IMPORT RATES EXTENDED.

H. Mulchay, general freight agent, Southern Pacific company, announced yesterday that the import rates on chinaware, earthenware, crockery and porcelain ware of \$2.30 for less carload and \$1.51 for less lots, which now apply to Chicago and west, have been extended to all points east of Chicago and north of the Ohio and Potomac rivers and will become effective September 28. The old rates are \$2.45 for less carloads and \$2 for carload lots. The southeastern lines were not as yet concerned in these rates.

PAINTERS OF PORTLAND AND VICINITY PLAN EXHIBIT.

Display to Be Made in October at Art Museum—Only Original Oil Paintings Eligible.

An exhibition of oil paintings by the artists of Portland and vicinity will be held at the Art museum, Fifth and Taylor streets, during the month of October. Original oil paintings, not before publicly shown in Portland, will be eligible, and all works must be received at the museum not later than September 21. The exhibition will open October 1.

SIX OF THE CANVASES WILL BE SELECTED TO BE SENT TO SAN FRANCISCO TO BE PART OF AN EXHIBIT WHICH WILL BE SENT THROUGH SEVERAL WESTERN STATES UNDER THE DIRECTION OF THE WESTERN ASSOCIATION OF ART MUSEUM DIRECTORS.

The association was organized this summer. Its purpose is "to obtain more and better exhibitions, reduce the pro rata cost of such exhibitions through co-operation, and undertake other activities that are connected with the objects of the association." Miss Anna B. Crocker, curator of the Portland museum, attended the meeting in San Francisco this summer.

COW TEST REPORT ISSUED

Creditable Showing Made by Several Tillamook Herds.

TILLAMOOK, Or., Sept. 17.—(Special.)—The monthly report of the Tillamook Cow Testing association for August follows: Average pounds of milk per cow, 784; average pounds of butter fat per cow, 55.14; number of cows tested during the month, 1138; number of cows producing over 40 pounds of butterfat, 209.

Highest pure-bred herd reports were: Homer Mason, 13 cows; average pounds of milk, 761; average pounds of butterfat per cow, 59.07.

John Schild, 27 cows; average pounds of milk, 755; average pounds of butterfat, 38.51.

from a locality at a certain time and reappears at irregular intervals would seem to indicate that climatic conditions were essential for the propagation of the causative fungi. It has been known to become prevalent after a hot, dry period followed by a rain.

"The average course of the disease is about ten days and the mortality is high if cases are given prompt attention. The condition somewhat resembles foot and mouth disease."

The dairy and livestock division made 545 dairy inspections in July and August, 191 creamery inspections and 110 stores and depot inspections, the report indicates, in addition to many other places where dairy products are manufactured and sold. Twenty-five places were closed by order of the inspectors.
