DURNO OF OREGON STAR BASKETEER

Crack Forward Heads Both Ace Quintets of Coast.

COACHES SELECT TEAMS

All-Pacific and All-Northwest Lineups Officially Reported for 1920-21 Season.

WASHINGTON STATE COLLEGE, Pullman, March 12.—(Special.)—J. Fred Bohler, director of athletics at the State college of Washington, and advisory member of the basketball rules committee of the National Collegiate Athletic Association, representing the western district, has announced the official All-Pacific and All-Northwest basketball teams for the 1920-21 season just ended. According to the classification, Durno of the University of Oregon is the ace player of both teams, which are as follows:

All Pacific Squad: A. L. Northwest team: Durno, U. of O., Righter, Stanford, U. of O., Eggleston, U. of C., Hunter, U. of W., Adams, Stanford, U. of W., S. C.

Durno, Brilliant Player.

Commenting on the personnel of the teams, and other players incident to the basketball series, Director Bohler said:

"In picking these teams, considerable consideration has been given the judgment of the other coaches of the two conferences, and their choices were collected and compiled before the final selections were made."

"In the coast conference, Durno of Oregon is the unanimous choice of all the coaches for the first forward position. He is small, but makes up for this handicap with his speed, and clever dodging and dribbling. He makes long shots as well as short ones from any angle on the floor, besides converting a high percentage of his free throws. This is his third year on the all-coast team."

Righter Second-Forward.

"The second forward choice must go to Righter of Stanford. Although he cannot come up to Durno in cleverness, he has been a big factor in the strength of the Stanford team through his ability to locate the basket. He is large and strong, and has the knack of breaking through his guards and scoring when anywhere near the basket. Righter was another unanimous choice of the conference coaches. This is his second year on the all-coast team."

"For the center position, first choice must be accorded to Siek of Washington. Although he has been a member of the Sunflower squad for several years, he did not reach his stride until this season. He is an exceptionally large man, standing over 6 feet 6, which gives him a decided advantage over the other centers in the conference, enabling him to get the tipoff consistently. He is an excellent shot, especially from close under the basket, and with forwards feeding the ball to him, he scores consistently despite the closest guarding."

Mills Deserves Mention.

"Mills of Stanford deserves mention at the center position, with his weight and height, in addition to his quickness. He is a very promising player, and is expected to make a big name for himself in the near future."

"At guard, the first call must go to Eggleston of California. He is a brilliant and aggressive player, and is especially noted for his long shots. He is a fast man, a good dodger and a clever dribbler and is on the ball at all times. He uses good judgment in breaking up opponents' plays and is hard to score on. This is his second year on the all-coast team."

"The second choice at guard goes to Adams of Stanford, although this is his first year on the Cardinal team. He is an exceptionally large and heavy man, but a remarkably fast and shifty on his feet. Stanford's opponents found him a hard man to break through, and his aggressive guard and Eggleston as offensive guard make a combination that would be hard to beat anywhere."

Bryan Presses Adams Hard.

"Bryan of Washington deserves mention as a defensive guard. He was handicapped throughout the season with a badly sprained knee that required a heavy iron brace. This slowed him up considerably. At that, he gives Adams a close run for the position."

"Durno is the first choice forward of the northwest conference coaches, as well as those of the coast conference. He stands out in a class by himself."

"For second place there is little to choose from between Rich of Whitman, Stinson of O. A. C., Moe of Idaho, Wapato of Willamette, Rich has a slight edge because of his versatility, and he is a clever floor worker and a good dodger and dribbler."

"At center H. Latham is in a class by himself in the northwest conference. He is tall and rangy, aggressive and an accurate shot, particularly from close under the basket. Jackson of Willamette deserves mention for the center position."

Idaho Man Wins Position.

"Hunter of Idaho is named for the offensive guard position. Although he played forward in previous seasons, he was shifted to guard this year, where he has done very effectively, easily outscoring his opponents. His ability to make long shots makes him a valuable man for this position."

"The University of Washington State is given the second guard position or account of his general all-around playing ability. He is a clever dribbler and a good dodger, and he plays, as well as at working the ball down the floor."

"Teller of Oregon and Baird of Montana deserve special mention for the guard positions."

BEAVERS AGAIN GET SANTA MARIA RAINS

Ball Park Is So Wet Game Is Postponed.

BEAN CROP BENEFITED

Portland Ball Players Say to Have Plenty to Eat if Same Camp Is Used Again Next Year.

SANTA MARIA, Cal., March 12.—(Special.)—Every time Walter McCredie has brought his Beavers to this town to train and this is his fifth appearance, the rain has come with him. This time is no exception. It rained all last night and part of this morning and the ball park was so wet the game with the New York negro giants had to be postponed. However, Walt says there will be a game Sunday if the players have to wait for the infield. This coincidence of Walt's arrival in Santa Maria and that of the rain has happened so often that the natives hereabouts set their barometers by him.

Before the storm broke yesterday they were jubilant on how much the rain would help the bean crop. As it rained .53 inch during the night the beans should get a rare start.

Plenty to Eat Assured.

That is lucky in a way, for it insures that there will be plenty to eat for the Beavers if they come here next year and they all like the town so much that it is practically settled already. In the afternoon it cleared up sufficiently so that the squad got in plenty of work. There was no practice game, but all hands were put through fielding practice, Walt giving particular attention to the outfielders.

The Beaver manager had his eyes glued especially on two of his garden performers, young Walter Genie, last year with Spokane in the Pacific international, and Messall, who was sent here from Texas by Art Krueger. Both are fast and sure fly chasers, and Genie in particular has a great arm. Walt is greatly stuck on this kid and considers him a certain corner.

Genie also takes a sweet cut at the bat when he is at bat and as he is a left-handed batter he looks good in every way. Gus Fisher, recommended Genie in the first place, and the veteran has taken the young fellow under his wing here in camp.

Gas Always Pulling Something.

If Genie does something Fisher does not like, he meets the same kind kick-down that he gives to a straying chick. But just the same, Genie is always pulling something that makes the kid look good while Walt is around.

These two, Genie and Messall, however, are by no means the only good looking youngsters in training camp. In a burst of enthusiasm, Walt remarked that he never had such a likely looking gang of young fellows at training camp in his life. Their speed and pep are impressing everybody.

Of course that doesn't mean that three or four of them will make good right off the jump. That would be the last thing that Walt would want to see. But he has a good prospect that one of them, and very likely two, will show enough to be carried through the season. And several of the others are promising young fellows that Walt is certain to keep a string to them so he can have them when they are ripe for Coast league company next season or the season after.

Paton Is Promising.

This young fellow Paton, last season with Everett, Wash., is one of the best looking of the infielders. Walt had never heard much about Paton and he had so many youngsters on his list that he was sure of finding one to bring him to camp. But Paton and his chum, Gofforth, were so dead in earnest about it that they came to camp on their own hook and now Paton is showing in wonderful style at short. He has a fine pair of hands that grab everything they touch, and he is getting them to the right and to the left. He has a strong arm and the same quick way of getting the ball away as Hollier. Walt considers him a great prospect.

Young Johnny Fredericks of Portland, the youngest rookie in the squad, was turned out to the right and left, is mighty well liked by all the veterans for the serious way in which he is developing himself to the job of learning baseball.

Mouth Closed, Ears Open.

He keeps his mouth closed but his eyes and ears are open with a couple of feet, someone gives him a tip he remembers it. He is sure to make the club this season but when he takes a couple of years more under his belt and adds a little left to his frame and absorbs a season or two of experience he couldn't be kept out of the coast league by a mile high fence.

Walt is getting a little worried over the nonappearance of Jimmy Poole, his left-handed first baseman from the Virginia league. Poole is not a holdout, but he evidently has been some mix-up in regard to his transportation. Walt is anxious to have him here and playing first base so he can weld him into his infield combination.

With the arrival tonight of Herman Ross, brother of Sam Ross, Poole is not in camp, except for prospective Beaver not in camp, except for Marty Krug who is still holding out.

Built to Like Pine Tree.

When Sam induced Judge McCredie to sign up Herman he told the judge that his brother was as good as dead and had more stuff his way. Sam, with his six feet one inch, is no pigmy himself, but his hope on Herman was correct.

The youthful Mississippian has the build of a pine tree. He stands six feet three in his socks, weighs around 160 pounds and has a fine pitching flipper that a baseball looks like a marble in.

Sam says he is going to teach Herman all his pitching tricks and is looking around for another rabbit's foot to give his brother. He won't part with his own, which has proved so valuable since its presentation to him in Portland by the mysterious Miss Lotta Games.
