RICH WIDOW SUMMONED

ANSWER TO STOCK ALTERATION CHARGE ORDERED.

Nephew Alleges Woman Changed Certificate to Conceal His Interest in Mining Property.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 30.—Questions as to the alleged alteration of a certificate of stock, valued at \$1,000,000, in the Mondah Trust company of Butte, Mont., must be answered before a notary public by Mrs. Mary H. Murray, widow of James A. Murray, millionaire mining man, according to a court order.

It was charged in the court hearing that Mrs. Murray refused to answer questions regarding the certificate at a hearing last Wednesday, and has since refused to permit process servers to see her at her home in Monterey.

A suit filed here yesterday by James B. Murray, nephew of the mining magnate, asks the court to declare him the owner of the certificate, which includes 4000 shares in the company.

Under the terms of Murray's will his widow and Stuart Haldorn, stepson, are the principal beneficiaries. James B. Murray contends, however, that the Mondah certificate is his property and that it was altered to conceal his interest.

Later it was announced that the taking of Mrs. Murray's deposition had been continued until Friday, as she was ill at her home.

SALMON RUN IS LIGHT

Quinnault Catch on Grays Harbor Is Valued at \$17,000.

ABERDEEN, Wash., July 30.—(Special.)—The year 1921 will not be a profitable one for either white or Indian fishermen on Grays harbor, according to harbor cannerymen and fishermen.

The run of Quinnault salmon was unusually light, only approximately 22,000 fish of this species being caught by the Quinnault Indians, who hold the fishing rights in the Quinnault river. The catch is valued at about \$17,000. The season closed July 1.

The regular harbor salmon season opened July 15, four days each week being named as open days. Only a few salmon have been caught so far. The principal runs take place in August and September. Canned salmon is sold wholesale at 69 cents a dozen cans, the lowest price in several years.

RENTS KEEP LIVING UP

High Costs at Aberdeen Laid to Repair Charges.

ABERDEEN, Wash., July 30.—(Special.)—While most commodities are dropping in price, according to findings of the Aberdeen city council investigating committee, the rent situation operates as a bar against substantial lower living costs.

According to the report made by a local renter to the committee, rents will not be reduced. On the contrary, he thinks that they may be raised unless repair costs are lowered. This exception, it is stated, the price of which has been reduced materially. Few houses are being constructed for rent.

MORTON HOLDS UP PAVING

Improvement of Business Streets Delayed Until Spring.

MORTON, Wash., July 30.—(Special.)—In view of the lateness of the season to start any street improvement, the Morton council decided to put the actual paving of the streets in the business section over until next spring, instead of forming three improvement districts, as originally

GEMS SEWN INTO COAT

FEDERAL AGENTS UNCOVER \$70,000 SMUGGLING PLOT.

Los Angeles Jeweler Under Arrest as Principal in Conspiracy to Defraud Government.

CHICAGO, July 30.—Ripping open a small bag sewn in a coat lining, federal investigators today said they found smuggled unset diamonds and jewelry valued at \$70,000. The coat, they said, belonged to Hyman Finerman, a Los Angeles jeweler, who was arrested yesterday, charged with smuggling.

William H. Williams, special agent of the treasury department, announced that the coat was discovered in an apartment rented by a relative of Finerman.

The find consisted of three diamonds, each weighing about 10 karats and valued together at \$40,000; four diamonds valued at \$1800 were found on his person. Arraigned on a charge of smuggling he was held under bonds of \$2000, but it was said that in view of today's discoveries an effort would be made to have this bail increased.

ROMANCE THRILLS HERO

BLIND VETERAN IS STABBED; BRIDE TAKEN AWAY.

Marriage Is Secret After Girl's Father Objects; Couple Unite on Ship and Reach America.

NEW YORK, July 30.—Salvatore Filippo, blind hero of the Argonne, found nearly as many thrills in his post-war romance as he did in the world war, he said today in arriving from Italy with his bride.

He was blinded by wounds received in rescuing a comrade from "no man's land" in the Argonne. A year ago he went to Italy and became charmed by the soft voice of Isabella Bruna, and began to woo her. Her father objected so Salvatore and Isabella were secretly married.

One day Isabella's relatives broke into the house, stabbed Salvatore and bore away the girl.

Salvatore induced her to visit him aboard the Argentine as he was about to sail for home. He told her the ship sailed at 4 P. M. At that hour Isabella discovered they were 20 miles at sea. She did not speak to him for a few days, Salvatore said, but on arrival here they were on friendly terms.

NEW BIDS TO BE OPENED

Toledo, Wash., School District to Let Building Contract.

CENTRALIA, Wash., July 30.—(Special.)—For the second time bids will be opened by the Toledo school board next Saturday for the erection of the city's new high school. New bids were called when flaws were discovered in the bond of the contractor to whom the work was recently awarded. The previous bids ranged from \$18,000 to \$27,000.

Work on Narayne's new \$20,000 high school will be started next week. Construction will be by day labor under the supervision of Louis Livingston of Winlock.

Construction of two wings to the Winlock high school, a contract for which was recently awarded to the Grays Harbor Building company, is being speeded up. It is expected that the work will be completed by the opening of school, set for September 6.

Timber Land Deed Set Aside.

SOUTH BEND, Wash., July 30.—(Special.)—A suit involving \$40,000 worth of timber land in this county and property in Seattle and Fairbanks, Alaska, was decided today by Judge Bowen, in which he set aside a deed to the property which E. W. Johnson, formerly of this city, gave to his wife when he was ill in Alaska. He asserts that the deed was given with the understanding and agreement in writing that if he should recover the property should be given back to him. He charges her with having made way with this agreement and says he lost a written statement in which she admitted illicit relations with other men. Johnson made his fortune mining a fraction of the Lucky B mine in Fairbanks.
