THREE ARTISTS COMMEMORATED.—The new exhibition at the art museum is one commemorating the artists Anders Zorn, J. Alden Weir and J. Francis Murphy. Zorn died last August, Weir a year ago in December and Murphy last January. The Swedish artist, Zorn, has an international reputation and is well known in America, having exhibited in all the large collections, while the Americans, Weir and Murphy, are men of distinguished attainment. Zorn is represented by five original oil paintings and a group of colored reproductions of his paintings; Weir, by 12 oil paintings and a group of exquisite pastels; Murphy, by two of his well-known landscapes. The regular hours of the museum are: Weekdays, 9 to 5 o'clock; Sundays, 2 to 5 o'clock; free the afternoon of Sunday, Tuesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

"TRENCH" STUDENTS ELECT.—Thomas A. Davis of Hillsboro was elected president of the student body of the Oregon Institute of Technology, conducted by the Portland Young Men's Christian association, at the regular election of officers last week. Other officers chosen were: Floyd Tatman, vice-president, Portland; A. H. Hughes, treasurer, Portland; Arthur W. Stafford, secretary, Mount Home, Idaho; Arthur S. Beckwith, athletic manager, Portland; William Woods, yell leader, Portland. The newly-elected officers will be inaugurated at a meeting of the student body Thursday.

AUTO SCHOOL TO OPEN.—A course in which 25 Portland business men will be taught how to repair their own type of automobile and avoid delays and expense on trips has been announced by the Oregon Institute of Technology. Sixth and Main streets, conducted by the Portland Y. M. C. A. Five instructors of the automobile school, under the direction of R. B. Spencer, principal, will give two hours laboratory teaching Tuesday nights for 10 weeks, starting next Tuesday night, J. B. Dunlap, dean of the school, said the instruction will be completed by the time summer automobile trips begin.

TRACHTUNG CEREMONIES BE DESCRIBED.—The inauguration ceremonies at Washington, D. C. when Mr. Harding became president, will be described by H. W. Stone, general secretary of the Portland Young Men's association, in a talk to the students of the Oregon Institute of Technology next Wednesday. Mr. Stone attended a meeting of the board of governors of Y. M. C. A. schools of the United States. Students will hear addresses by Bruce Evans, evangelist, Tuesday and Friday. Phil R. Sessions of the Portland Association of Credit Men, is scheduled to speak Monday, on "Moral Phase of Credit."

COLLEGE TO SHOW PICTURES.—Beginning Tuesday, March 15, three motion pictures will be presented in the Reed college chapel for the benefit of the Anna Mann estate fund. The first picture scheduled is "David Copperfield," which will be given at 4 and 8 o'clock. The following Tuesday "Rip Van Winkle" will be presented and the week after "The Lady of the Lake." These pictures have not yet been shown in Portland and a large audience drawn from members of the college community, alumni and high school students of the city is expected.

FULL CREW AT MILL DENIED.—Word was received yesterday in the Portland headquarters of the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen that a report from Chehalis to the effect that the Walville Lumber company's sawmill in that city has resumed operation with a full crew and with a wage scale below the minimum provision of the 4-year wage agreement. Messages from Chehalis indicate that the sawmill in question is operating with a reduced crew and the wage paid is not below the minimum 4-1 scale.

THREE WOULD BUILD GARAGE.—Three applications for permits to erect public garages have been filed with the city council. J. B. Clark proposes a one-story concrete garage on East Alder street, between East Third and Fourth and Third and Fifth streets. Charles Olson desires to construct a concrete garage on Albina avenue near Portland boulevard, while Hal Lamberson is seeking a permit for the erection of a public garage on lot 7, block 240, Portland addition between Montgomery and Harrison streets.

ACCIDENT CASE POSTPONED.—Trial of Harry McLean, charged with driving while under the influence of liquor, was postponed yesterday until March 15. McLean was arrested Friday night while traveling at breakneck speed in his "bug." He is said to have struck Edward R. Faxon of Bristol station, who was badly cut and bruised. McLean has not yet been able to deposit \$1000 bail bond which was set by the court.

SMOKERS VALUED AT \$1000 STOLEN.—Twenty-five cases of cigarettes valued at \$1000 were stolen from a Southern Pacific freight car between San Francisco and Portland, according to a report made to the police yesterday by special agents of the railroad company. The police have been requested to investigate all sales of large quantities of cigarettes by private persons.

VETERANS TO GIVE SHOW

Overseas Revue in Three Acts Will Be Staged in April.

"The Doughboy Follies," an overseas revue in three acts, will be presented at the Helix theater April 7, 8 and 9, under the auspices of the Portland chapter of the Disabled American Veterans of the World War.

The scenes show the life of the American troops in France from the signing of the armistice until departure for home. The cast will include 25 principals and a chorus of 100 members, all ex-service men. The production has been staged by soldier organizations in other cities and has met with success.

Billy Foy of the American Legion and James Caughlin of the entertainment committee of the disabled veterans are in charge of arrangements for the show. Funds raised by the entertainment will be used for new club rooms for the Portland chapter.

DANCE-DRAMA IS SLATED

Physical Education Students at Reed to Put on Show.

Students in the department of physical education of Reed college will have a dance-drama during commencement week in June. The affair will take the place of the annual dance pageant given on the college lawn and will be presented upon a promontory overlooking Crystal Springs lake. About 50 men and women of the college will take part.

Edmund C. Bechtold of the department of Germanic languages has written the drama, entitled "The Swan Knight," gathering his material from old French, English and German legends of Lohengrin. The entire presentation will be in pantomime in three cycles, with interpretative dancing by the principals and a chorus of 30.

LABOR MEASURES KILLED

House of Hawaiian Legislature Strangles Dozen Bills.

HONOLULU, T. H., March 12.—Four labor bills out of the budget of more than a dozen proposed measures, backed by the Honolulu labor council and introduced when the territorial legislative session opened, February 28, were killed in the first ten days of the sitting.

These bills included one to limit the meaning of the word "conspiracy" and the use of restraining orders and injunctions as applied to labor disputes; another to prohibit employers coercing or compelling employees not to join labor organizations; a third to prevent what was interpreted as unfair use of union cards, and a fourth to regulate advertisements for help during strikes.

All these bills died in the house without reaching the senate.

ROTARIANS GO BY AUTOS

Honolulu Members Decide to Travel in Body to Seattle.

HONOLULU, Wash., March 12.—(Special)—Decision of Rotary members to make the trip to Seattle for the annual northwest conference of Rotary clubs early the coming week, by automobile, was arrived at during the luncheon Thursday of the Honolulu club. Three score members, including their wives, have signed to make the trip.

The cars will assemble at the Elks' home at 9 o'clock Monday morning. Luncheon will be taken at the Olympia hotel. It is anticipated the party will arrive in the Queen City about 4 P. M.

ARMY BEGINS ECONOMY

Soldiers in Hawaii Will Wear Old Clothing and Shoes.

HONOLULU, T. H., March 12.—Patriotic, recycled and recycled shoes, instead of new footwear, together with "reclaimed" clothing, are to be issued to Uncle Sam's soldiers in Hawaii, under the new economy order promulgated by Major-General Charles G. Morton, commander of the Hawaiian department.

The order follows receipt of instructions from Washington to make "economy" the watchword in army circles. The cost of troops in Hawaii will not be reduced, despite the shortage of funds. General Morton said.

Cushman-Tacoma Power line has been completed from this city to the Mason county line by city engineers. Tacoma will build another power plant at the Lake Cushman site on the Skokomish river in Mason county. Crossings of Puget sound at three points will be made by high-tension lines suspended from steel towers.

The single span across the Narrows will be the greatest one—6000 feet long. That across Henderson bay will be in two cables, 1200 feet long, a central tower being erected on the sand-spit road at Wauna. North bay will be spanned by one leap of 2800 feet. The line will follow the county roads as far as possible and valuable agricultural lands will be avoided where practicable in order to make condemnation easier.
