

HART'S ATTACKS HELD WERE CAMOUFLAGE

Olympia Needs Investigating, Declares Publisher.

GOVERNOR IS CRITICISED

Executive Has Not Denied and Apparently Cannot Deny Charges, Says Ellensburg Man.

"Governor Hart's attack on various Washington newspaper publishers was mere camouflage to cover a situation that needs investigation," said J. C. Kaynor, publisher of the Ellensburg, Wash., Evening Record, who was in Portland yesterday.

"More than the Washington newspapers have published information relative to the expenditure of public money at Olympia which the governor has not denied and apparently cannot deny. The Washington newspapers have demanded that the governor either refute the charges or clean house. His answer is to pick five Washington publishers and attack them, making a smoke screen to cover his own actions."

Mr. Kaynor is vice-president of the Republican Editorial association in Washington, which recently held a meeting at Paradise Valley on Mount Rainier, following a meeting of the State Press association in the affair," he said.

"These charges are absolutely false. It is true that men prominent in the Republican Editorial association are prominent in the state press, but the two organizations are separate and distinct. No effort was made to bring up the question at the state press meeting. It was never even mentioned at that convention."

Party Betrayal Feared.

"The call for the Republican Editorial association meeting was signed by E. E. Hebard, publisher of the Port Angeles Daily Herald, as president; Frank L. Seft, publisher of the Bellingham Herald, as vice president. The meeting was called to discuss the whole affair informally. We felt as republicans that the action of the administration at Olympia was resulting in party betrayal; that unless the situation was cleaned up within the next few days, a recall election would be started which would deliver the republican party into the hands of the labor or radical group. As republicans we wished the voters to know that we did not countenance such conditions and that the republican party did not. In other words, we wanted the hands of the party to be clean that it might be able to meet the meeting at Mount Rainier authorized the officers of the Republican Editorial association to call another meeting to be held at some city other than Olympia. The purpose is to ask Chairman Hebard of the republican state central committee to meet with the republican editors."

Action Held Imperative.

"At the Mount Rainier meeting the general sentiment was that conditions all over the state are serious. The average country publisher is able thoroughly to sound the sentiment of his community and these editors seemed to believe that the sentiment is dangerous to the party unless conditions are cleaned up at the state capital. A meeting of republican editors probably will be called within two or three weeks, and Chairman Hebard expressed willingness to meet with the editors."

Mr. Kaynor said he was unable to fathom the governor's reason for a personal attack on five or six Washington publishers, who have been little if any less pronounced in their attacks on the Olympia administration.

"I understand the attack on me personally was on account of my supposed disappointment because the governor would not let me name the state printer," continued Mr. Kaynor. "I indorse Fred W. Kennedy, head of the printing department of the University of Washington, for state printer; so did more than 150 other publishers."

Kennedy Held Authority.
"Mr. Kennedy is generally conceded to be the greatest authority on confounding and efficiency methods among the printers on the Pacific coast. He has been president of the Seattle Typographical union, an organization of employing printers. He has been head of the printing department of the university for 12 years. He has helped hundreds of country publishers to introduce cost systems in their plants and has saved scores of them many hundreds of dollars. The introduction of efficiency methods, we Washington publishers believe that the appointment of Mr. Kennedy would have resulted in a big saving to taxpayers, the introduction of a system of records that would have enabled the legislature to learn more about this part of the state government."

"An attack on me because of my indorsement of Fred Kennedy is found to react. I am proud of the fact that I did indorse Kennedy, and I believe the governor is making another bad mistake in letting the public know of his motives in the appointment of a state printer."

AMERICA IN WAR'S VORTEX

Anglo-Saxon Friction Risks.
To insure herself a mortgage on the countries beyond the Pacific, Great Britain maintained the Anglo-Japanese alliance, although her traditions excluded from equal rights her own colored and half caste subjects. Clearly this treaty is no longer necessary as a protection for India against Russia, or against Germany on the Baghdad route.

This commercial combat in the Orient already has produced a domino American friction. Japan was hurriedly given to Japan by the allied supreme council, which, with America absent, was a mere instrument of domination in the hands of Great Britain. England confiscated the Mesopotamian oil field. These and other conflicts proclaim the coming of danger. Must there be on a big scale what took place on a small scale between England and Germany from 1890 and 1914?

If so the United States must adopt a two-power standard, with a fleet superior to those of England and Japan combined; must impregnable fortify the Panama canal, to assure uninterrupted communication between the oceans; must create an army of several millions; devise improved artillery, munitions and gases and

become a first-class military power—not for conquest, as was the case with Europe's military powers, but to protect her own interests and to maintain the open door in Asia.

President Harding and Secretary Hughes, in whom the world quickly recognized a far-seeing statesman, rightly think their country must not take such a course unless a friendly agreement should prove impossible.

Good Will Will Dominate.

The Washington conference will open more auspiciously than that of Versailles, for good will, not trickery; reason, not force and vengeance, will dominate. The British imperial conference showed how opposed Canada, Australia, New Zealand and even South Africa were to an alliance with the yellow people of the Pacific.

Lloyd George is too canny not to perceive that these countries would be lost to the empire if, when the first Japanese cannon opened fire against America, London ordered even a benevolent neutrality toward Japan.

The British premier now seeks to give dominion rights to Ireland as the first step toward a solid friendship with America. Such an understanding would constitute a power such as the world never has seen—a power which could disarm all nations and force restraint on the Japanese ambition, and could teach the European continent that its days of colonial expansion are over and that the axis of human progress has been displaced.

There would be danger in a too hasty attempt to Americanize China, whose youth has much to learn of her greatness and imperishable wisdom.

MOORS ROUT SPANIARDS

RETREAT TO DARRIS SAID TO HAVE BEEN DISASTROUS.

Official Communique Says 2 Colonels Are Dead and General Is Feared Slain.

MADRID, July 23.—(By the Associated Press.)—King Alfonso, said a San Sebastian message received here, left there suddenly last night for Madrid. His presence in the capital, it was said, was necessary owing to the seriousness of events in Morocco.

After a cabinet meeting today the following communique was issued: "Rebellious Moors reattacked our position at Anual with great violence. Their numbers were so great and they were so well armed we were obliged to evacuate the position and several others we recently captured. We withdrew to Darris where we were most disastrous. We had many casualties and two Spanish colonels were killed. There is no news from Mellilla. General Silvestre, giving rise to the fear that he was killed. Two thousand troops have been urgently dispatched from Ceuta. Mellilla. Reinforcements will be sent from other parts of the country to the troops sent from Mellilla and Ceuta."

COUNTY OFFICIALS ELECT

VANCOUVER, Wash., July 23.—(Special.)—This afternoon the state conventions of county treasurers and auditors came to an end with an automobile trip up the Columbia River highway.

The morning session of the treasurers was mostly taken up with the election of officers for the coming year and the passing of resolutions. Mrs. Edith Thornton of Bellingham, treasurer of Whitcomb county, was elected president of the association, and W. E. Levering of South Bend, Clatsop county, was elected secretary. Resolutions thanking the secretary, Mrs. Anna Parker of Vancouver, for her work in the convention and T. H. Erickson, Clatsop county treasurer, for his efforts to make the convention the best ever held in the state, were passed. A vote of thanks was tendered to the Prunarians for the use of automobiles on trips to the pruned belt and up the Columbia River highway today.

Mrs. Mary Rohel Dies.
OREGON CITY, Or., July 23.—(Special.)—Mrs. Mary Rohel, well known pioneer of Clackamas county, died at the home of her son, A. L. Jones, near Mulino, this morning after several weeks' illness.

Mrs. Rohel was 84 years of age, came to Oregon with her parents in 1867, and since that time had made Clackamas county her home. After the death of her first husband, Mr. Jones, she was married to Mr. Rohel, who was accidentally killed in the woolen mill in the number of years ago. Mrs. Rohel is survived by her sons, W. H. Jones of Newport, Or., A. L. Jones of Mulino, Clackamas county; Lee Jones of Philomath, Or.

Marcola Sawmill Operating.

EUGENE, Or., July 23.—(Special.)—Carl E. Fischer states that the big mill of the Fischer Lumber company at Marcola has been in operation during the last week, employing a crew of about 125 men on an eight-hour shift. The orders have been coming in just about fast enough to take care of the output, Mr. Fischer says. Very few of the larger mills of this section are in operation.

Salem Paving Contracts Let.

SALEM, Or., July 23.—(Special.)—Paving contracts aggregating a cost of approximately \$37,000 were awarded here last night by the city council. Operations will be started within the next few days.

FISCAL AUTONOMY CONCEDED IRELAND

Prospects for Peace Are Still Optimistic.

TERMS CLOSELY GUARDED

General Smuts to Place Services at Disposal of De Valera and Craig During Crisis.

LONDON, July 23.—(By the Associated Press.)—The outstanding feature of the government's Irish peace proposals to Eamonn de Valera is a concession of fiscal autonomy, it was stated on high authority here today. The position of Ulster is amply secured.

The feeling both in London and Dublin over the prospects of peace in Ireland remains optimistic. Eamonn de Valera, the Irish republican leader, today discussed the British terms with Arthur Griffith and others at the Mansion house in Dublin, but no formal conference was held, and Mr. de Valera informed inquirers that he was most unlikely any developments would take place in the immediate future.

No date for the meeting of the Dail Eireann has been fixed, and it is presumed that modifications of the terms will be sought before the republican parliament takes up the matter officially.

General Smuts, the South African premier, it is understood, will go to Ireland early next week for the purpose of conciliating, if possible, the opposing factions of the north and south. He will place his services at the disposal of both Mr. de Valera and Sir James Craig, the Ulster premier.

The opinion in London is that the British terms are not likely to be accepted as they stand, but Mr. de Valera is almost certain to come to London again, with more of his colleagues, and the Ulster premier has already declared that he would be available at any time he was really needed.

CO-OPERATION IS REFUSED

British Fail to Meet Truce Plans, Says Republican Chief.

CORK, July 23.—(By the Associated Press.)—Commandant Barry, chief republican liaison officer, issued a statement tonight in which he says he has instructed the republican liaison officers to cease co-operating with the British military officials in Ireland until they recognize certain complaints of alleged violations of the truce.

This action was taken, Commandant Barry explained, in view of refusal by the British military to co-operate with the republican army liaison officers in carrying out the terms of the truce, and their refusal to deal with complaints of direct breaches of the truce when registered on Irish republican army note paper.

SETTLEMENT IS EXPECTED

Impression Grows in Dublin That Peace Will Be Attained.

DUBLIN, July 23.—(By the Associated Press.)—The impression is growing here that the Irish peace offer made by Premier Lloyd George to Eamonn de Valera, the republican

leader, will work out in a settlement. The terms of the offer are still being held in the strictest confidence.

MOB LYNCHES WHITE MAN

Prisoner Wounds Assailant With Razor Before Hanging.

HATTIESBURG, Miss., July 23.—Casey Jones, white, recently convicted of the murder of Mrs. J. S. Moseley and sentenced to be hanged July 18, but whose case was pending on appeal before the state supreme court, was taken from the county jail by a mob early this morning and hanged in the courthouse yard.

After surrounding the sheriff and two other officials, the mob broke down five doors between it and the prisoner. Not a shot was fired, but the prisoner put up a desperate struggle, getting possession of a razor and wounding one man and hitting another with a chair. A blow on the back of the head ended the struggle and he was carried down to a tree.

Fruit Plants Are Expanding.

MEDFORD, Or., July 23.—(Special.)—The Rogue River Canning company is installing the machinery in its new plant on South Front street, and will be ready for operation within a week or ten days. Among other industrial improvements under way in the city is the erection by the Earl Fruit company of a new building to increase the capacity of its local plant. The Tomlin box factory is now running full capacity for the first time since it was established, employing 75 men and turning out 7000 to 8000 boxes a nine-hour day.

Mexican Railway Cuts Wages.

MEXICO CITY, July 23.—The employees of the National railroad lines, with the exception of those earning less than 100 pesos monthly, will suffer a 20 per cent wage reduction August 1, according to a decision reached by the new railway board of directors. A reduction in the number of employees also has been ordered.

Body of Soldier on Route.

VANCOUVER, Wash., July 23.—(Special.)—The body of Harry K. Ponder, who lost his life in France while a member of Company C, 261st infantry, has arrived in New York and will be sent to LaCrosse, Wash., the home of his parents for burial. He was killed in action during the Argonne drive. Arrangements for the services have not been completed.

50 Books Donated to Library.

KALAMA, Wash., July 23.—(Special.)—The library maintained by the Women's club was enriched yesterday by the donation of 50 new books by one of Kalama's most prominent citizens. The library, which embraces a variety of authors, has been a source of pleasure, and has a large patronage. A fee of 5 cents a week is charged for its upkeep.

Oil Fields Studied.

PRINEVILLE, Or., July 23.—(Special.)—For the purpose of examining the fossilized flora of the district in which the Blue Mountain oil company will soon begin to drill, Richard Russell of Berkeley, Cal., and Dr. W. Chaney of Iowa City, Ia., are in Crook county. They represent the Carnegie Institute of Technology.

Lewis River Yields Body.

KALAMA, Wash., July 23.—(Special.)—The body of a man, thought to be that of Matt Mattson, was found floating in the Lewis river at the Olson ranch, above Vale, yesterday. Mattson fell from the log raft about a month ago, and the body was never recovered.

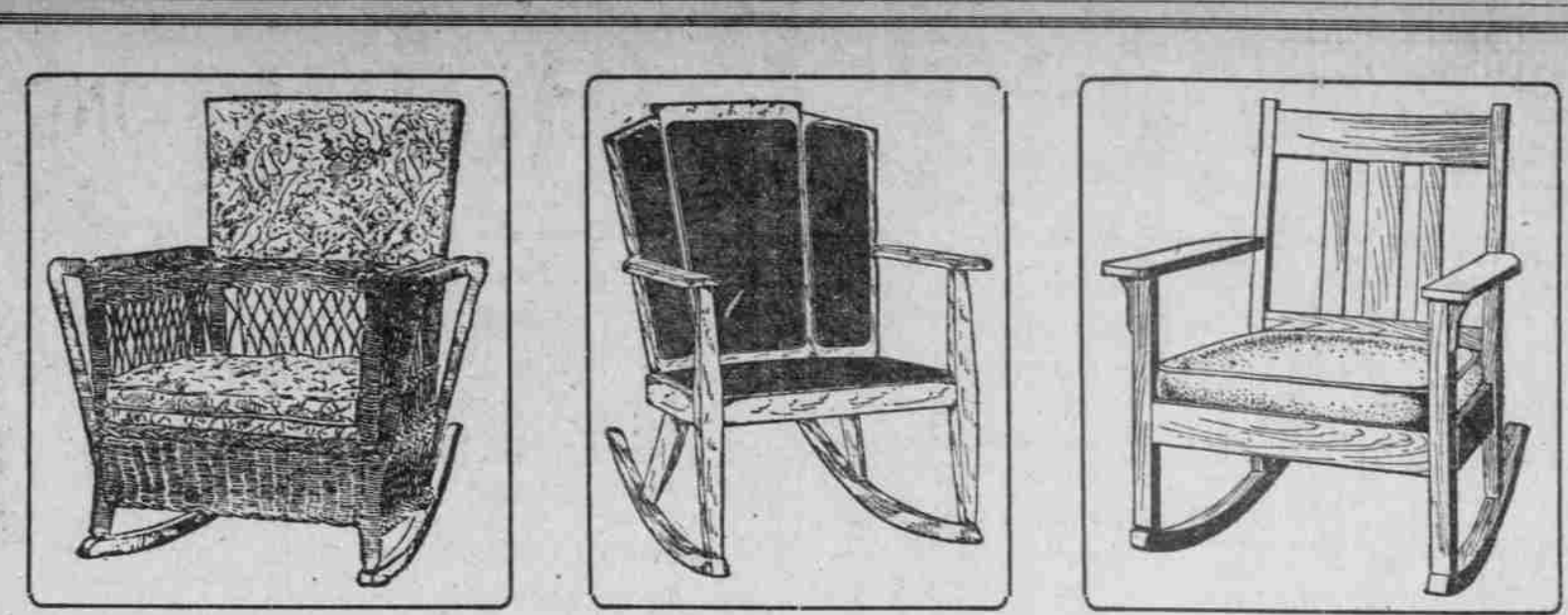

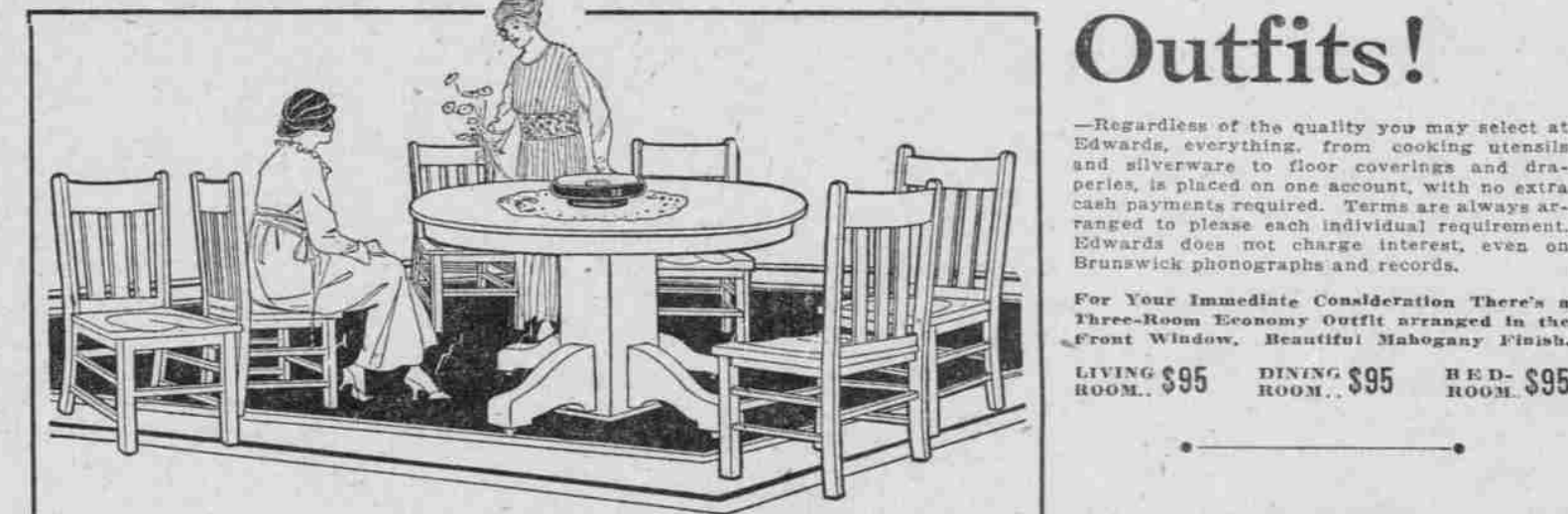
