




## Disease Caused by Fungi or Molds

Sept. 17.—During the month of August there were many outbreaks of mycocile stomatilits among the cattle in the Yakima val-ley and Walla Walla county, accord-ing to the report of Dr. L. C. Pelton, chief of the dairy and livestock di-vision of the state department of ag-riculture. iculture

"This disease is caused by the catthe eating forage containing fungi or molds," the report states. "It is ron-infectious and occurs sporadic-ally, but the fact that it disappears


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
