

COMMITTEES FORM FOR RELIEF WORK

Reorganization of Wartime Workers Approved.

EFFICIENCY IS INCREASED

Community Chest Project Generally Liked Because of Money and Time-Saving Features.

Organization of the forces of the city on doing away with drives, tag days, ticket sales and other frequent appeals to the public, the community chest campaign committee, has made rapid strides during the past week in the concentration for peace-time service to Portland of the famous liberty loan drive personnel.

E. N. Strong will be chairman of the community chest committee of the drive, and H. R. Blauvelt will be chairman of the committee on foreign corporations. It was announced last night by Emily Olmstead, chairman of the campaign committee. Floyd C. Lynch will be director of speakers, with Mrs. James McCarron assistant, and Walter Jenkins will be director of features and stunts, for the speakers and features committees of which Marshall N. Dana is chairman. Mr. Jenkins announced the committee of assistants to include L. V. Jenkins, John Hartog, Frank McCallis, Ferdinand Reed and George Hotchkiss. As well as a representative from each of the 56 organizations participating in the drive. A sensational campaign of feature thrillers is promised for the campaign week of March 28 by Mr. Jenkins.

Artists Contribute Work. The artists of the city have formed an informal committee to assist the drive by contributing their best ideas in poster and advertising art to the success of the campaign.

Approval of the chest plan has been voiced throughout the city, according to Mr. Olmstead, the business-like features of the time and money-saving programme for helplessness and good citizenship appealing to everyone. The guarantee which the chest provides that all work for the public will be done in the most efficient manner, but without possibility of carelessness in handling of the public funds, has been enthusiastically greeted by the public.

The 56 organizations in the drive fall into ten general divisions, hospitals and health agencies, children and babies' homes and day nurseries, citizen-building organizations, working-girls' clubs, girls' rescue homes, homes for homeless men, settlements, relief agencies, foreign relief and old folks' homes.

There are nine health agencies in the chest campaign. The co-operative Welfare society of Oregon maintains a clinic at Neighborhood house, Second and Wood streets, to fight the rising death rate among children. The clinics are held on Tuesdays and Fridays from 10:30 to 11 and are free, being for the purpose of training mothers in the care and feeding of children up to 2 years of age.

Safety Work Promoted. The Good Samaritan hospital, Twenty-third and Lovejoy streets, cared for 2300 patients in 1920.

The National Safety council, Oregon building, promotes the conservation of human life, safety, health and welfare in industry for the public generally, particularly as related to prevention of accidents, vocational disease and industrial sanitation.

The Parents' Educational bureau of the Oregon State Parent-Teacher association, 551 courthouse, is a bureau of suggestion for children from 6 months to 6 years of age, and for the distribution of literature pertaining to child welfare and pre-natal care. The Portland Parent-Teacher association, People's Institute, at Fourth and Jefferson streets, furnishes free medical care to the sick and needy. Treated in the hospital, St. Vincent's, affiliated with the University of Oregon medical school.

St. Vincent's hospital, head of Ford street, cared for 8000 patients in 1920.

Nursing Service Performed. The Visiting Nurse association, 1010 Spaulding building, benefits those unable to secure skilled attendance in times of illness, to promote cleanliness, to teach proper care of the sick and to help raise the health standard of the city. The association served 1896 families in 1920 and paid them 20,054 visits.

POSSES SEARCH FOR BOY

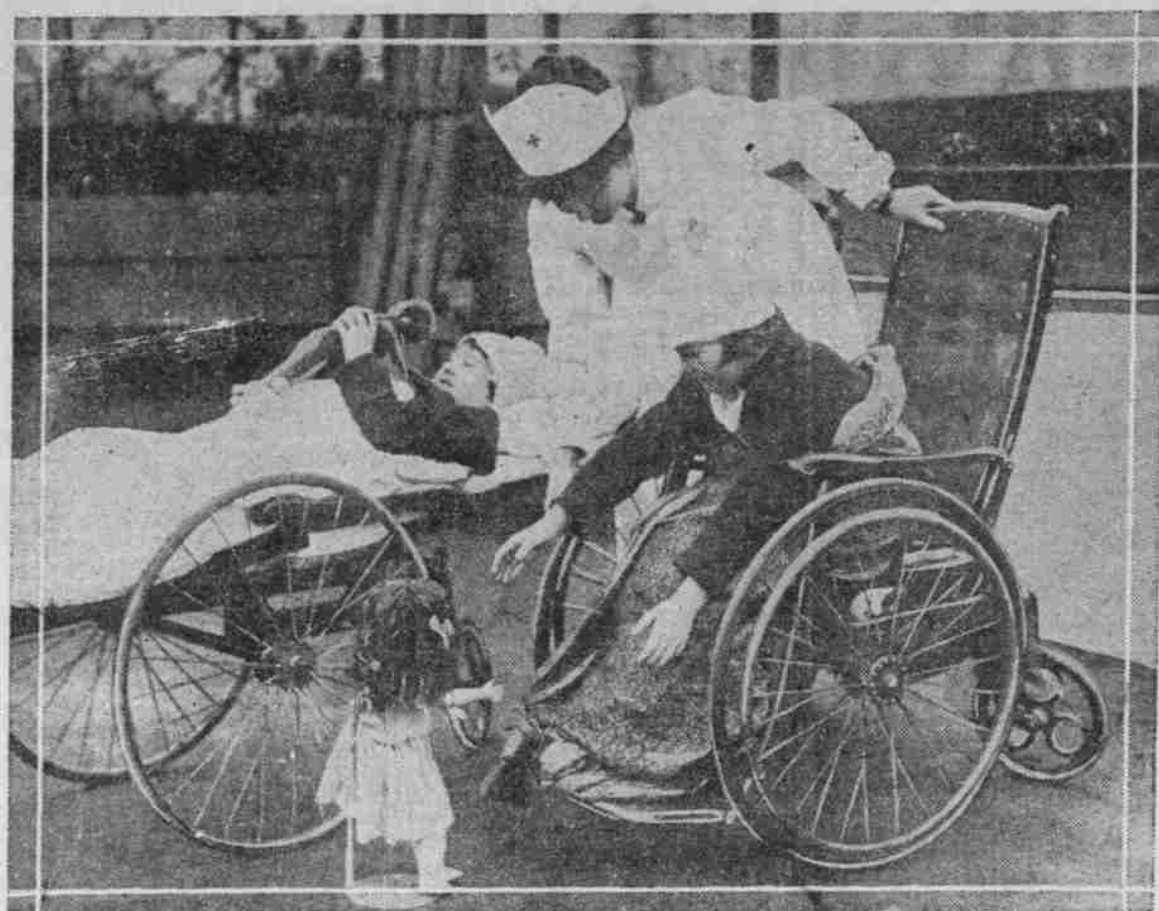
Juvenile Scouts Join Vancouver Men in Futility Round-Up.

BIG SCHOOL YEAR SEEN

H. W. STONE BACK FROM TRIP TO COUNCIL MEETING.

Portland Secretary Discovers Trend Among Eastern People to Move West for Homes.

That the educational movement throughout the United States is gaining constantly and that schools conducted by the Young Men's Christian association all over the country will reach a total registration for the year 1920-21 of approximately 120,000 students was the opinion expressed by H. W. Stone, general secretary of the Portland Young Men's Christian association, who returned to Washington, D. C., and New York City. The prospects are for a record year in education, he found, and after checking over reports coming from all educational centers he concluded that "Y. M. C. A. schools everywhere are in a flourishing condition."

Mr. Stone attended a meeting of the board of governors of the Y. M. C. A. educational council, of which he is chairman, in Washington, D. C., March 2 and 3. Plans were laid for furthering educational activities. In speaking of efforts in behalf of ex-service men he said:

"During the past year the Y. M. C. A. awarded scholarships to 11,625 ex-service men. A wide field was covered. Scholarships going to ex-service men in Y. M. C. A. classes and schools totaled 26,012; in non-Y. M. C. A. schools, 12,393; in correspondence schools, 17,740; in colleges and universities, 11,480. The cost of this project totaled \$4,176,829."

Upon his return to New York City, where he checked over reports at Y. M. C. A. headquarters, Mr. Stone said he found business men "very unhappy" because of the bad condition of the export business. "I found business conditions very much better on the Pacific coast than on the Atlantic," he added, "One of the striking features of my visit, which embraced Chicago, Minneapolis, Toledo, Cleveland, Youngstown, Brooklyn, Buffalo, New York, Detroit and Washington, D. C., was the expression of interest in coming to the Pacific coast. I could see a very impressive trend toward the west."

Mr. Stone witnessed the inauguration of President Harding.

TERRORISTS ARE RAIDED

KANSAS CITY POLICE BREAK UP DESPERATE RING.

Three Hundred Men Are Arrested and Liquor, Drugs, Guns and Ammunition Are Seized.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., March 12.—Three hundred men were arrested, thousands of dollars' worth of liquor and drugs seized and hundreds of guns, knives and much ammunition found today in police raids in Kansas City's "Little Italy."

The raids were continued tonight with more than sixty detectives participating. They followed reports to the police that a plot to kill high police and federal officers and create a reign of terror had been formulated. Gunmen, according to reports, were imported from other cities and they were to receive their pay from a fund of \$15,000 or more raised.

The raids were of a house-to-house nature and at many places entrance was forced. Still, some of them in operation were confiscated.

EXAMINATION OF CHILDREN OUT OF SCHOOL REQUIRED.

City Health Officer, However, Declares Measures Will Be Enforced Even With Police Aid.

City Health Officer Parrish is leading the forces of the health bureau, and has announced that unless the residents do not quickly change their course, he will call upon the Portland police department for action.

On the other hand, those who are opposing Dr. Parrish, declared that he has inaugurated some useless rules which work only hardship upon Portland children and that further he is absenting himself from his office, leaving no one there to receive complaints.
