People Expect Strong Character, but Not of Mannish Type.

NIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene May- 14.—(Special.)—The people of Oregen expect a thorough woman not the mannish type, but first of all woman, said Mozelle Hair of the extension division, speaking to the university women who are planning mmer social service.

Then they want ladies, not in the cheap sense, but because they have had the opportunity and should know the little nicetles of society. College women can have a stronger, richer and finer character than other girls because they have had these big opportunities," said Miss Hair in telling of what the average Oregon
community expected of the college
woman. "A free, athletic type of girl
is the type of woman in the University of Oregon," said Miss Hair, and
"because of their freedom and their lack of attention to the trivial con-ventions that bind so any women, they represent the highest type of womanhood. Therefore, these girls ust accept their responsibility and live up to the things expected of

them."

Broad-mindedness is needed, emphasized Miss Hair. "Large-heartedness and open-mindedness are requirements," she explained, as "we live in rather ideal world here, but we have an opportunity to become broad-minded and learn to overlook the small faults and unpleasant things Leadership probably has the biggest place in the small town."
