They were surrounded by relatives and at noon 50 guests, mostly kinsmen, sat down to dinner with them. They were married in the saddle, back in Missouri, in 1871. It was not exactly a runaway match, but weddings on horseback were the style in Missouri in those days. At one time he was completely surrounded by Indians. It was only the prompt action of Jesse Stanford, the well-known Indian fighter, who routed the Indians and saved Pike from death at Willow creek, known as Rye Grass flat, in 1864.
