

VON ELM DEFEATS EGAN FOR TITLE

Youthful Utah Golfer Northwest Champion.

VICTOR BEATS HANDICAP

Advantage of 2 Up Is Held by Portland Player at Noon, but Victor Forges Ahead.

On the 10th Von Elm took three putts, which cost him the hole. The 11th and 12th were halved. On the 13th Egan's chip shot was short and he missed a five-foot putt, losing the hole. The next two holes were halved in par and then Von Elm squared the match on the 16th with a birdie 2. Both were dead to the pin and putted for two, but Egan missed.

The 17th was halved in one under par. Coming to the fairway of the 18th, while Von Elm's tee shot was straight down the course, Von Elm topped his second, but reached the green with his brassie. The Waverley player had a perfect second shot, but he sliced his approach and was off the green. Egan's fourth shot was weak, and he had a ten-foot putt which he failed to sink. Von Elm won the match when he sunk his eight-foot putt.

Match Is Wonderful.
It was a wonderful match and found both players at their best. On the first nine of the afternoon round both medal scores were above par, but the second nine Von Elm finished in two under par, while Egan took a par 36. On the second nine Von Elm had three birdies.

With one of the largest galleries that ever witnessed a match over a northwest course bringing up the rear, the two finalists teed off for the start of the morning round. Coming to the first hole Egan's second shot hit the pin and bounded back about three feet. He missed the three-foot putt, and Von Elm was down in four, halving the hole. The second was also halved in 4s.

Fourth Halved in 4s.
On the third the Salt Lake player hooked his tee shot onto the rough, and he played his second into a trap. Von Elm had a good third, and laid his ball ten feet from the pin. Egan was down in four, and won the hole when Von Elm took a five. This was the first advantage gained by either player.

The fourth was halved in 4s. Von Elm hit into the bunker on his tee shot and over-ran the green on his second. Egan's second was short. Egan won the fifth, 4 to 5, being one under par for the hole. The sixth was halved in 3s and Von Elm cut down his opponent's margin to one hole. Egan's seventh, taking a 4 to Egan's 5. Egan won the eighth and they halved the ninth, leaving Egan still 2 up at the turn.

Going to the tenth the Waverley player hooked his drive to the fairway of the 12th, but the Von Elm won the hole, being down in 5 to a 6 for Egan. The 11th was halved in 5s.

Match Squared on 12th.
The match was squared on the 12th, when Egan pulled his tee shot into the woods and was stymied by a tree. Von Elm was down in a par 4, winning the hole.

Coming to the 13th Egan pulled his tee shot into the bunker, and made a poor recovery, when his iron only went 20 feet over the bunker. His third, however, was a beautiful shot—more than 200 yards—and he was on the green 30 feet from the flag. Von Elm holed out in 4, placing him 1 up.

Egan squared the match on the 15th by holing a 40-foot putt. Coming to the 16th the Waverley star had a beautiful drive and was on the green, 35 feet from the flag. Von Elm on his tee shot overshot the green and left his ball 100 feet in the rough. Von Elm's poor tee shot cost him the hole, for Egan was down in 3.

Egan Wins 18th Hole.
The 17th hole was halved in fours and Egan won the 18th hole to five, leaving him two up at the end of the first 18 holes. The cards for the morning round:

The Pacific northwest handicap was won by W. A. Pettigrove of Portland when he defeated W. J. Roope, also of Portland, in the finals 5 up and 4. The first flight women's championship was won by Mrs. Peter Kerr, who defeated Mrs. Thomas Kerr, both of Waverley, 3 and 2.

Ercel Kay, Portland, won over Jack Straight, Waverley, in the finals of the first flight men's championship, by a score of 6 and 4, while the first flight of the handicap championship was won by H. Reddell, who defeated R. W. Berry 1 up.

Handsome trophies were awarded the winners and runners up in all events last night at Waverley.

BRIDGE EXPENSE DIVIDED

Oregon City and West Linn Agree to Pay \$50,000 of Cost.

(Special.)—The city council tonight approved a contract between Oregon City, West Linn, Clackamas county and the state highway commission apportioning the expense for the construction of a \$50,000 bridge over the Willamette river here. The bridge will replace the one now in use.

Clackamas county has agreed to pay \$150,000, of which \$105,000 will be in road bonds and the remainder cash, while Oregon City and West Linn tonight agreed to put up \$50,000. In addition, the two cities relinquish their claim to \$5000 worth of road

TARIFF WILL BE RUSHED

House to Pass Republican Bill Within Three Weeks.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 25.—Passage of the tariff bill by the house before July 29 was predicted today both by Representative Mondell, republican house leader, who conferred with President Harding, and by Chairman Fordney of the ways and means committee.

They also agreed that the revenue bill would be taken up immediately on passage of the tariff measure, and Mondell added that the special session of congress would end when the tax bill was enacted.

Representative Fordney announced that the tariff bill would be presented to the house next Saturday, after democratic committee members had had an opportunity to consider the measure framed by the republican members.

WOMEN PRISONERS RIOT

Several Beaten and Stabbed as Result of Escape Attempt.

MARYSVILLE, O., June 25.—A number of prisoners and attendants at the Ohio reformatory for women here were stabbed and beaten today as a result of a riot designed, according to reports, to effect the escape of 25 prisoners. Three employees were severely cut with butcher knives in the hands of inmates. Two inmates are in the hospital.

Sheriff Collier and a deputy were called to aid the reformatory officials in subduing the rioters, ten of whom escaped, but were later apprehended.

The trouble is said to have started over inmates obtaining tobacco, one of them being punished for the offense.

AIDE TO DISABLED NAMED

L. T. Grant to Head Rehabilitation of Soldiers on Coast.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 25.—L. T. Grant, an engineer of San Francisco, has been selected to take charge of soldier rehabilitation work for the Pacific coast. It was announced tonight by the war risk insurance bureau.

It was understood that when the construction of soldier relief bureaus under the Sweet bill has been effected he will take charge of the combined functions of the federal vocational training board, war risk insurance bureau and public health service in his region.

BILL RESTRICTS INTEREST

Measure Sponsored in Oregon City Makes 6 Per Cent Legal.

OREGON CITY, O., June 25.—(Special.)—The establishment of a maximum contract rate of interest is the purpose of a new bill sponsored by J. F. Albright of this city. The bill will come up for action at the next election in November. A copy has been filed with the secretary of state. Petitions will be circulated to place the bill on the ballot.

Provision is made in the new measure to set the legal rate of interest at 6 per cent and to limit the rate of contract interest to 7 per cent.

GERMANS SIGN NEW PACT
Treaty With China Expected to Provide Fresh Competition.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 25.—German nationals in China will be brought under jurisdiction of Chinese laws and courts under a treaty of amity and commerce signed by Germany and China, Commercial Attache Arnold at Peking said in a cablegram today to the department of commerce.

Mr. Arnold warned that as a result of the treaty American traders in China could expect keen competition from German business men.

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BAKER CLUB BACKS ROAD

Sportsmen to Raise Funds for Half-Mile Stretch.

Lakes and Rivers, Where Good Fishing Abounds, to Be Opened to Towns of County Soon.

BAKER, O., June 25.—(Special.)—The Baker County Rod and Gun club has gone on record favoring the building of the Antone creek road. It has pledged itself to raise \$500 to make the first half mile of road necessary to connect with the Whitman Forest road.

The club last night decided to center all its activities on obtaining the road.

The mountain lakes adjacent to Baker, Haines and North Powder are little appreciated by the majority of citizens of this district on account of their inaccessibility to those who can spend only a few hours away from business.

The forest service has an appropriation of \$6000 for this summer's work on this road. The entire work will be directed by the forest service, and there will be no part of the road with more than a 10 per cent grade.

The road is to be finished to within four miles of the lakes this season, and within two years this beauty spot of eastern Oregon is slated to be the mecca for sportsmen, with its high mountains, cool streams, smooth, placid lakes, fish and wild life for all to enjoy.

The club has appointed a committee to solicit funds.

CAPITAL STOCK BOOSTED

Gevurtz Furniture Company of Portland Files Articles.

BOY'S BODY IS RECOVERED

Funeral of Gene LaFollette Will Be Held Tomorrow.

SALEM, O., June 25.—(Special.)—The body of Gene LaFollette, who was drowned in the Willamette river here Thursday while attempting to rescue his brother, Paul LaFollette, was recovered from the stream this afternoon. The body was about a mile down the river from where the drowning occurred.

Funeral services will be conducted in Salem. The parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. T. LaFollette, arrived here recently from Colorado to make their home.

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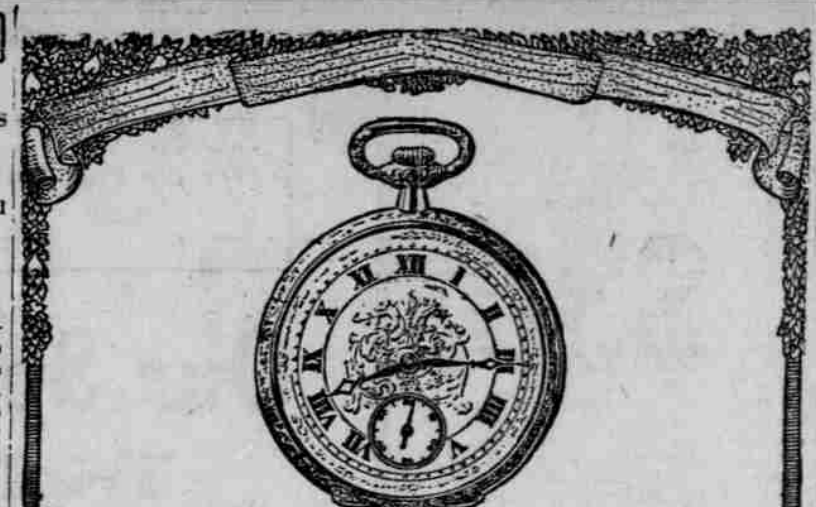
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WASHINGTON ST. AT PARK
