

2 U. S. DEPARTMENTS TAKE STRIKE ACTION

Freight Rates on Grain and Grain Products Cut.

ALL WEST IS AFFECTED

Department of Justice Issues Order for Protection of Line Where Walkout Is Started.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 22.—Federal action affecting the railroad strike situation was taken today by two government departments when the interstate commerce commission ordered freight-rate reductions on grains, grain products and hay in the territory between the Mississippi river and the Pacific coast and the department of justice issued instructions for the protection of the property of the International & Great Northern railroad in Texas, where a trainmen's strike started at noon.

The commission's decision, in a case brought by 22 western states and a number of national and farm organizations, did not deal directly with the impending strike, but was considered significant in presentation of prospective future reductions of railroad operating expenses as a basis for its rate-making activity.

In the international railroad case, the department of justice took cognizance of the fact that the receivers representing the United States court are in charge of the property and instructed the federal marshal at Houston to employ such special deputies as the court might consider necessary.

The decision removes from wheat and hay one-half of the increases given the railroads in 1920 and on all other grains fixes the rates at 10 per cent less than those on wheat.

New Relationship Ordered.
The commission further ordered a new relationship built up in the rates on grain products, including flour and other commodities, to agree with the lower level on the raw material.

The increases given in 1920 gave the carriers a 35 per cent advance in the Mississippi valley and western territory, a 25 per cent advance within the mountain and Pacific territory and 33 1/3 per cent advance on commodities moving across the division line, of which half is taken away.

SALMON FAMINE LOOMS
BRITISH COLUMBIA FACES SERIOUS SITUATION.

1920 Carry-Over and 1921 Pack Practically Disposed Of and Few Fish Now Running.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Oct. 22.—(Special.)—British Columbia is facing a serious salmon famine. The 200,000 cases of the 1920 pack carried over to this summer and all but 150,000 cases of this year's pack have been marketed and there are practically no fish running.

At the opening of the season the cannerymen decided not to pack the cheaper grades, with the result that their pack is limited to sockeye salmon and the fall fish are not running to give them an opportunity to change their minds and pack according to the demands of the market.

Fishermen are asking and getting 18 cents a fish for dog salmon on the Fraser river, nine times the price obtained last year.

In 1917 and 1918 fishing was active in all grades to supply a strong demand, with the result that the fourth year following has arrived with the usual lack of no fish, because four years ago the streams were dried out.

Recent reports indicate a 45 per cent shortage in the United States market alone and France is expected to appear again as an active buyer of the first of the year.

Christmas will witness a market practically bare of canned salmon.

SNAKE HAS TWO HEADS
Medford Woman Finds Reptile Near City of Rogue River.

MEDFORD, Or., Oct. 22.—(Special.)—While driving yesterday through the country about six miles from Rogue River, Mrs. Gunning Davis stopped her car and descended the bank of a small creek to get water for the radiator, when she discovered a small snake with two heads, and persuaded Darrell Garmon, a youth who was fishing near by, to pick it up for her. She brought the reptile to Medford.

The two heads of the snake move independently, and the mouth of each head is armed with a sharp tongue. The reptile, which is nine inches long, is normal in every respect, save for the superfluous head.

COOS PLANS FOR EXHIBIT
County's Display at Show Promises to Be Good One.

MARSHFIELD, Or., Oct. 22.—(Special.)—Coos county is going to the Pacific-International land products show at Portland in November with the best exhibits to be obtained here. The work has been put in charge of County Agent Garr, who is already gathering vegetables and fruit. All varieties of standard apples will be included, with vegetables, cheese, condensed milk, butter, grains, root and other crops.

Timber and lumber also will figure in the exhibit, which will be the largest the county has sent to a show since the Lewis and Clark exposition.

ators and representatives are practically all on one side of the question. All carry the assurance that the strike is the most desired thing that could happen at this time—first, because it would give jobs to more deserving persons; second, because it would permit correction of burdensome conditions imposed upon the railroads and upon the public by the trainmen taking advantage of the stress of war and the necessities of politics; and, third, because it would make immediately possible a substantial reduction in freight rates.

The worst of the present railroad labor situation is not the wage schedule, but the working rules, which in

many cases force the railroads virtually to pay for three days' work done in one. One example of this may be cited on railroads between New York and Buffalo. The trip for the average passenger train is a fraction of an hour. The railroads are compelled to have three separate crews, each crew drawing a full day's pay. On the slightly longer run from New York to Pittsburgh four crews are required.

All of these excessive and unnecessary wage demands, it is pointed out, are passed on to the public in high transportation rates.

LEGION TO HONOR T. R.

VETERANS TO CELEBRATE 63D ANNIVERSARY.

Ex-President Saved Many Lives by Advocating Preparedness, Says Commander Emery.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Oct. 22.—Commemoration of the 63d anniversary of ex-President Theodore Roosevelt's birth on October 27 is urged by John G. Emery, national commander of the legion, in a letter sent today to all legion posts.

"The American army in France and in the camps at home never had a better friend than ex-President Theodore Roosevelt," says Commander Emery's letter. "If he had had his wish he would have fought and died at our side; as it was, he fought the good cause at home until, like the soldier on the firing line, he fell."

"By his vigorous efforts for preparedness and national unity he made all Americans his debtors. But the men who wore the uniform of the United States are peculiarly in his debt. No one will ever know how many American lives were saved to future usefulness by his appeals for adequate preparation before war came, and for public support of the nation's fighting arm while the war was in progress."

"On October 27 the nation will commemorate the 63d anniversary of Theodore Roosevelt's birth. The national commander urges local posts throughout the country either to organize celebrations of their own or to take part in whatever celebrations may be arranged by other bodies in their communities."

7 PER CENT OF TAX UNPAID

NAPOLEON'S FATE THREATENS GREEKS

Advancing Winter Presents Serious Problem.

HELLENIC LOSSES HEAVY

Large Area in Anatolia Occupied by Rapid Advance Absolutely Devoid of Abodes.

BRUSA, Asia Minor, Oct. 22.—The problem of holding, throughout the autumn and winter the large area in Anatolia the Greeks occupy, since their advance on Angora has been checked, appears to be a serious one. In the judgment of competent military critics it will not be possible unless the Greeks are able to erect barracks or other shelters suitable for the rains and heavy snows which are bound to ensue.

A great part of this territory is devoid of living abodes of any kind. To shelter the troops in tents during the cold months will be out of the question. The making of earth dugouts might solve the problem, but the country furnishes absolutely no wood or other material for such a purpose.

Some observers go as far as to predict that if the Hellenic forces attempt to hold the vast area during the winter, they will repeat Napoleon's disastrous retreat from Moscow.

Turks Strongly Entrenched.
When the Greeks set themselves the task of reaching Angora through a long detour south of the Sakaria river, they had a very imperfect conception of the real topographical features of the country. They depended almost entirely upon maps which had been made 25 years ago and which in many cases gave no indication of the mountainous character and physical obstacles of the country.

Once they drove the Turks east of the mountains, they believed their way would be relatively easy. But they found their adversaries strongly entrenched in commanding ridges of the hills and mountains which were all but impregnable. It was from these predominant positions that the Turks poured down upon the Greeks on the plains and valleys, with machine-gun and artillery fire which only superhuman effort could have overcome.

The Greek losses in dead and wounded are estimated at more than 15,000. The Turkish casualties are believed to be somewhat less. The prisoners taken by the Greeks numbered approximately 1500.

Greek Troops Exhausted.
The exhaustion of the Greek troops after their several hundreds of miles of marching and their 16 days' battle was another vital reason which prompted the Greek general staff to halt the struggle against the Kemalists. It was clear the Greek troops could not have gone on much longer. Not only were they greatly enervated by their long hard marches over desert-like land, but they had insufficient food, water and sleep.

It is also undeniable that some of them were badly shaken by the fierce, unrelenting fighting of their comrades and the heavy losses among their comrades and officers. In some instances they refused openly to go forward until assured of adequate protection of their flanks and proper artillery support. All this was perhaps perfectly natural in a struggle against an enemy in his own country and who had so many points in his favor.

The necessity of shortening their lines of communication, embracing hundreds of kilometers of sandy, hilly roads, constituted the fourth important factor which made it seem wise to stop the campaign.

bands of Turkish irregulars which infected the mountain sides. They bore without complaint the great hardships and privations incident to a campaign in a strange, difficult and inhospitable country. If they failed in their ambition of reaching Angora it was not because of inherent weakness in themselves, but because they faced an opponent quite as brave and resolute as themselves and encountered physical barriers which it required greater strength than theirs to overcome.
