

TIMBER OWNERS PAY \$111,531 FOR PATROL

Total of \$172,412 Spent in
1920, Says Report.

FOREST WORK ANALYZED

Activities of Several Associations in
Oregon and Size of Areas Cov-
ered Are Set Forth.

SALEM, Or., May 28.—(Special.)—Owners of Oregon timber lands paid \$111,531.29 of the total of \$172,412.89 expended for fire patrol and improvement in the forested areas of this state during the year 1920, according to a statement issued here today by P. A. Elliott, state forester. Other expenditures included in the aggregate were \$13,542.23 for individual patrol, \$12,339.62 under direct state supervision, \$16,983.51 by the state and \$7500 of federal funds under the Weeks law.

The total area patrolled aggregated 6,347,955 acres, of which 3,163,977 acres was represented by members of the local co-operative fire patrol associations. Acreage patrolled under contract with the state totaled 1,983,398 acres, while Oregon and California railroad lands aggregating 1,091,400 were patrolled by the government.

Patrols' Work Reviewed.
The several active fire patrol associations in Oregon, together with the acreage patrolled by each in co-operation with the individuals and government agencies, together with headquarters of each association, follow:

Expenditures Are Listed.
Fire fighting expenditures in the several counties, covering the period January 1, 1920, to December 31, 1920, follow:

Fire wardens to the number of 469 were employed during the year covered by the report. Of these 62 were employed by individual timber owners, 144 by associations, 21 under the Weeks law, 74 by the forest service, 29 by timber owners under state supervision, 46 served without compensation and 22 were employed by the state.

Nearly All Is Patrolled.

"Practically all the timbered portion of the state is now patrolled for fire during the danger season," said Mr. Elliott's report. "In some sections resources are better guarded than in others, but as a whole the results have been very satisfactory."

To make the protection even more efficient Mr. Elliott sent out the following recommendations:

Organization on the part of protection agencies to cope with at least a reasonably bad year. This includes extension of patrol to all forest lands and substantial state and federal aid to make such extension possible.

Strict enforcement of law by fire wardens without regard for individuals affected. If all get the same treatment then at least no operator or other person is subjected to expense which his neighbor doesn't also have to bear.

Law Enforcement Urged.
Law enforcement will remove a large part of the slaking menace, will control the small fires which burn around settlements on the edge of timber belts and sometimes escape, will make autoists, campers, hunters and operators more careful and consequently reduce the number of man-caused fires.

Mr. Elliott, in commenting on his report, said that this year would witness the most complete fire patrol organization in Oregon since inception of the movement to conserve the forests. With three airplane patrol bases, trails completed in all of the larger forests and other means for the work not heretofore enjoyed, it is predicted that the losses of timber for the coming fire season will be less than ever before.

SCHOOL IS DEDICATED

EDUCATION BUILDING OPENED
AT OREGON WITH CEREMONY.

Speakers Emphasize Need for New
Deal in Training and Call for
Less Textbook Work.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene,
May 28.—(Special.)—The new school
of education building and the uni-
versity high school were dedicated
yesterday when prominent Oregon
educators participated in the pro-
gramme.

Dr. H. D. Sheldon, dean of the
school of education, presided at the
dedication. The invocation was of-
fered by Dean E. C. Sanderson of
the Eugene Bible university. T. R.
Cole, assistant superintendent of the
Seattle schools, discussed the future
of secondary education.
D. A. Groat, superintendent of
schools in Portland, spoke on im-
portant educational problems, and
E. F. Carleton, superintendent of
Eugene schools, made an address.
Music was furnished by the high
school glee club and orchestra, under
the direction of Mrs. Anna Ladde-
bury Beck of the university school
of music. Parents of the students
and friends of the university and
high school attended. J. G. Imel,
superintendent of schools at Grants
Pass, was among the state educators
present.

Phi Delta Kappa, educational fran-
ternity, entertained the visitors.
Three things needed by the state
educational system were pointed out
by Dr. Sheldon in a speech. A well-
grounded course of study, vitalized
teaching, and the teaching of sub-
jects rather than textbooks were the
needs he emphasized.
The importance of electing strong
men to the office of county school
superintendent was stressed by L. E.
Carleton of Eugene.

BOYS' CAMP IS CHOSEN

SALEM, Or., May 28.—(Special.)—
Elk lake, at the foot of Battle Ax
Butte, a delightful resort located in

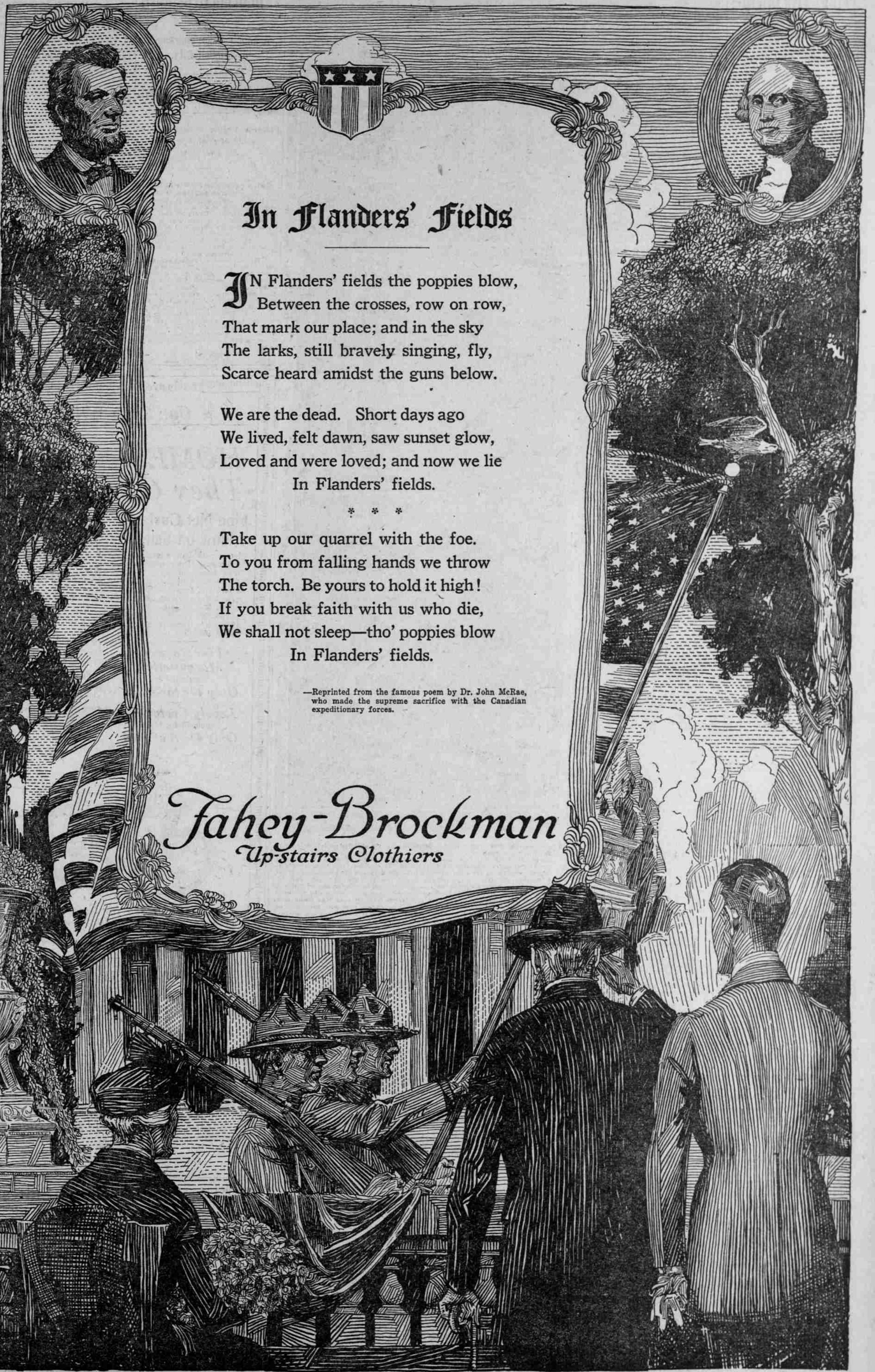
