

THOUSANDS ATTEND JUNIOR WEEK END

Fetes High School Crowd.

SOPHOMORES WIN CUP

Baseball Game With Oregon and
Meet With Washington State
Features of Programme.

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, May 28.—(Special.)

—More than 300 high school students from Portland and other cities in Oregon have come to the Oregon Agricultural college campus to be entertained by the students for the junior week-end. Those in charge of the programme have exerted every effort to give the visitors the times of their lives, and judging by the eagerness with which the guests followed the events, the hosts have succeeded.

The Koenig cup trophy for the class putting on the best stunt in the junior vaudeville was awarded to the sophomore class for a scene laid in hell called "As Others See Us." Ira Boone of Unalaska, Cal., was manager of the stunt and few prominent persons on the campus escaped the forked tongues of the devil and his imps. Dean Pawcett and Dean Peavy were impersonated by two students in this act. Juniors took honorable mention with a scene entitled "A Grave Situation." Otto Hathaway of Corvallis was manager of the entire show.

Sophomores Win Event.
Thousands of students and visitors thronged the banks of the mill race Saturday morning to see the sophomore tug-of-war. The superior teamwork of the sophomores enabled them to pull the rook team to the very edge of the stream and the flag indicated that second-year men were the winners. No sooner had the victors been called than every rook on the field either dived, jumped, fell, walked or was thrown into the water. This custom has been practiced for several years. Last year the sophomores were obliged to follow their team to the bath. Henry Wagner of Portland was captain of the sophomore pulling team and Floyd Simon of Shedd was rook captain.

Rooks and the women of the freshmen class marched to a bonfire and cast their green emblems, caps and hair ribbons into the flames, marking their release from the obligation of wearing the class emblems. A baseball game with Oregon occupied visitors' attention till luncheon time.

New Tank Opened.
Opening of the new swimming tank and the track meet with Washington State college, were the afternoon events. Visitors were heard to say that they regretted the time they had to spend eating and sleeping, so great was their enjoyment of the programme. Fraternity houses, sorority houses, clubs, halls and private lodgings were filled to overflowing. The crowning event of the week, the junior prom, promises to be the most successful of any dance put on at the college, according to Cecil Dunn of Portland, who has charge of the affair. The gym floor resembles polished glass, the orchestra of 15 pieces will be nearly perfect, and the decorations are excellent. The fact that everyone of the 600 sets of programmes printed has been sold insures a capacity crowd.

Hunt to Be Feature.
Sunday morning a chase after hounds will be taken over the hills near Corvallis. The three-mile course will provide some difficult jumps for the mounted hunters. Horses from the military department will be used, and student army men and cavalrymen, together with some members of the faculty riding class, will be the riders.

A canoe carnival will be given Sunday afternoon, the feature of which will be a parade of the decorated canoes, a trophy to be awarded the most original and beautiful boat. Races between representatives of the different fraternities and clubs, sororities and halls and other groups will be on the programme. This is the first canoeing meet in the history of the college and a great deal of interest has been shown in preparing for it.

Many visitors have planned to stay over Monday, a holiday, to go on picnic to Mary's peak and to the Alsea country. The weather is perfect for holiday games and excursions.

WORK BEGUN ON ROADS

Large Crews Busy Making Repairs in Tillamook County.

TILLAMOOK, Or., May 28.—(Special.)—The bright, dry weather of the last few weeks has caused the roads to dry up. The county court has a large number of men and machinery in different parts of the county making improvements. One contract with the State Highway commission, which amounts to about \$100,000, to rock and gravel several miles of new road, south and north of this city, which could not be completed last fall on account of the early rains, will be finished in a few weeks.

There is considerable auto travel into the county already, and the next few months may see the largest tourist and summer travel the county has ever experienced.

SOLDIERS' BODIES DUE

Military Honors Are Planned for Funerals at Albany.

ALBANY, Or., May 28.—(Special.)—The body of Alfred E. Babcock, Albany soldier for whom the local post of the American Legion was named, reached New York from France May 26. When it is received in this city a military funeral will be held. The date it will reach here is not known yet.

The body of Earl R. Rogers, another Albany boy who lost his life in France, was shipped Wednesday morning from Jersey City and is expected to reach here Monday. If it arrives in time, the funeral will be held the afternoon of Decoration day. Earl Rogers was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Bert Rogers of this city.

NEWBERG TO BUILD FLOAT

BERRIANS TO ENTER DISPLAY IN ROSE FESTIVAL.

New Organization to Launch Drive to Obtain Total Membership of Five Hundred.

NEWBERG, Or., May 28.—(Special.)—As a result of a meeting of representatives of all the civic bodies, clubs, fraternal orders and churches held in the commercial club rooms here Friday night at the call of the Berrians, Newberg will enter an elaborate float and display in the Rose Festival for the first time. A committee from the Berrians visited Portland yesterday and interviewed the Rosarians and the Rose Festival committee, making arrangements for the entry of this feature and getting information regarding it.

It was decided to enlist the co-operation of all civic bodies in putting on a berry festival here this summer, and the representatives present pledged the support of their organization in this movement. A meeting will be held Monday evening, June 6, at which time it is expected to have Mr. McCrillis, the president of the Rosarians, present, and plans will be laid for Newberg's berry festival. The membership drive of the Berrian organization will also be launched at this meeting and it is expected that a total membership of 500 persons will be obtained.

Women, as well as men, are eligible to membership in the Berrians, and the women are showing interest in the new organization. A membership of more than 60 already has been secured without special appeal.

RUPERT CANNERY LEASED

Hood River Man to Operate Plant at Newberg.

NEWBERG, Or., May 28.—(Special.)—A meeting was held at the cannery here Friday night at which H. J. Davidson of Hood River met with the business men of Newberg. The result of this meeting is that the A. Rupert cannery will run. Mr. Davidson will be the manager of the new company which has taken over the Rupert cannery under lease and will operate them this year. It is understood that under the plan the farmers will be paid 50 per cent of the established prices for their fruit upon delivery and the remainder will be paid upon sale of the canned goods.

Local fruit growers are pleased by prospects as the berry and cherry crops give promise of being large and their marketing was becoming a serious problem.

MORE STORAGE PROVIDED

Hood River Apple Growers Expect Big Crop This Year.

HOOD RIVER, Or., May 28.—(Special.)—The apple growers' association has just purchased from L. E. Ireland the latter's two-story apple storage and receiving warehouse, a building formerly occupied by the Columbia Garage company. The consideration was around \$9000, it is said. Mr. Ireland, who has been in the fruit market business here for several years, will engage in business in Los Angeles, it is announced.

The purchase will provide additional storage for the heavy apple crop expected this fall. The directors, however, it is said, are considering the construction of additional warehouses at Odell, one of the heaviest valley receiving points on the Mount Hood railroad line.

Legion to Open Office.

EUGENE, Or., May 28.—(Special.)—Lance county post, American Legion, on Tuesday will open a pre-convention office in Eugene, where all details of the state convention of the American Legion to be held here July 1 and 2 will be handled. S. S. George, assistant principal of the Eugene high school, will have charge of the office. He had charge of a similar office at Astoria prior to the convention held here last year.

WOMEN'S STUDIES SHAPED

DANCING AND SWIMMING TO BE TAUGHT AT CORVALLIS.

Courses to Cover Vital Points of Hygiene, Sanitation, Play-Ground and Games.

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, May 28.—(Special.)—Folk dancing, aesthetic dancing, swimming, track athletics and pageantry are some of the courses announced by the department of physical education for women, for the summer session beginning June 30.

The opening of the new 100x50 foot swimming tank Saturday will make the varied programme of courses for women in elementary and advanced swimming much easier to handle. The courses aim to help teachers generally throughout the state as well as special teachers in physical education. All athletic training will be taught by the regular members of the department, under the supervision of Professor Edna A. Cocks. The Swed-

ish system of gymnastics will be used for the practical gym work. Miss Ruth Hjertas will instruct in simple national folk dances.

Outdoor sports, including tennis, hockey, track athletics, volleyball, basketball and baseball will be supervised by Miss Lois Rankin. Theoretic courses taking up the vital points of hygiene and sanitation, playground and gymnasium games, are included. The work in pageantry will train students in developing pageants and will include development of community recreation.

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—on Tillamook line, midway between Manhattan and Rockaway, owned by Welch and McFall, is preparing for the coming season's activities.

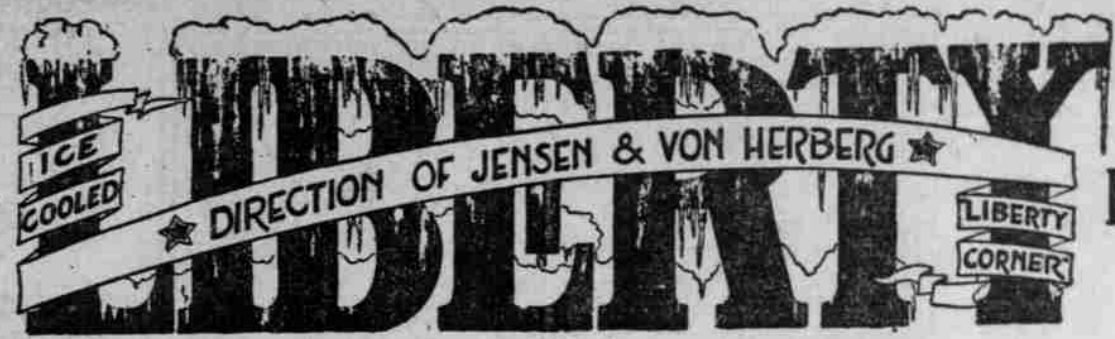
