NOTED SPEAKERS LISTED

DEMOCRACY IN EDUCATION WILL BE DISCUSSED.

Many Famous Teachers Will Attend National Association Convention at Des Moines.

DES MOINES, Ia., June 4.—Democracy in education is the one of the chief topics of discussion at the national convention of the National Education Association, to be held in Des Moines July 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8. Among noted speakers at the convention will be Herbert Hoover, United States secretary of commerce; Judge Ben Lindsey of the juvenile court of Denver, Colo.; Dr. A. H. Rhinehart of Mills college; Charles H. Barker, field worker of the International Rotary; Fannie Fern Andrews, authoress of Boston, Mass.; William C. Bruce, editor of the School Board Journal; Milton Eisenhower, A. H. Keith, president of the Indiana state normal school at Terre Haute, Ind.; Dr. Thomas D. Wood and George D. Strayer of Columbia University, and John P. Sims, president of the Stevens Point (Wis.) college. Other noted speakers will be on the programme, but have not definitely accepted the invitation to attend, according to Charles E. Pyle, local secretary.

This year's convention will be the first to be held under the delegated plan. About 1500 delegates will be present. Educators will watch with interest the outcome of the first gathering since the reorganization of the association, as the method of electing one delegate for each 100 members is expected to have great influence on the deliberations of the convention.

PLANT EXPERTS TO MEET

Western Quarantine Board to Convene at Victoria, B. C.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., June 4.—Five busy days will be spent by delegates to the third annual convention of the western plant quarantine board at Victoria, B. C., beginning June 7, according to the programme announced by the president, G. H. Hecke, director of the California state department of agriculture. Among the topics to be considered is that of

the alfalfa weevil, which, according to Hecke, threatens to spread from Nevada through the medium of automobile campers.

Most of the subjects on the programme are of technical nature. Entertainment features include a steamer trip to Vancouver, B. C., and other journeys by water. The present representation on the board includes Canada, Hawaii, Lower California, New Mexico, Arizona, Nevada, Idaho, Utah, Colorado, Montana and Wyoming.

WOOL LABEL BILL IS UP

SENATE COMMITTEE HEARS FARM BUREAU DELEGATE.

Branding of Clothes With Actual Percentage of Contents Asked by Women's Representative.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 4.—Manufacturers who buy raw wool have legally created standard grades to protect them, but consumers who buy their textiles have nothing in law to assure quality and content. Gray Silver, representing the farm bureau federation, told a senate committee Friday considering the "truth-in-labeling" bill. Its provisions, which would require branding of clothes with the actual percentages of content, would help both growers and consumers, he said.

Dr. Genevieve Tucker of Davenport, Ia., appearing for women's clubs, said that women "got tired of buying woolen underwear for their children, only to find after laundering it a few times that the garments are shoddy and that the filling has been washed out, leaving nothing but cotton mesh."

RESIGNATION IS REFUSED

Pastor Given Vacation When He Wants to Quit.

HOQUIAM, Wash., June 4.—(Special.)—Resignation of the Rev. Charles F. Wallraff of the First Baptist church of this city was considered by the entire congregation at a special meeting held in the church. After discussion the resignation was rejected and a month's vacation with pay voted the pastor, with the privilege of extending it to two months if he so desires.

Rev. Mr. Wallraff has an offer from a southern California church and during his vacation he will breach there and look the field over before making a final decision, he said. Mr. Wallraff formerly was a newspaper man of Columbus, O., and was Washington, D. C., correspondent at one time.

POISON TO GUARD VAULTS

TUBES TO TURN LOOSE GAS ON ROBBERS.

Inventor Demonstrates Device Which Releases Noxious Irritating Vapors.

CHICAGO, June 4.—Poison gas is the newest weapon in the war against crime, according to Professor W. Lee Lewis, who demonstrated Friday a device for the protection of bank vaults at Northwestern university. The device shown by Professor Lewis, who was connected with technical warfare service during the war, depends for its effectiveness on the breaking of three glass tubes concealed behind the combination lock by any violent attack upon the vault door. The liquid contained by the tubes produces a dense smoke, inter-

mixed with a noxious irritating vapor which causes violent coughing, sneezing and lachrymation.

"If the first discharge does not discourage the robber, a reserve supply is released automatically within the vault, when the door is opened," said Professor Lewis. "Gas masks do not effectively protect against the mixture, as smoke passes through the ordinary cannister. Moreover, these vapors burn and irritate the skin unendurably."

Berry Pickers Are Scarce.

HOOD RIVER, Or., June 4.—(Special.)—Mrs. J. W. Ingalls, in charge of the Apple Growers association employment agency, feared a shortage of strawberry pickers by the middle of the coming week. Transient harvest help, arriving here for the most part by automobiles, prematurely, has grown tired of waiting for ripening of berries, delayed by continued cold weather. Scores left here the last few days, Mrs. Ingalls said. The association shipped its first car of fruit tonight. The harvest will reach its height the latter part of next week.
