VICE-PRESIDENT OF PHOENIX IRON WORKS DIES.

C. Henry Fox.—Funeral services were held at Finley's chapel Thursday afternoon for C. Henry Fox, a veteran official of the Southern Pacific railway, who died Tuesday at his home, 1325 East Burnside street. Concluding services were held at the Portland crematorium.

At the time of his death Mr. Fox was vice-president of the Phoenix Iron Works, of which he was one of the founders. Prior to his connection with this company he was for 20 years connected with the Southern Pacific railway, rising from the position of messenger at Oregon City to that of chief dispatcher. He died at the age of 63 years and spent all but the first two years of his life in this state. He was born at Rockyview, Conn.

Surviving Mr. Fox are his widow, Mrs. Emma Fox; his mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Fox of Rockyview; a brother, J. J. Fox, and a sister, Mrs. Rosina Evans, both of this city. He was a Shriner and a member of the Knights of Pythias.

LOTTOS RETIRED THURSDAY.—Retrial of Thomas Lotso on a charge of murdering his child-wife, whom he married in England, will begin in the circuit court next Thursday. The jury disagreed in the first case. Assignment of the case to Circuit Judge Stapleton or Circuit Judge Morrow by Presiding Judge Kavanaugh is expected. Judge Tucker, who heard the first case, has asked that it not be returned to him.
