The campaign preceding the election was one of the keenest in many years, there being many principles at stake. There were so many good men running for the same offices that a choice was difficult.

The "Tech Pep," made a "scop" on the election news. By special arrangement with the election committee, some of whom are members of the staff, the results of the count were not given until the Tech Pep was published Wednesday afternoon and everyone, candidates, teachers and students were forced to wait for the news.

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The Benson cafeteria, of which Mrs. J. W. Among those most reduced are: soup, from 4 to 3 cents; ice cream, from 6 to 4 cents; potatoes and milk, from 6 to 4 cents; and puddings from 5 to 3 cents.

Benson won the last game of the season from the league-leading Lincoln nine by the score of 5 to 1. This victory placed Benson in position to win the interscholastic blue-up, with a percentage of .500.

Planes to Be Used in Alberta.

CALGARY, Alta.—Six airplanes will be used in this district by the department of forestry to fight forest fires. The planes, it was announced, will be operated from the aerodrome at High river, and two main flights are to be made daily in ordinary weather, one north and one south. The planes will also be a sufficient staff and equipment to make extra flights when there is danger of forest fires. A fire loss on the reserves is expected to follow inauguration of this service.

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
