The total subscriptions to the \$100,000,000 new world movement fund reported by Dr. Altchison now aggregate, including \$5,000,000, which had been subscribed conditionally upon definite amounts being raised, \$57,824,299,85. This is less than was reported at the Buffalo convention a year ago, owing to the fact that over \$12,000,000 given by a generous friend to three organizations participating in the new world movement, was designated by the donor for endowment purposes only and hence can-not be included as a part of the \$100,000,000.

Dr. Aitchison stated that the total receipts for the year had aggregated \$12,595,694.48. Of this amount \$778,-268.18 was income from matured an-nuities, legacies and invested funds.


