RESCUE TEAMS TO MEET

MINERS WILL HOLD ANNUAL
FIRST-AID TOURNEY.

Units From 25 States, Canada and
Mexico Are Entered for
Big Competitions.

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 27.—One hundred
mine-rescue and first-aid teams, rep-
resenting 25 states and Canada, and
Mexico, will compete for honors at
the annual international first-aid and
mine-rescue meet here September 1,
2 and 3, under the auspices of the
United States bureau of mines, in co-
operation with mine operators' asso-
ciations, miners' organizations, the
national safety council and the Red
Cross.

Under conditions approximating as
closely as possible those found in
mines during disastrous fires and ex-
plosions, teams will be tested in
rescue work on a specially con-
structed gallery and other teams will
conduct first aid to supposedly
injured miners.

John J. Lewis, president of the
United Mine Workers of America; United
States Senator Polindexter of
Washington, chairman of the senate
committee on mines, and approxi-
mately 1000 mining men from all
parts of the country are expected to
attend the meeting.

Foster Bain, director of the United
States bureau of mines at Washing-
ton, said the purpose of the meeting
was to promote greater safety in the
mining industry. Explaining the meet-
ing, he said:

"As an industry which in this coun-
try alone employs more than a mil-
lion men in hazardous work, the
movement for greater safety and effi-
ciency in mining has been a constant
impetus each year until today these
contests are looked upon by the min-
ers as one of the greatest events in
the industry. With more than 50,000
miners having voluntarily taken the
bureau's prescribed training course in
first aid and rescue work and with
these men organized into teams at
the various mines throughout the
country for the promotion of the wel-
fare of their fellow workmen, their
participation in the contests promises
to make the event a humanitarian
effort of great moment."

ROAD TO BE DEDICATED

Yamhill County Will Celebrate
Completion of Two Lengths.

NEWBERG, Or., Aug. 27.—(Special.)
—Yamhill county will celebrate the
completion of two important links in
her highway system at Dayton, Labor
day, September 5. The links, which
have been completed were the stretch
of road between Newberg and Dayton
and the strip from McMinnville to
the Dayton road.

The completion of these links not
only gives Dayton connection with
Newberg and McMinnville over paved
roads, but makes a continuous high-
way from Sheridan to Portland, a dis-
tance of 51 miles.

Lazy Husband Sent to Jail.

ABERDEEN, Wash., Aug. 27.—(Special.)—A man, the first convicted
under the "lazy husband" act
in Justice Baumert's court, Basil
Herrel was sentenced to 30 days in
the county jail yesterday for failing
to support his family. Herrel, ac-
cording to the law, he will be compelled
to spend his time at hard labor, and his
wife will be paid for it at the rate
of \$1.50 a day. Herrel was arrested
in Tacoma.

Bank Promotes Dairying.

PRINEVILLE, Or., Aug. 27.—(Special.)—A meeting of farmers, pre-
sided over by J. L. Karnopp, presi-
dent of the Bank of Prineville, was
held in this city Wednesday, which
marked the beginning of an era of
organized effort to promote the dairy
business in Crook county. The Bank
of Prineville buys the cows and
places them in the hands of the

farmer, the farmer paying for them
from a certain percentage of his
monthly cream check. Ten farmers
signed up for cows, which will arrive
here early in September. County
Agents Tucker and Professor Fitts
of Oregon Agricultural college will
purchase these cows somewhere in
the Willamette valley, selecting three
carloads.

CHINESE CREW IN BATTLE

Warfare Aboard Collier Results in
Four Sailors Slain.

QUEBEC, Aug. 27.—Shots rang out
early today in the fore-castle of the
collier Maskinonge, anchored in mid-
stream, and soon the steamer's whistle
began blowing frantically.

When boats put out from shore it
was found that warfare had broken
out among members of the Chinese
crew and that four had been shot to
death and two more wounded.

The Chinese refused to explain to
ship's officers the cause of the fight.

FRATERNAL MEET SLATED

CONGRESS TO BE HELD AT CHI-
CAGO AUG. 29 TO SEPT. 1.

Many Speakers to Present Views
on Variety of Subjects of In-
terest to Societies.

CHICAGO, Aug. 28.—Every state in
the Union will be represented at the
convention of the National Fraternal
Congress of America, to be held here
August 29 to September 1, the pro-
gramme for which has been an-
nounced.

George S. Kirby, president, will
preside at the opening session, when
greetings will be extended from the
Canadian Fraternal association and
committee reports will be made.

Jesse S. Phillips, superintendent of
Insurance, New York, will speak on
"Insurance Commissioners and the
Fraternal Societies" on August 31.

Other addresses include "The Impor-
tance of Health Conservation to the
Fraternal Societies," by Dr. M. M.
Smith; "Women in Fraternalism," by
Mary L. Rocca; "Fraternal Poetry
and Prose," by Milton G. Wood of
Chicago, and "What Fraternal Soci-
eties Are Doing to Aid the Melting
Pot," by Mrs. Frances C. Jakabain.

W. E. Fitch of Cleveland, secretary
of the National Fraternal congress,
will speak on the third day on the
subject "Some Obstacles in Securing
Fraternal Legislation." The officers
will be elected and installed at the
afternoon session.

In addition to the national con-
ference there will also be meetings
of the presidents' section and the law
section, which will be featured by ad-
dresses by representatives of various
fraternal organizations. The annual
meeting of the Fraternal Actuarial
association will be held Monday
morning, August 29.

FETE FOR PRESS PLANNED

HONOLULU LIKELY TO ADD TO
BIG ENTERTAINMENT.

Affair is Expected to Last for 20
Days Instead of From
October 11 to 25.

HONOLULU, Hawaii, Aug. 27.—
(Special.)—Although it was origi-
nally planned that the forthcoming
session of the Fraternal Congress of
the World be held from October 11 to 25,
it is now probable that the 500 or
more delegates will remain in Hawaii
for 20 instead of 14 days. Lorrin A.
Thurston, publisher of the Honolulu
Advertiser and vice-chairman of the
local executive committee, has gone
to San Francisco to look into trans-
portation matters, and while there
expects to complete the 20-day ar-
rangements.

The additional days will materially
assist the local entertainment com-
mittee and give it an opportunity to
prepare for a more elaborate pro-
gramme than was at first planned.
Although five and one-half days of

the delegates' stay in Honolulu will
be devoted entirely to business mat-
ters, all of the remaining time will
be given over to sightseeing, recep-
tions, surf-riding, excursions to in-
teresting places, pageants, "luauas,"
or native Hawaiian feasts, and swim-
ming at famous Waikiki beach.

The tentative programme and list
of speakers show that some of the
world's most distinguished journal-
ists will come to Honolulu for the
congress, and each day of business in
the old throne room in Iolani palace,
now the executive building, will be
replete with interesting papers, ad-
dresses and discussions.

PAINT PRICES ARE CUT

Reduction of 25 Per Cent Is An-
nounced at Spokane.

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 27.—Reduc-
tions in prices of house paints and
painting materials were announced
here today by two of the largest
paint houses.

Liquid paint prices have been cut
25 per cent. It was announced, and
are now quoted at \$2.50 and \$3.75 a
gallon. Floor paint prices were re-
duced approximately 10 per cent and
white lead prices have been cut 1½
cents a pound.

scape architect of the firm of Olmsted
Bros., which has designed gardens,
parks and subdivisions for many
cities of the United States and Can-
ada. Portland parks impressed the
visitor favorably and he pronounced
the Columbia highway trip as being
of unrivaled grandeur.

Secession Is Threatened.

BEND, Or., Aug. 27.—(Special.)—
Residents of northern Lake county
are seriously considering secession
from Lake and annexation to De-
schutes county. It was learned here
today. Criticism of the Lake county
government, it is understood, is based
on the road situation—faulty repair
and unjust location.
