole adventure as a picnic. We nearly lost him hoisting him aboard the West Holbrook."

None of the survivors showed any ill-effects, except Mrs. Winther, who became hysterical once the danger was past and she was safe aboard the West Holbrook.

### Caring for Co-Eds' Health Part of University Work.

Dr. Bertha Stuart Dymont Under-  
takes to Keep Women Well  
Rather Than Care for Them  
After They Are Sick.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Jan. 29.—(Special.)—Caring for the health of the women of the university is an important part of the university health programme under the direction of Dr. Bertha Stuart Dymont. To keep the women well rather than care for them after they are sick is the aim of this work.

"We are not the university 'sick service,'" Dr. Stuart said. "When the girls are sick, we send them to the infirmary." However, Doctor Stuart has worked with women for about 20 years and has found that one of the prerequisites of a healthy physical condition is proper weight, and it is to this end she has been devoting most of her energy.

"You are about 15 pounds under weight," she will say to a patient.

"But I'm as fat as I want to be already," the patient will wail. "I don't want to gain!"

"Don't want to gain?" Dr. Stuart will exclaim. "Do you think those bones are pretty?"

And then, Dr. Stuart will tell from ten to 20 girls each day why they should gain. The majority of cases brought to her attention are of malnutrition.

"There is a certain amount of weight," she will say, "which a person should have in order to have vitality and resistance to disease."

"But I feel all right—and I'm never sick!"

At this almost never failing statement, Dr. Stuart will smile a knowing smile—and tell the tale of the girl who was "never sick," but who could not come back to school on account of illness.

### Japan Leads in Divorces on Basis of Marriages.

Germany Has Highest European  
Rate of Marital Failures.

TOKIO, Jan. 29.—The assertion is made here that Japan leads the world in proportion of divorces to marriage. Unofficial reports state that the number of divorces in 1919 were 56,741, as against 503,236 marriages, a ratio of 112.3 divorces to each 1000 marriages.

This is compared to the German rate of 21.6 per thousand, which is said to be the highest divorce rate in Europe. Unofficial figures indicate that Japan's rate of increase in population was about one-half in 1919 by influenza and high cost of living. The estimated yearly increase of Japan's population has generally been assumed to be about 800,000.

In 1918 the customary estimated census showed an increase of about 600,000, while in 1919 the increase was only 308,794.

### MASONIC GROWTH RAPID

New Temple in London Planned by  
Members of Lodge.

LONDON, Jan. 29.—Three times as many Masonic lodges were instituted in 1920 in England and those parts of the dominions where the United Grand Lodge of England has jurisdiction, as in any of the previous seven years, according to a report just made public here. Similar increases were announced by Scottish and Irish Grand lodges and chapters.
