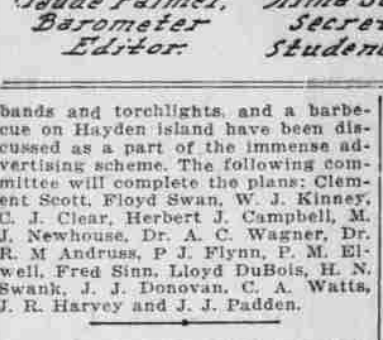

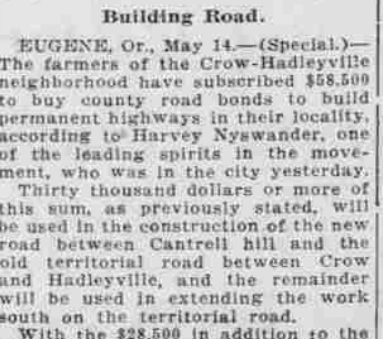
STUDENTS CHOOSE READER NEW HEAD Portland Boy Is President of Corvallis Body.

ANNUAL ELECTION HELD Rose City Girl Wins Secretaryship and Claude Palmer Will Edit Newspaper of Campus.

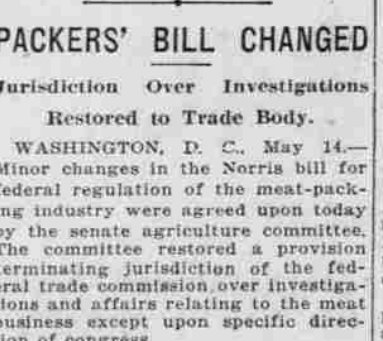
